COI COMMISSIONER PROMISES FAIRNESS AND ANONYMITY


As the United Kingdom supported Commission of Inquiry (COI) officially got underway last week, Friday 22 January, Premier, and Minister for Finance Hon. Andrew Fahie is not holding back his thoughts on the matter. The Premier was especially vocal at a community meeting that was held in Baughers Bay on 23 January where he shared his suspicions about the motives of former Governor Jaspert in calling the Commission of Inquiry.

Hon. Fahie questioned why the Governor and the UK Foreign Office lumped the major cocaine bust where police officers were implicated into a COI that is supposed to examine governance matters. In noting his skepticism about this the Premier said, "They want to use drug bust with police getting arrested... that's not under the local government and they want to use their failure in the

international media to and then tell us that they love us while trying to destroy our name for their failures."

The Premier suggested that the UK was interested in direct rule, he announced: "It's not about Fahie or a political party. It's about them wanting our economy. It's about them wanting our country. That if they can tarnish us with the international world, then they can get support from everyone to say go in and move in on them," Hon. Fahie stated.

The BVI Leader said that he is not pleased with the way the matter was announced or arranged and said that it seems telling that the Commissioner arrived with the Governor, was hired by the Governor, and is hearing certain things, "We want a transparent commission of inquiry, we don't want no kangaroo court," Hon. Fahie declared as he outlined his suspicions.



The Premier criticised the Governor's report that he could not get certain information and said that there are other Constitutional provisions the Governor could have used instead of COI. "They didn't draw a penknife for this fight, they didn't draw a sword

for this fight, they took out the atomic bomb," Mr. Fahie pointed out.

As he further suggested that there is a destructive motive behind the COI, Hon. Fahie said:"They try to do what Irma couldn't do, Maria couldn't do or COVID 19 couldn't do. They trying to destroy our name, our economy, our tourism, our financial services. They're trying to destroy everything about us so that we could say come we need you, come save us."

Governor Says He Has No Ulterior Motive

Meanwhile, in his last interaction with local media at a press conference on 22 January, a day before his departure, Governor Jaspert rubbished claims that ulterior motives were influencing his decision to call for a Commission of Inquiry. He told the media: "This was, without doubt, a very difficult decision to make, but a very necessary one based on the great number of current concerns and allegations put to me by members of the community, the public service, the media, the businesses and other."

"I simply cannot ignore the concerns of the people, or the hindrances facing local institutions, I feel the Commission of Inquiry is the best way to address those concerns and ensure the welfare of the people."

At the same press conference, the Commissioner of the Inquiry spoke to the media where several questions being publicly mulled were put to him.

Among the questions, Sole Commissioner The Rt. Hon. Sir Gary Hickinbottom, was asked whether the inquiries were going to be livestreamed. This question was against the backdrop of a public request that was made by the Premier for the inquiries to be aired. However, Commissioner Hickinbottom did not make any promise or give assurance to this.

Instead, he said, "It's too early at the moment to determine precisely the procedure for the hearings."I see the force behind having proceedings in public and indeed live-streamed, and so hopefully some or perhaps all of the proceedings will be in public and will be live-streamed. But I cannot make a commitment yet because we don't know what the hearings will cover and what any procedural restrictions might be. The openness of these proceedings is, of course, important."

In his outline of how the COI will be conducted Sole Commissioner Hickingbottom emphasised that measures were being put in place to ensure that the identity of those who are providing the information is safeguarded. He also mentioned that confidentiality will be on the table. In offering such, the Commissioner said that a special website https://bvi. public-inquiry.uk was created. This website, he said, will have updates and information on the COI as well as allow for information to be shared with him.

However, The Island Sun newspaper felt compelled to ask Sir Gary Hickinbottom about how he intended to balance the need for anonymity with the right of those being accused to know what the accusation is and defend themselves accordingly. In response, he said: "Those who provide information confidentially have a guarantee that information — including their name will remain confidential. I, then, as part of the due process of the Commission, must give the gist of any suggestions made in respect of any figure — public or not - within the terms of the report — to those individuals so that they can respond to them fully and fairly."

"If there possibly came a case in which anonymity could not be maintained without giving individuals a full, fair, and proper opportunity to respond, then I simply could not rely upon that particular information. It would remain confidential. I could not rely upon that information if those particular circumstances apply," he added.

Overall the Commissioner assured the public that he is only here to look at what is presented and not deciding who is guilty or innocent. "If I conclude that there is nothing possibly amiss with the governance of these Islands,

I will say so; and that will be the end of it. But, if I find there is some possible substance to the concerns, then, as the Terms of Reference require, I will have to consider what might be done about them, and make recommendations for action, for example, in terms of whether criminal proceedings might be brought against any individuals. It would then be for the criminal courts to determine whether crimes have been committed."

Territory has earthquake insurance: Premier says

that the Territory now has earthquake insurance was comforting news when an earthquake measuring a magnitude of 5.4 ML with estimated Maximum Intensity of V was felt in the BVI on 24 January, at approximately 7:21 PM.

The Territory is no stranger to earthquakes, but the seriousness of the 2017 hurricanes has taught all in the British Virgin Islands to be mindful of natural disasters. Both 2017 hurricanes were costly to the Government and recovery is still taking place almost four years later and as such worry of another disaster is scaring everyone.

To prepare, Premier Andrew Fahie

The Premier's recently announced said that the Government has put financial instruments in place to assist in case another disaster strikes. Hon. Fahie while speaking in the most recent House of Assembly held earlier this month announced the BVI's disaster coverage.

> He explained that the previous administration signed up for CRIF, the Caribbean Catastrophic Risk Insurance Facility, but only took the coverage seriously after being hit by hurricane Irma and Maria. Hon. Fahie explained, "though this facility was available to decision-makers long before the disaster because we did not have a disaster like that before we did not sign

up. That agency would have afforded us couple millions of dollars to our disposal right after the disaster," he pointed out.

Now Hon. Fahie said that the government is taking matters of disasters seriously and is making provision for such. "Since then being signed up. When this government took office we did go to Nicaragua and finish sign up with couple of things, CDEMA and other areas officially," the Premier said.

As it relates to earthquakes, the BVI Leader disclosed, "We have increased the amount of CRIF in a few areas and also included areas such as earthquakes in terms of increases not include the amount for earthquakes because it was an automatic five million. We increased it to fifteen million with the CRIF insurance and lately we have got an increase of over 53 million dollars in coverage in case of earthquakes and about even the same for hurricanes."

The Premier assured that this coverage is a good thing, "Irma we wouldn't have had to do what we doing here now - the complex only get 11M. this only got that. We would have had couple million dollars well had we signed up before," he explained.

NHI needs revamping: Premier Fahie says

Insurance (NHI) has been using some drastic measures to get around its funding issues and as discomfort has been reported. Both Premier and Minister for Finance Hon. Andrew Fahie and the Minister responsible for NHI Hon. Vincent Wheatley announced that the system has to be fixed urgently.

Speaking at the Long Trench public meeting held on 25 January a resident informed the Minister and

The National Health Premier that NHI has some shortcomings, and both legislators indicated that they are aware of the issues.

In noting that the a result, a lot of health situation is dire Hon. Wheatley said that he experienced the sourness of NHI's austerity measures when his father-in-law (former Premier Hon. Ralph T. O'Neal) was ill and overseas getting treated.

> In recalling his experience and sympathizing with the community Hon. Wheatley said: "Many persons including my father-in

law when he was away on his bed in the hospital in the States they stopped payment here (NHI) that is wrong. Sometimes when you are away only to find out they are not paying for that particular operation like bone marrow and certain things. They cannot treat you here, but when you go abroad you cannot get treated either."

Meanwhile, Hon. Fahie disclosed that in the middle of the pandemic many persons couldn't access healthcare using NHI and

the government had to intervene. "In the middle of COVID 19, I want you to know this - I am waiting for some of these things to come out in this inquiry. The \$40M that we went for - the medical people were so behind because all the money was never paid in the system from the day it started."

"We had to take \$7.5M out of the \$40M grant and put it in the medical system for NHI so the medical practitioners could get paid and people could

start to use their card again because they had stopped," the Premier mentioned.

Hon. Fahie emphasised that NHI needed to be revamped and the Minister was working on getting that done. The Premier said that the system was to the point where this revamping was needed. "If you don't fix NHI like the Minister is going to do now, you will forever be putting money into this scheme because it did not start correctly; so it will always be a catchup scheme. Now we have to work quickly to have it revamped."

Motorcycles plaguing communities with noise pollution

"It's becoming a plague," Minister for Works and Utilities Hon. Kye Rymer declared in response to a resident's complaint about the scooter riders in her area during a public meeting held on 23 January.

The government held two public meetings that day and at both meetings, the Minister had to address the issue of deliberately noisy scooters. One desperate resident told Hon. Rymer and the other members of the government "We do not have enough police to patrol these scooters ...at two o'clock and three o'clock in the night you hearing these scooters... and they're disturbing the neighbourhood."

At the first meeting Hon. Rymer told the gathering, "I know we have an issue in all communities with motorcycles' loudness.

As we sat there, we hear motorcycles riding by with a loud noise. That is something I just want to let you know that this government is looking towards making some amendments to the legislation where we will work to change the fines, the penalties because we have done as much as we could with the motorcycles," Hon. Rymer said.

The Minister said that the government and his Ministry has tried to find an amicable approach to the scooter complaints and issues, but felt that they were beyond that at this point. In recalling the efforts Hon. Rymer said, "We have reached out to them, even when we restricted the usage of those motorcycles, the community cried out. We understand it's a nuisance, and they operate as if there is no law in our territory and

we are the law-making body and we will work to amend the laws."

After announcing that there was going to be a legislative amendment to deal with the scooter riders as well as fees, the Minister said that he is encouraging the Royal Virgin Islands Police Force to ensure that it does enforcement 24/7. "We're hoping that the police will also do their part in terms of enforcement because we can put as many things as we want on the papers on the books but if we have no enforcement nothing would get done," the Minister declared.

While noting that the constant complaint from residents and other matters make the scooter issue equivalent to a plague, the Minister said that he is trying to sort the situation

in the House, I have asked the Governor to add more resources to the police for more enforcement because it is becoming a plague."

One Road Town resident disclosed that a class action to hold the government responsible to pay all damages (health-wise and otherwise) is another alternative to end the plague once and forever. He said: "you cannot tell residents and tourists that this is BVI-LOVE and this is paradise - no way".

Mr. Rymer said that he is mindful of the age of some of the riders and for that reason felt compelled to call on parents to intervene. "Most of the scooter riders within the community are younger riders, but I ask of the parents. The parents need to play a role as well. The parents

out. "I have spoken about it need to understand that these bikes...the riders live somewhere. They leave home with the scooters you're not sure where they purchased the scooters from. Parents have a role to play as well."

> Meanwhile, the Minister said that he will continue to do what he can from his end to help resolve the scooter issues but ultimately he reiterated that it would be up to the police and the parents: "We can put the laws in place... We'll amend the legislation we are currently working on. We'll have the fines and penalties amended too, but parents you need to play a role as to make sure that your child, the person that is living in your home with a scooter that is plaguing the community actually addresses that."

IOC, NOCs and Government of Japan reaffirm commitment to the Tokyo 2020 Summer Olympic Games



Tortola, British Virgin Islands, January 25, 2021 — International Olympic Committee President Thomas Bach spoke with all 206 NOCs including the BVIOC and confirmed all are fully committed to the Tokyo 2020 Summer Olympic and Paralympic Games on January 22.

With 6 months to go until the Games, President Bach reaffirmed the IOC's commitment to the Games to be held on July 23, 2021. "Together with its Japanese partners and friends, the IOC is fully concentrated on and committed to the successful delivery of the Olympic and Paralympic Games Tokyo 2020 this year."

BVIOC President Ephraim Penn and Secretary General, Lloyd Black took part in the virtual meeting.

"The IOC and organisers of the Tokyo 2020 Summer Olympic Games have been in continuous discussions on how to host the Games safely - both for the competing athletes and delegations as well as for the host country," said Mr. Penn. "There is full commitment to seeing the Games through which is a message that must be made clear to all athletes who are currently training and preparing to compete."

The BVIOC through Chef de Mission for the Games, Mrs. Tahesia Harrigan-Scott have constant contact with the elite track and field athletes slated to compete at Tokyo 2020. This includes Eldred Henry (shot put) and Kyron McMaster (400m Hurdles) qualified for their events in 2019 and Chantel Malone (long jump) and

Tokyo 2020 hopeful Ashley Kelly (400m).

"All of our athletes are doing well," said Mrs. Harrigan-Scott. "While their training schedules had to be adapted to meet with the COVID-19 restrictions and regulations, all four of the athletes are focused, working hard and are determined to be on their best form when the summer comes around. There's no denying that the lack of competitions and a dead season can take its toll, but they each have a support network not just through their coaches and peers, but also through each other and a pro-active Executive at the BVIOC who ensure that their needs are being met so as to minimize any distraction from the task at hand."

In addition to the elite athletes, Thad Lettsome

(sailing) and Elinah Philip (swimming) are also hopeful of gaining a spot on the team through the Universality programme but this will not be confirmed until closer to the Games in July.

Mrs. Harrigan-Scott will be attending the Chef de Mission meeting on February 9 where updates on the preparations for the Games will be shared by the Tokyo 2020 organisers.

Rumours of cancellation "categorically untrue"

A statement issued by the IOC on January 22 also rebutted news reports which cast doubt on the support from the Tokyo Government quoting a statement made by the Japanese Government:

"Some news reports circulating today are claiming that the Government of Japan

has privately concluded that the Tokyo Olympics will have to be cancelled because of the coronavirus. This is categorically untrue.

"At an IOC Executive Board meeting in July last year, it was agreed that the Opening Ceremony of the Olympic Games Tokyo 2020 would be held on July 23 this year, and the programme and venues for the Games were rescheduled accordingly. All parties involved are working together to prepare for a successful Games this summer.

"We will be implementing all possible countermeasures against COVID-19 and will continue to work closely with the IOC, the Tokyo 2020 Organising Committee and the Tokyo Metropolitan Government in our preparations for holding a safe and secure Games this summer."

"The shared nature of our challenges requires that we view our world as systems and subsystems; with our actions having implications for others at the local, regional and global level. To effectively address these challenges, we must collectively reaffirm education as a human right," Dr, Flax-Archer said.

The BVI National Commission for UNESCO has been working closely with the Department of Youth Affairs and Sports based learning.

This, the Secretary General said, will also help youth understand the importance of civic consciousness, human rights and diversity as well as bring their awareness to critical social issues faced by their communities and globally, all in the efforts of creating responsible global citizen.

Director for Department of Youth Affairs and Sports, Mrs. Brenda Lettsome-Tye, spoke on Citizenship and Participation Challenges and Opportunities as it relates to the Youth in our Territory.

The Director said, "We plan to increase the amount of programmes we offer this year and have already identified civic consciousness, respect for rights and diversity and volunteerism as subtopics that we will be

discussing with our young people... When it comes to volunteerism, the department has partnered with the secondary schools to provide avenues for volunteerism by utilising [our youth] for many of our productions that we carry out."

She added that although it may seem like free labour, volunteers develop a sense of responsibility on the project/production they are working and often times are great promoters of the projects.

BVIPA Announces Adjusted Fees

The BVI Ports Authority (BVIPA), announces adjusted fees as amended in the British Virgin Islands Ports Authority (Amendment) Regulations, 2020.

The BVI Ports Authority is a revenue generating entity and the fees collected represent 100% of its budget. "BVIPA is required to examine its cost to operate and recommend adjustments to its fee structure to ensure the economic sustainability of the Authority," said Claude Kettle, Director of Finance. "These overdue adjustments in select fees are necessary to efficiently and properly operate and further develop our Territory's Port facilities."

The amendment to the port fees ensures that the Authority can continue to meet the cost of its payroll, improvement and modernising of its technology, operations and to accomplish the Authority's robust infrastructure development plans.

This amendment was made effective 18th December, 2020. However, Ag. Managing Director Oleanvine Maynard said, "The BVI Ports Authority is applying a grace period for full implementation until 1st March, 2021 to ensure the public has the opportunity to become familiar with the new fees." After this date, all payments must reflect the new fees established by the amendment.

In 2008, there was a partial adjustment to the fee structure, specifically, harbour charges in the British Virgin Islands Ports Authority (Amendment) (No. 2) Regulations, 2008.


Contract Awarded For Repairs To The Valarie O. Thomas Community Centre

It will include the rehabilitation of selected emergency shelters, the provision of emergency relief supplies for these facilities, training for the public and private sector in resilient, safe and green (Smart) building strategies and standards, and training in shelter management inclusive of psychosocial care.

Other emergency shelters will undergo repairs and upgrades this year including the Long Trench Community Centre, the Emile E. Dunlop Community Centre on Anegada and the Christiana and Gertrude Warner Community Centre in Purcell Estate. Five other Emergency Shelters on Virgin Gorda and Tortola will be outfitted with appliances and communications devices.



in December 2020 to undertake extensive repairs to the centre which serves the Sea Cow's Bay and surrounding communities. A portion of the centre is also currently being used as a clinic by the BVI Health Services Authority.

Tarris Hill Construction Ltd. was able to demonstrate that they have the necessary skills and expertise to carry out the works that will be needed to meet the regional Smart standards inclusive of Basic Infection Control, and Hygiene and Space Management requirements as established by the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO).

The Valarie O. Thomas Community Centre in Cow's Bay will be the second showcase facility as part of a resilience project funded by the European Union and implemented by PAHO on behalf of the Government of the Virgin Islands.

Dr. Yitades Gebre, PAHO/WHO Representative for Barbados and Eastern Caribbean Countries said works include strengthening of the roofs, upgrade of windows and doors; flooding, energy standards promoted by PAHO.

Dr. Gebre added, "This Emergency Shelter will also be outfitted with new appliances and VHF radio communications which are essential items for the operations of these facilities during crisis or emergencies. We have been impressed with the interest shown by the local contractors and the quality of the bids received and we expect to see the completion of the works by June 2021."



SANTO DOMINGO -DR1- With the positivity rate back under 20%, the Abinader administration lowered the nationwide curfew. Curfew will now be 7pm to 5am on Mondays to Fridays (regardless of holidays) and from 5pm to 5am on Saturdays and Sundays. While businesses are ordered to close, people have three hours to commute to their final destination for the evening. That is lockdown starts at 10pm Monday to Friday and 8pm on Saturday and Sunday. The measures in Decree 37-21 are effective 27 January through 8 February.

Decree 37-21 also establishes that open-air public spaces, such as parks and boulevards, can be used for leisure and sports activities other than social gatherings and always complying with preventive health protocols. Gyms, restaurants and bars are allowed to reopen to 60% of their capacity. A maximum of six persons per table is allowed, among other health protocols. Religious ceremonies are allowed three days a week, keeping within 60% of the capacity of the church.

HAITI - The governments of Haiti and the Dominican Republic have signed nine agreements in which they have promised to confront the irregular migratory flow and the issues of trade, maritime borders, sovereignty, health, and others common to both nations that share the island of Hispaniola.

Last week, the presidents of the Dominican Republic, Luis Abinader, and of Haiti, Jovenel Moïse, signed the agreements following a meeting held on Sunday at the southern border, Abinader and Moïse both said that they will be taking the appropriate measures, each country in its territory, to deploy cutting-edge technologies that facilitate the elimination of irregular migratory flow, trafficking, and human trafficking, arms flow, drug trafficking and theft of cattle, among other illegal activities.

"Work to obtain the necessary financing for the adoption of a training and support plan that will facilitate the work of both countries to reinforce security and border surveillance; consequently, each country will collaborate with the other if physical or technological controls are built on the entire land border of the border," said a statement issued following the meeting.

The leaders also agreed to start the process of identification and registration in the Haitian civil registry of all citizens of that country who are in Dominican territory and open the negotiation process to delimit the maritime borders between the two countries. This process would start as soon as possible.

In health, with the collaboration of the international community that

has shown its willingness to finance hospitals in Haiti, both leaders agree to cooperate in the construction of general hospitals in Haitian territory, located where the government of that country considers it appropriate, to reduce the intensive use of Dominican hospitals. [Caribbean National Weekly]

HAVANA - (ACN) The Cuban capital is facing a complex Covid 19 spread, with numbers on the rise surpassing 200 confirmed cases on Friday, which has led local authorities to call for harder work against the disease.

The search for possible Covid cases and their on-time isolation are key actions to cut the virus transmission, said the president of Havana's provincial defense council during the daily Covid briefing.

The official called for strict enforcement of precautious measures to prevent the fatal impact of the disease.

On Friday, medical authorities in Havana reported 23 patients in intensive care units, 17of them in serious conditions and four in critical unstable conditions.

NEW YORK - Over the past year, former President Donald Trump's family business suffered steep declines in revenue as the pandemic upended the nation's hospitality industry, according to a financial disclosure report released hours after Trump departed office Wednesday.

The report detailed a revenue drop of more than 40% at Trump's Doral golf club outside Miami, and a 63% decline at his signature hotel in Washington, just blocks from the White House. All told, the Trump Organization declared revenue of

at least \$278 million in 2020 and the early days of this year, a nearly 38% decline from the company's reported 2019 results.

The disclosure, which represents the final public snapshot of Trump's finances, documents the toll the pandemic has taken on his luxury hospitality business, which essentially ground to a halt last spring when the coronavirus started sweeping through the country. Trump hotels and golf courses shuttered, and even after reopening, some faced restrictions on indoor dining and gatherings.

"There were places that due to government mandates we were not able to operate," Eric Trump, the former president's son who helps run the business, said Wednesday. "Those are places you are going to lose the season because of it."

The Trump Organization, he said, remained stable and had steady cash flow and relatively low debt compared with other real estate businesses — although as Donald Trump left office, the company had more than \$300 million in debt coming due in the next few years that the former president has personally guaranteed.

The disclosure portends greater tumult for the business, which has faced widespread shunning of its brand after the deadly Jan. 6 assault on the Capitol. [San Juan Star]

ROME, Italy's 'brain drain' is rising with increasing numbers of mostly young and highly educated Italians going abroad, ISTAT said Wednesday.


The number of emigrants rose 4.5% in 2019, the national statistics agency said.

One in three of them were graduates, ISTAT said.

At the same time, the stats agency said, the number of foreign immigrants into Italy fell by 7.3%. Successive governments have sought to reverse the drain by making the jobs market more efficient and trying to make research posts more easily available. But the labour market is stagnant and youth unemployment at all-time highs, while the lock of so-called 'barons' on promoting their proteges at universities appears to be as strong as ever. News stories regularly feature achievements by young Italian researchers abroad. (ANSA).

Around 74 percent of respondents said she is a strong leader, also up three points, and 57 percent believe she is genuine, up two points. On Sunday afternoon, a resident of East End reported that she went to throw her garbage into the dumpster next to the Willard Wheatley Primary School when a male, unknown to her, came out of his jeep and hit her in the face.

In second week of the month, a customer outside a bank on deCastro Street was injured with a stone thrown by an unknown male across the street who was randomly spouting expletives and threats. The bank door was also damaged. She had to be treated at the Dr. D. O. Smith Hospital for her injuries.

The denial of one male's


request for the return of his confiscated scooter resulted in an assault on the attending female officer as well as the male officer that went to her aid, both of whom had to be treated at the Dr. D. O. Smith Hospital. In this incident, Ronald Antoine, 22, of Greenland was charged with two counts of assault occasioning actual bodily harm, damaging property, resisting arrest, assault on police and escape lawful custody.

In the first week of January, a bank security officer reported being assaulted by a customer who was denied entry for not wearing a mask. And on two separate nights, two bar attendants reported being spat on and then stabbed with a knife by the same perpetrator at the same bar in East End. Leonard Leando Frett, 61,

of Vanterpool Estate was arrested and charged for wounding in that matter.

Commissioner of Police Michael Matthews is concern with what appears to be indiscriminate attacks on members of the community while attending to their duties, business and walking through their neighbourhoods.

"It is never right for one person to inflict injury on another even in the heat of disputes. However, to subject another to injury just because they are carrying out their duties or worse with no apparent provocation is uncivilized. The public has a right to expect civility and restraint in our streets and workplaces. Our community-wide response needs to be a unified condemnation for such acts," he said.

There will be no greater autonomy or independence until UK Overseas Territory residents trust local government Ok. Recent Crises in Overseas territory Governance in the Turks and Caicos, and elsewhere, will drive the idea of independence off the map for a generation.

Why: because for all the talk of greater transparency, accountability, and government by citizen participation by OT politicians, residents of Overseas Territories of the UK are wise enough to observe that

the preceding is usually talk, and the release of hot air from the proverbial hot air balloon, by their politicians.

In fact, the reality is that when political parties in OTs win power the opposite takes place. And one reason O T voters do not want greater autonomy from the UK, is the simple fact that residents want oversight of their politicians, and for very good reason.

"The age for accepting children into the school system is five years of ages in September. Considerations are made if the child is four years old and will be five years old by the end of February the following year. A parent wishing to have their child placed in Kindergarten before the accepted age will need to have the child go through a special examination process to assess if the child is indeed ready for the Kindergarten level," Ms. McMaster said.

Registration for Kindergarten, Grade 6 and homeschooling along with school placement, registration requirements and guidelines were also topics of discussion on the programme.





This Rapid Heartbeat Appears Normal on EKG

DEAR DR. ROACH: I had symptoms of lightheadedness, so my doc-tor ordered an EKG and sent me to a cardiologist. They did a heart monitor for a week and said I have inappropriate sinus tachvcardia but that I don't need any treatment. I'm still having symptoms. What can I do? -

ANSWER: Inappropriate tachycardia is an uncommon diagnosis, most often seen in women in their 30s. The heart rate is fast ("tachycardia"), but on an EKG it appears normal, meaning it comes from the sino-atrial node, the natural pacemaker of the heart, hence "sinus." The average heart rate must be over 90 for 24 hours.

It's important to be sure there isn't another cause for the tachycardia, such as elevated thyroid levels, fever, volume depletion (dehydration) or ane-mia. The symptoms may continue for months or even years. Common symptoms include the lightheadedness you felt, but may also include palpitations, shortness of breath, dizziness decreased ability to exercise.

The diagnosis can sometimes be confused with POTS (postural orthostatic tachycardia syndrome), where the heart rate dramatically increases with changing to an upright position. A tilt-table test is the diagnostic tool for POTS.

If there is no other reason for sinus tachycardia, then medication may be used to reduce symptoms. A beta blocker is the usual first choice, but there are others available.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am a woman going crazy with hair loss. My hair has always been long and thick, but it is coming out in handfuls. I can only think it must be due to my blood pressure medicines. I've been taking amlodipine and lisinopril for years. I'm in good health and 90 years young. — M.

ANSWER: It is unlikely that the hair loss is due to either amlodipine or lisinopril. Neither of these are well described to provoke hair loss, and if a medicine is going to do that, it usually does within a few months.

The most common cause of hair loss in a 90-year-old woman is female pattern hair loss, in which the hair loss is mostly on the front and top of the scalp. However, there are several causes of hair loss, and a dermatologist may be helpful in determining the cause and treatment.

Please don't stop taking your blood pressure medicine.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I have a question about undigested food. Are you getting any nutrients, other than fiber, from foods that come out looking the same as they went in? I'm thinking of foods such as corn and sunflower, flax or chia seeds. How well do they need to be chewed to get

any nutrition from them? — L.W. ANSWER: Many seeds and corn need to be chewed very well in order to be absorbed by the body. They have a large amount of undigestible fiber, which will never be absorbed. Chia seeds, unlike flax or sunflower seeds, are pretty easily digested by most people, but you can grind them and soak them ahead of time to make it easier for your body to digest.

Jamaica Expanding Testing Capacity for Travelers



Jamaica says it is expanding its testing capacity across the island to help visitors comply with the new CDC requirements for returning travelers.

A number of hotels and resorts are already providing on-site testing for guests, and the country's Ministry of Health and Wellness and the Ministry of Tourism are working to set up mobile testing sites within Jamaica's "resilient corridor" on the north coast.

Officials said testing resources would also be added at airports in Montego Bay and Kingston.

Biden: US Buying 200 Million More COVID-19 Vaccine Doses

President Joe Biden said Tuesday the United States was buying 200 million more doses of COVID-19 vaccine to inoculate nearly the entire U.S. population of 300 million people by early fall.

The U.S. has purchased 100 million doses of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine and 100 million of the Moderna vaccine. They will be delivered by the end of summer or early fall, Biden said. With this latest order, the U.S. will have purchased 600 million doses.

"Not in hand yet, but ordered," Biden said.
"We expect these additional 200 million doses to be delivered this summer."

The administration also announced it will be increasing delivery of available vaccines to states for the next three weeks to ramp up vaccination rates. Biden said the administration was increasing doses to states from 8.6 million a week to 10.1 million next week.

Biden also promised to provide states with firm vaccine allocation advisories three weeks ahead of delivery, which should allow state officials to more accurately plan for injections.

There are more than 100 million confirmed cases worldwide of COVID-19, the disease caused by the coronavirus, and more than

2.1 million deaths. The U.S. accounts for nearly a quarter of the cases, at nearly 25.5 million, and has recorded 424,690 deaths, according to Johns Hopkins Coronavirus Resource Center statistics on Tuesday.

Biden, who was sworn into office a week ago, pledged to provide 100 million COVID-19 vaccine shots in his first 100 days in office.

He said during a news conference Tuesday that ending the pandemic would require a "war-time effort."

"More than 400,000 Americans have already died," he said. "This is a war-time undertaking. It's not hyperbole."

Harris vaccinated

Also Tuesday, Vice President Kamala Harris received the second dose of her COVID-19 vaccine.

Both Harris and Biden received their vaccinations on live television to help allay fears about the vaccine.

Biden received his second dose before his swearing-in last week.

Pharmacist to plead guilty

Steven Brandenburg, a Wisconsin pharmacist accused of trying to spoil dozens of vials of COVID-19 vaccine, has agreed to plead guilty in federal court.

Brandenburg, 46, is charged with two counts of attempting to tamper with consumer products. If convicted, he faces a maximum sentence of 10 years and a \$250,000 fine on each count.

Brandenburg was arrested December 31 after police investigated 57 vials — enough

to inoculate more than 500 people — of the Moderna vaccine that had been left outside a refrigerator at a hospital in a Milwaukee suburb.

Jason Baltz, Brandenburg's attorney, declined to comment Tuesday to The Associated Press.

IMF Expects COVID-19 Vaccines to Fuel Global Economic Growth

Increased availability of COVID-19 vaccines is expected to fuel a stronger economic recovery worldwide this year, the International Monetary Fund (IMF) predicted Tuesday.

The global economy will grow 5.5% this year, more than the 5.2% expansion the IMF forecast in October, as the vaccines help contain the spread of the coronavirus, enabling governments to ease lockdown measures that last year led to the worst global economic contraction since World War II.

The IMF's upgraded forecast of a 5.5% global economic expansion this year would mark its fastest year of growth since its sharp 2010 recovery from the financial crisis.

While the vaccines are expected to help power a global economic recovery, the IMF warned that economies worldwide will need support from their governments to offset the damage caused by the pandemic.

The 190-country organization also warns that coronavirus mutations could hinder global economic growth.

Additionally, the IMF's World Economic Outlook update predicts that U.S. President Joe Biden's proposed \$1.9-trillion economic stimulus package could increase U.S. economic output by 5.1% over the next three years after contracting a sharp 3.4% in 2020.

The U.S. economy is the world's largest, followed by China, which the IMF predicts will achieve a record 8.1% growth after a relatively small 2.3% economic spurt in 2020.

The economies of 19 European countries that use the euro currency will jointly expand 4.2% this year after shrinking 7.2% last year, the IMF said. The lending organization also forecasts that the Japanese economy will expand 3.1% after contracting 5.1% in 2020.

The preliminary report indicates India's economy will expand 11.5% this year, faster than any of the other major economies, marking a strong recovery from the economy's 8% decline in 2020.

International trade will grow 8.1% this year after contracting 9.6% in 2020, the IMF said.



Water Service Interruption In The Upper Great Mountain Area


Residents of the Upper Great Mountain area are notified that public water service will be temporarily interrupted from, Saturday, January 30 to Tuesday, February 2.

Caribbean-US relations: chance to merge might with right

Events in Washington on January 20 were a welcome relief and release for the world.

Once Joseph R. Biden took the oath of office as President of the United States and the noon hour struck while Donald Trump

arrived, as a private citizen, at his estate in Florida, leaders and ordinary citizens in every corner of the globe exhaled the collective breath of trepidation they had held for four troubling years.

In his first official acts - the signing of 17 Executive Orders - President Biden dramatically improved relations with the world, including the Caribbean, and gave reason for optimism about the future.

Importantly, the U.S. will re-join the 2015 Paris Climate Change agreement from which Trump withdrew. It should be recalled that the U.S. is one of the world's greatest contributors to global pollution and the harmful effects of climate change.

Writing to Biden, just hours after his swearing-in as the 46th President of the U.S., Antigua and Barbuda's Prime Minister Gaston Browne, as Chair of the 44-nation Alliance of Small Island States, welcomed the new U.S. Government's decision. Browne told Biden: "We are already failing to limit the global average temperature to an increase of 1.5 degree Celsius above pre-industrial levels. It is urgent that: (i) the machinery for global financial flows, including through International Financial Institutions, be adjusted to ensure that every country is served in accordance with its needs; and (ii) resources be provided to allow the most vulnerable countries to adapt to the present alarming conditions and to prepare for future negative occurrences".

This is work that must be an urgent item on the agenda of U.S.-Caribbean discussions, including early contact with former U.S. Secretary of State, John Kerry, who Biden has appointed as his Climate Envoy. Particularly significant for Caribbean countries, in the devastating

epoch of the COVID-19 pandemic, is that the U.S. will not withdraw from the World Health Organization as Trump

had intended. Indeed, Biden is appointing the now renowned Dr. Anthony Fauci, the government's top infectious disease expert, to lead the U.S. delegation. This should mean that the U.S. will play a constructive leadership role.

The matter of making vaccines available to Caribbean countries, that have been allocated numbers that equate to less than 10% of their populations, and an end to hoarding policies by the U.S. and some other countries, are also top priorities for Caribbean-US discussion.

No country will be safe from the Coronavirus if it exists and thrives in any other. Therefore, it is as much in the interest of the U.S. as it is for its neighbouring Caribbean for the minuscule number of vaccines, allocated to the region, to be reviewed and rectified.

President Biden has also mandated the wearing of masks on Federal Government property and installed a coronavirus response coordinator to oversee the efforts to distribute vaccines and medical supplies in the U.S. This is also vital to the Caribbean tourism-reliant countries that need U.S. citizens to be free of the coronavirus and ready to travel as soon as possible. It is a hard task. The problem was allowed to grow out of control, bringing the U.S. to its knees with high infection and death rates. Every encouragement and support should be given to Biden's efforts.

Domestically, the President is also pushing for economic relief including more money for unemployed workers and for safety net programmes, especially Medicaid and unemployment insurance. The revival of the U.S. economy and restoration of employment levels are important to the Region because of tourism, U.S. capacity to purchase Caribbean goods, and remittances from Caribbean nationals in the U.S., many of whom are hardest affected by unemployment.

and the U.S. will also be halted. This is a symbolic acknowledgment that the world needs bridges, not walls. It is a rejection of Trump's unilateralist and bullying posture in foreign policy. On the practical side, since it is the U.S. taxpayers who have been paying for the wall (despite Trump's claims, Mexico did not pay a cent), that money can now be diverted to programmes that will help to stimulate the U.S. economy. A stronger U.S. economy is good for the countries of the region for which the U.S. is their largest trading partner.

One other executive order is notable for the Caribbean. It is the fortification of the policy for Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals, that allows some individuals, unlawfully in the U.S. having entered as children, to enjoy deferred action from deportation and to become eligible for a work permit. Trump's administration had sought to undo those protections. Caribbean nationals will benefit from Biden's action.

President Biden is yet to elaborate fully a Latin American and Caribbean policy. In his many years as a Senator and Vice-President, he gained profound knowledge of the Region. He has a good understanding of its challenges and potential. Trump's Latin American and Caribbean policy was primarily directed at Cuba, Venezuela, and Nicaragua as a sop to their dissidents in Florida whose support he needed for the U.S. Presidential election. Caribbean countries were pawns in that game.

Biden's policies will be broader, aimed at advancing democracy and human rights, but also economic advancement. He knows that without all these things, refugees will continue to gather at U.S. borders.

All Caribbean countries should show willingness to work with Biden, including by trying to influence his Latin American and Caribbean policy as its formulation.

A new era has dawned, it calls for new approaches. The U.S. and the Caribbean might take as the guiding light for their future relations, a line from the gripping poem of the young, African American, Amanda Gorman, at Biden's inauguration: "If we merge mercy with might, and might with right, then love becomes our legacy and change our children's birth right".

MINISTER'S REMARKS COVID-19 VACCINATION AND NEW UK STRAIN

I extend Greetings here in the Virgin Islands, throughout the Region and the World.

Since the declaration of the COVID-19 virus as a Global Pandemic, with the unswerving support of Cabinet, the House of Assembly and the formation of the Health Emergency Operations Center, as Minister for Health and Social Development, with the support of dedicated professionals throughout the public service and the team at the BVI Health Services Authority, we have been managing the COVID-19 situation and response in this Territory.

While this has been a mammoth task, we have remained diligent in our efforts to support you, the people, in our commitment to protecting Lives and Livelihoods. It has been our pledge to inform you every step of the process.

As of 28th January 2021 there are 9 active cases of COVID-19 in the Territory. Our certified laboratory at the Dr. D Orlando Smith Hospital has reported testing of 18,947 persons. Since our last

report on 22 January 2021, 4 new positives have been identified for a total of 141 reported positive cases in the BVI, since the beginning of the pandemic. During the same period 12 cases have recovered for a total recovery of 131cases. The territory has recorded 1 death.

We are NOT OUT OF THE WOODS! VIGILANCE is now the KEY WORD!

As we monitor the COVID-19 situation in the Caribbean and around the World, there remains a serious cause for concern with this dreaded disease. New strains are emerging in several countries, including United Kingdom, South Africa, and Brazil. The lives and the economies of the world are being affected in measurable ways.

Cabinet continues to meet regularly and in emergency sessions as we make several decisions to keep this Territory and you, our people, safe.

That is why in a most recent Cabinet meeting, in light of new strains of COVID-19 being prevalent in South Africa and Brazil, a decision was taken that in addition to the United Kingdom and the Dominican Republic, to implement a travel ban on persons traveling from South Africa and Brazil to the Virgin Islands.

As a reminder, the ban was put in place to promote public safety during the COVID-19 pandemic and does not apply to nationals, Belongers, residents, work permit holders, persons permitted to reside in the Territory, diplomats, and persons employed by Government and Statutory agencies. A 14 days quarantine would be mandatory in these circumstances.

Cabinet has advised the renewal of the curfew Order to 15th February 2021

I will now report on the "COVID-19 VACCINE INTRODUCTION PLAN".

On the 30th of December 2020 the United Kingdom's Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency for supply in the United Kingdom approved AstraZeneca and the University of Oxford/Vaccitechs Covid-19 vaccine candidate AZD1222. A number of Governments around the world including the Virgin Islands have been waiting patiently for the UK regulator to approve the AstraZeneca vaccine given its efficacy and ease of incorporation into existing immunization program infrastructure and the fact that it does not require special considerations for storage, or administration.

This approval was based on independent advice from the Commission on Human Medicines and a review of Phase II data on safety and efficacy.

With this announcement distribution of vaccine within the UK started in the New Year and it is expected that tentatively vaccine will begin to be available in the Territory after its arrival on February 4th 2021.

The UK Government has 100 million doses in total and AstraZeneca is working closely with Public Health England and the National Health Services England to support the deployment of vaccine across the UK and its territories.

The Ministry of Health will therefore work closely with Public Health England, CARPHA and PAHO/WHO to support a comprehensive program in the Territory involving local stakeholders to make the vaccine available on a voluntary basis to residents.

The AstraZeneca vaccine is recommended to be given in two separate doses with an interval of four to twelve weeks between doses. The regimen has been shown to be effective in preventing symptomatic Covid-19, with no severe cases, or hospitalizations more than 14 days after the second dose.

The AstraZeneca, vaccine was co-invented by the University of Oxford and its associated company, Vaccitech and made available at cost. Research studies have shown it to be 70.4% efficient in preventing symptomatic Covid-19 as well as severe disease, or hospitalization with a 90% efficacy in a subgroup receiving a half dose followed by a full dose. The recommended regimen will likely therefore be the half-dose followed by the full-dose regimen with the higher efficacy.

It is approved in persons over 18 years of age and pregnant women are excluded. Studies in these subgroups will continue and approval may be granted in these groups depending on results at a later date. Published safety data indicates that this vaccine is well tolerated and has no serious safety events confirmed related to the

vaccine.

Safety data will continue to be collected and monitored as the vaccine is rolled out world-wide including in the BVI. Work on a national program to make the vaccine available to residents on a purely voluntary basis has started in earnest and will be led by the Ministry of Health and involve collaboration and communication with a wide cross-section of stakeholders across government, private, and non-government sectors.

While there may be vaccine hesitancy initially, communication to address concerns and barriers will be of utmost importance in addition to using innovative strategies to reach and offer vaccine to all targeted populations.

Vaccination of the World's population is an important strategy to end the continued menace of Covid-19 to the World. The Territory must not only do its part in this effort but also for our own sakes to reduce the impact of this pandemic on the Territory, its inhabitants, and our economy. In the coming weeks more information will be forthcoming.

Cabinet has last week approved the appointment of a steering committee for implementation of Covid-19 vaccines in the Territory led in the Ministry of Health by the Chief Medical Officer and involving all the relevant stakeholders in the Public and Private Sector as well as community groups, NGOs and faith-based organization.

A number of key sub-committees of the steering committee have also been appointed to include: a vaccine administration sub-committee charged with managing the distribution of vaccine and training of health care providers,

a communications sub-committee whose responsibility is managing the all communications related to vaccine administration, and a stakeholder and community mobilization which is charged with mobilizing community support and advocacy with respect to vaccine administration in the Territory.

The Government has taken this approach to ensure a comprehensive program of vaccine roll out. The team will begin communicating early and putting plans in place for delivery of vaccine in a phased approach to the public as follows:

Phase 1- Healthcare and frontline workers

Phase 2 - People with underlying conditions that put them at risk of severe COVID-19 disease or death, and persons over 60 years.

Phase 3 - Essential workers at high risk of exposure (eg. teachers, school staff, workers and persons in care homes, shelters, prisoners and prison staff, and hospitality workers)

Phase 4 - Young adults
Phase 5 - All remaining residents

While the Government will adhere to the above it is important to understand that as far as possible all persons who want access to the vaccine must and will be afforded that opportunity.

The Government committed to providing this vaccine without cost to the public through the public health system and also making it available through private providers and will seek to ensure that access through the private sector will be at reasonable cost. Members of the public are asked to remain patient and calm as the committees do their work to ensure a safe and efficient roll-out of vaccine across the Territory.

The first tranches of vaccine donated by the UK Government are expected to arrive in the Territory on February 4th when 8,000 doses of the AstraZeneca AZD1222 will arrive in the Territory.

In keeping with the phased approach vaccine will soon be made available after this. It is expected that future tranches of vaccine will continue to be delivered based on the uptake and disbursement of this initial batch of vaccine.

The Ministry of Health is in the process of reviewing the necessary information systems to allow persons in the general public to register their interest to be vaccinated. Persons are asked to remain patient and it is the intent of the Government to ensure that everyone who wishes to have the vaccine is able to have access to it.

In the coming days and weeks members of the public will hear more about the Covid 19 Vaccination program as the program rolls out and the communication campaign switches into gear.

At this point I would like to publicly thank the members of the health teams for their unflinching dedication and perseverance. These include persons in the Ministry of Health in particular the Public Health Department and Staff of the BVI Health Services Authority. Government is also grateful for the assistance of the UK Government and in particular the staff of the Foreign and Commonwealth Development Office, Public Health England, and Department of Business, Energy & Industrial Strategy of the UK Government for their assistance and generous gift to the people of the Virgin Islands.

To reiterate vaccination is not a magic bullet against Covid-19 but an important weapon in our arsenal to combat the virus and its impact on the Territory and wider global community. While vaccination will reduce the chance of death, severe disease, and hospitalization from Covid 19 it will still be important for us to continue to adhere to social distancing and other protocols.

As the rest of the world immunizes, we here in the BVI need to do our part and immunize ourselves against Covid 19 as well.

Only through ensuring that sufficient persons are immunized against Covid-19 and together with the social distancing and other protocols can the world not only reduce the impact of this virus but begin to think about its eventual elimination.

With widespread immunization

globally but in particular in the BVI can we begin to think about returning to some degree of normalcy and restoring our society and economy from the ravages of Covid 19

The Ministry of Health is also mindful of concerns surrounding new variants of Covid-19 identified around the World and in particular the United Kingdom. The regional public health agency CARPHA has established the capacity to conduct typing of Covid-19 strains.

The BVI has therefore already identified samples to be sent for special genetic typing along with other countries in the region for the purpose of identifying circulating strains in the Territory and the region. The new strain is currently thought to cause more infections and not necessarily more severe disease. Current evidence is that PCR testing, treatments, and vaccine are unchanged as compared to the other circulating strains.

However, if introduced into the Territory it has the potential to cause more disease and greater strain on already tight resources. Numerous countries have already taken the decision to restrict air traffic and entry of persons from the United Kingdom.

The Caribbean Public Health Agency CARPHA recently wrote to all member states highlighting the impact of new variants of Covid 19 on the Caribbean. Since the emergence of the UK variant at least six other variants have emerged and have been identified in 60 countries globally.

CARPHA therefore has urging strongly member states to enhance community surveillance and the implementation of public health control measures including quarantine and isolation, wearing face masks coverings, physical and distancing, hand sanitizing, and avoidance of crowds and gatherings.

CARPHA also reminds countries that while most cases of Covid are mild this can easily result in cases spreading quietly in the community and then resulting in a sudden increase in hospitalization and deaths. It is therefore important for countries to remain vigilant and ensure adequate surveillance and control of areas where persons may congregate and gatherings.

The Ministry of Health continues to urge residents to adhere to the established protocols of social distancing, hand hygiene, and other established protocols for the prevention of Covid 19 infection in the Territory.

I wish to admonish everyone to please remember to take COVID-19 seriously! Wash your hands, sanitise, wear your mask, and keep your distance.

These protocols have now become an essential of our everyday lives.

Let us reduce the impact of the COVID-19 virus. With widespread immunization globally, in the Virgin Islands we welcome this opportunity to help eradicate COVID-19.

I wish to also remind persons to contact the COVID (Medical) Hotline at 852-7650 to be assessed by a health professional if you experience any symptoms related to COVID-19. Common symptoms include – fever, cough, headache, fatigue, loss of taste or smell, sore throat, muscle aches, or difficulty breathing.

Thank you for your attention and your full cooperation.

May GOD continue to bless our People and these beautiful Virgin Islands.

Britain Refuses EU's Demand for Vaccine Doses

A vaccine war has erupted between Britain and the European Union with Brussels demanding that tens of millions of COVID-19 vaccine doses earmarked for Britain, and made by a British pharmaceutical company, be diverted to Europe to make up for a shortfall in promised deliveries.

The demand marks a sharp political turn in a dispute between the EU and drug company AstraZeneca, as well as underscoring the mounting risks of vaccine nationalism. It was triggered after the pharmaceutical giant announced it would have to cut vaccine doses scheduled for delivery to Europe before the end of March from 80 million to 31 million.

The reduction will add woes to an EU inoculation program that has gotten off to a sluggish and at times chaotic start, with only two doses being administered so far for every 100 Europeans, compared to seven in America and 11 in Britain.

Bureaucratic missteps and a shortage of vaccine doses have prompted frustration across the continent. Hungary is planning to break ranks with other EU countries to order supplies of Russia's Sputnik V vaccine, which has not been authorized by EU medicine regulators.

Brussels's health commissioner Stella Kyriakides midweek said that as AstraZeneca is blaming production challenges at factories in Europe for the shortfall on contracted doses, supplies manufactured by the drug company in Britain should be redirected to Europe. The British government's order for doses predates the contract the EU signed with AstraZeneca by three months.

"We reject the logic of 'first come, first served' — that may work at the neighborhood butchers but not in contracts," she said Wednesday. After a meeting with AstraZeneca, Kyriakides said she regretted "the continued lack of clarity on the delivery schedule" and expects "the fast delivery of the quantity of vaccines that we reserved."

AstraZeneca says it has outlined the "complexities of scaling up production" of the vaccine but will "continue our efforts to bring this vaccine to millions of Europeans

at no profit during the pandemic."

British ministers had until Thursday tried to stay out of the argument between the EU and the pharmaceutical giant, but the EU demand for the diversion of doses has prompted a political and media outcry in Britain, deepening the post-Brexit conflict.

British tabloid front pages expressed outrage. "WAIT YOUR TURN! SELFISH EU WANTS OUR VACCINES," announced the Daily Express. Tabloid rival the Daily Mail headline said: "NO, EU CAN'T HAVE OUR JABS!"

The deepening argument also has prompted threats from EU lawmakers to block exports of Pfizer's vaccine from its production facility in Belgium destined for Britain. A senior German MEP raised the prospects of a "trade war" between Britain and the EU.

Peter Liese, a member of the European Parliament's health committee, told Euronews that European citizens were being "treated as second class by a UK-based company." He added: "the company and the UK better think twice."

The risk of vaccine nationalism was highlighted Tuesday by the World Health Organization's director-general, but his focus was on the vaccine divide between rich and poor countries.

"With every day that passes, the divide grows larger between the world's haves and have-nots," Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said in remarks at a WHO executive board meeting in Geneva.

But the dispute between Britain and the EU has underscored that bouts of vaccine nationalism can also break out between wealthy countries, too, which are desperate to get as many of their citizens vaccinated as soon as possible.

Britain's inoculation program is off to a flying start. Britain has vaccinated about 13 percent of its adults, while the EU average is barely over two percent, and the gap is growing. British regulatory authorities were quicker in approving vaccines and were ahead in signing contacts with a variety of suppliers.

Logistical missteps and hidebound bureaucracy have marred the EU's vaccine strategy, say critics, prompting public frustration with the pace of inoculations. Some of the problems have been country-specific but there are mounting doubts about the EU's collective bloc approach to procurement and distribution of vaccines.

Brussels had hoped a vaccination program arranged under EU auspices would advertise the strength of a collective strategy and reduce the danger of vaccine rivalry between the 27 member states. But earlier this year one of the scientists who developed the Pfizer vaccine, Ugur Sahin, warned the rollout was "not looking rosy" in Europe and, aside from the sluggish start in several European states, he raised the possibility of a medium-term shortfall in stockpiles of the vaccine.

He questioned the reasoning behind the EU ordering just 300 million doses of the vaccine — enough for about a third of the bloc's 450 million people — and declining to order more. "The process in Europe certainly didn't proceed as quickly and straightforwardly as with other countries," Sahin told Germany's Der Spiegel magazine.

EU officials have cautioned that public expectations are in some ways too high and people need to be more patient, though they acknowledge people are yearning for an end to lockdowns and a return to their normal lives. But critics say the EU program has not been efficient.

Hungarian Prime Minister Viktor Orban has been especially harsh, saying recently he was "not happy with the pace." He told Hungarian radio "there were manufacturers whose products were available sooner in Canada, the UK."

Orban added, "We're unable to move faster with inoculating people not because Hungarian health care is incapable of carrying out mass vaccinations rapidly but because we have a shortage of vaccine supplies."

Separately, it emerged Thursday that Germany is now advising against giving the AstraZeneca vaccine to people over the age of 65. Germany's vaccine committee made the recommendation, saying it was not satisfied with data about the effectiveness of the vaccine for older people and not because of any safety worries.

British officials insist that Britain's vaccine order should not be impacted by the EU's troubles with deliveries.

"I think we need to make sure that the vaccine supply that has been bought and paid for, procured for those in the UK, is delivered," Michael Gove, a senior minister told London's LBC radio station.

"Our priority has to be making sure that the people in our country who are vulnerable and who we have been targeted for vaccination, receive those jobs in those arms." Gove said there can be no interruption to Britain's inoculation program.

Antigua and Barbuda calls for urgent and equitable release of vaccines

Washington, Antigua and Barbuda's Ambassador to the Organization of American States (OAS), Sir Ronald Sanders, has called for "urgent and equitable release of COVID-19 vaccines, especially for small states.

Ambassador Sanders was speaking at a meeting of the Permanent Council after presentation by representatives of the Pan American Health Organisation (PAHO) that he descried as 'chilling".

Sanders told the representatives of 33 countries that tourism dependent Caribbean countries, such as Antigua and Barbuda, have been among the hardest hit. "In the tourism dependent countries such as mine, the economic situation is dire", he said.

Ambassador Sanders told the OSAS that Caribbean countries "have neither the financial resources nor the capacity to continue this desperate fight without relief".

Adding that, "Unlike developed countries our central banks cannot print money to provide relief and stimulus", he declared "We need vaccines to inoculate our people and provide some level of immunity. Yet, all that we have been able to secure is small numbers that will not immunise more than 10 per cent of our populations".

Sanders quoted UN Secretary-General António Guterres in saying that "what is needed now is the largest and most rapid deployment of vaccines the world has ever seen, reaching everybody, everywhere".

Pointing out that vaccines are quickly reaching high-income countries, while the world's poorest have none at all, Sanders called on the OAS Secretary-General, Luis Almagro, to take "a front and centre position in advocating this matter", and he urged the member states of the OAS to support him "by all means necessary". "Hundreds of thousands of lives are at stake", he concluded.

Joseph Robinette Biden, Jr. was sworn in as the 46th president of the United States on the steps of the U.S. Capitol on January 20.

In his inaugural address, President Biden called on all Americans to unite to overcome the nation's challenges and secure its future.

"History, faith, and reason show the way, the way of

unity. We can see each other not as adversaries but as neighbors. We can treat each other with dignity and respect. We can join forces, stop the shouting, and lower the temperature...This is our historic moment of crisis and challenge, and unity is the path forward."

To those beyond the borders of the United States, President Biden also had a message:

"We will repair our alliances and engage with the world once again. Not to meet with yesterday's challenges, but today's and tomorrow's. We will lead not merely by the example of our power, but the power of our example. We will be a strong and trusted partner for peace, progress and security."

Later that day, President Biden took several executive actions with those goals in mind. One action began the process for the United States to rejoin the Paris climate accord. Another stopped U.S. withdrawal from the World Health Organization. Another rescinds the ban on travelers from some Muslim-majority countries and others from Africa and elsewhere. Yet another pauses construction of the U.S.-Mexico border wall and ends an emergency declaration that helped authorize its funding.

In his inauguration address, President Biden called on the people of the United States "to start afresh." He challenged them together to "write an American story of hope, not fear; of unity and not division...The story that tells ages yet to come that we answered the call of history... New Acting USAGM Chief Begins Undoing Predecessor's Policies

WASHINGTON - Moving swiftly on her first day as acting CEO of the U.S. Agency for Global Media, iournalist Kelu Chao oversaw the removal of the top executive at the Voice of America, reversing widely criticized appointment by her Trumpappointed predecessor, Michael Pack.

Robert Reilly, whom Pack appointed as director of Voice of America in December, was removed along with his deputy, Elizabeth Robbins. Yolanda Lopez, former VOA news director whom Reilly reassigned last week, was named acting director of VOA.

With his departure, Reilly made history as the first VOA director to have stood down twice, serving little more than a year during two appointments that were 20 years apart.

USAGM emailed staff about the changes Thursday, also confirming that President Joe Biden had selected Chao, a highly regarded veteran of VOA, as acting CEO of USAGM, the parent organization. Pack resigned Wednesday after the new Democratic administration informed him that he would be removed. Brian Conniff, former president of the Middle East Broadcasting Networks, was named Chao's deputy.

The announcement added that Jeffrey Shapiro had resigned as director of the Office of Cuba Broadcasting.

Chao, a veteran broadcast journalist who has worked for more than 40 years at Voice of America and the agency, is the first woman to hold the top position at USAGM.

In her acting role, Chao will oversee USAGM's networks and grantees that include VOA, Radio Free Asia, Radio Free Europe/Radio Liberty, the Office of Cuba Broadcasting, Middle East Broadcasting Networks, and the internet freedom nonprofit, the Open Technology Fund. The announcement said Biden

was expected to nominate a permanent CEO soon.

Reilly's appointment raised criticism and concern among lawmakers.

48 At least current and former journalists had called for Reilly and Robbins to resign last week, charging that they had violated the network's journalism code by giving a senior government official "a free platform to speak live on our channels." They also cited the abrupt reassignment of White House correspondent Patsy Widakuswara.

Widakuswara was moved to the Indonesian Service, where she started her career at VOA, after attempting to question then-Secretary of State Mike Pompeo over current news events after a speech delivered in the VOA auditorium.

She also confronted Reilly about why he had not used a question-andanswer period afterward to pose questions submitted by newsroom journalists on controversial matters.

of Footage her with Reilly exchange shows the director telling Widakuswara she "not authorized" to ask questions and chastising her for not knowing how to behave. She had followed Pompeo out of the VOA building, calling auestions.

Lawmakers and former USAGM officials said last month that Reilly's public comments and his published books expressing controversial views about homosexuals and Muslims risked causing irreparable harm to the network's credibility and reputation. When he arrived as VOA

director in December, Reilly told staff his previous writings were "irrelevant" to his official duties.

Eliot Engel, then the chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, disagreed and described Reilly's appointment as a "disgrace and an embarrassment."

"VOA journalists shouldn't have to endure the reputational harm of having to work for someone with views so backward and out of step with American values," Engel, a Democrat from New York, said in a December statement.

USAGM provided no explanation for Reilly's firing.

'It must be transparent' Pack's tenure as the first chief executive of USAGM was tumultuous and led to several whistleblower complaints, an order from the Office of Special Counsel to investigate allegations of mismanagement and separate court orders barring him and his aides from interfering in VOA editorial decisions installing appointees at the Open Technology Fund, respectively.

Chao testified in the lawsuit alleging editorial interference.

The former CEO said in interviews he was trying to resolve long-standing security lapses and issues of bias.

David Seide, senior counsel of the nonprofit Government Accountability Project, which represents more than 20 whistleblowers at VOA, welcomed the change in leadership.

e said the agency should move to reinstate Widakuswara and any other individual found to have been improperly suspended or removed and investigate allegations of mismanagement.

"There must be an accounting for what has happened over the past six months. It must be transparent. New leadership's support will be critical. I am confident they will provide it," Seide said.

During Pack's tenure last year, lawmakers weakened the CEO position by introducing more checks and balances into the National Defense Authorization Act.

The changes will prevent the CEO or federal employees from serving on any grantee board. They will also give the board power to advise the agency head to ensure the integrity and independence of the networks is respected and to approve appointments or dismissals of network heads.

The boards will also need to be bipartisan, and the members must have a relevant background in journalism, technology, broadcasting or diplomacy.

The changes could affect a new conservative board appointed by Pack before his departure this week. On January 19, he announced new conservative members for the network boards that he had earlier dissolved, including Roger contributor Simon, a The **Epoch** Times to who falsely described January's deadly insurrection at the U.S. Capitol as a "false flag" operation, and Christian Whiton, who has defended Russia's annexation Crimea.



HOLLYWOOD — In the late 1950s, when major film studios were losing patrons to television, they were desperate to come up with ways to get moviegoers away from their TVs and back into theaters. Among their brainstorms were CinemaScope, Stereophonic Sound, Scratch & Sniff (a card you sniffed for an enhanced viewing experience) and, of course, 3D. They even wired seats to give shocks during horror films.

More recently, movie distributors reinvented 3D, and with IMAX got moviegoers away from their TVs, computers and other electronic devices. With theater closures because of the pandemic, movie studios began releasing films, such as Warner Brothers' "Wonder Woman 1984," to theaters overseas, in the U.S. at drive-ins and on streaming platforms. 

Scientists tackle vaccine safety, efficacy



More than 2,800 scientists from 130 countries gathered in a virtual forum hosted by the World Health Organization (WHO) to identify knowledge gaps and set research priorities for vaccines against SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19.

They discussed the safety and efficacy of existing vaccines and new candidates, ways to optimize limited supply, and the need for additional safety studies.

"The development and approval of several safe and effective vaccines less than a year after this virus was isolated and sequenced is an astounding scientific accomplishment," said Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, WHO Director-General, in his opening remarks. "The approval of the first few vaccines does not mean the job is done. Far from it. More vaccines are in the pipeline, which must be evaluated to ensure we have enough doses to vaccinate

everyone."

More than 30 million vaccine doses have already been administered in 47 mostly high-income countries. But the global vaccine rollout has exposed glaring inequalities in access to this life-saving tool.

"The spirit of collaboration has to prevail in these challenging times as we seek to understand this virus," said Dr John Nkengasong, Director of the Africa Centres for Disease Control and Prevention. "We have to be mindful of the inequalities and we must deliberately promote investment in regional capacities to level the playing field and have meaningful collaboration to begin to address some of the challenges."

Experts agreed the need for critical research on administering vaccines in different target populations, as well as on vaccination delivery strategies and schedules. This includes trials, modelling

and observational studies, all of which would help to inform policy.

They discussed the impact of emerging SARS-CoV-2 variants on the efficacy of vaccines, the impact of vaccines on transmission of infection, and the need to develop the next generation of vaccine platforms.

"The world needs multiple vaccines that work in different populations in order to meet global demand and end the COVID-19 outbreak. Ideally, those will be single-dose vaccines that do not require cold chain, could be delivered without a needle and syringe and are amenable to large-scale manufacture," said Professor Mike Levine, Founder and Former Director of the Center for Vaccine Development at the University of Maryland School of Medicine,

The meeting concluded with agreement to establish a WHO-hosted platform for global sharing and coordination of emerging vaccine research information on efficacy and safety. The forum would enable scientists to share and discuss unpublished and published data and research protocols to further our collective understanding of SARS-CoV-2 vaccines.

"The WHO will regularly convene experts from around the world, promote collaborative research, provide standard protocols and develop a platform for sharing the latest knowledge in the field," said Dr Soumya Swaminathan, WHO Chief Scientist. [Source: WHO]
