RATED PROGRAMME DESCRIBED AS "MERELY A PLASTER"

The-Apprenticeship Training Employment and Development (RATED) Programme which Premier and Minister for Finance Dr. the Hon. Natalio Wheatley continues to speak fondly of has been given an average grade by members of the Opposition, Deputy Speaker Hon. Stacy Mather, and Sixth District Representative Hon. Myron Walwyn.

Back in November 2022, the RATED Programme was launched to provide three pathways for persons between the age of 18 to 65 who are unemployed or under-employed to obtain opportunities through short term employment, apprenticeship and/or education and training, development.

However during a recent House of Assembly both Hon. Mather and Hon. Walwyn explained that more needs to be done to empower out of work Virgin Islanders. Territory's-At-Large

Representative Hon. Mather voiced his concerns about the RATED programme stating: wholeheartedly am dedicated to the well-being of all young people and was pleased to see that the RATED programme has been allocated a budget of over a million dollars."

"Nevertheless, it was disconcerting during the committee stages of the HOA] to learn that much of the employment opportunities provided by the programme are primarily manual labour, such as bush cutting," he added.

The Deputy Speaker acknowledged the need for employment, and urged the government to focus on creating programmes that not only employ the youth but also provide career progression.

The first term legislator opined that there exist other opportunities within the Territory that could offer a superior quality of life to

the youth, ensuring they feel included and hopeful within the Territory.

He further proposed that the young population should be reassured that they do not live in a Territory where wealth is circulated among only a select few.

In a similar vein, Hon. Walwyn acknowledged the purpose, but nonetheless referred to the RATED programme as a 'temporary fix,' arguing that it does not adequately address the employment issues of the Territory.

Walwyn indicated that these are serious unemployment problems, not only in his District but across the Territory, and felt that not enough was being done to rectify this situation.

"I acknowledged in [the HOA's] committee that the RATED programme is a decent beginning, but I firmly believe it falls short

in tackling the country's unemployment crisis. It's merely a plaster," the Sixth District Representative noted.

He further pointed out that more is required to meet the employment goal set out in the Programme mandate. "What we need is a more encompassing u n e m p l o y m e n t programme that ensures people a fair opportunity to kickstart their careers, whether in the private or government sector."

Hon. Walwyn also announced that the programme only provides temporary-financial relief for six months. He concluded by saying: "If a job isn't found within this timeframe, you're back to the drawing board. It's crucial that we reassess this programme."

will There be no artist ban! This was the confirmation given Premier and Minister for Finance Dr. the Hon. Natalio Wheatley following days of public speculation after a suggestion was made by a local clergyman that some of the artists on the 2023 Festival Lineup do not sing music that are wholesome for the Territory.

During a press conference the Premier stated that he will not implement measures to censor or prohibit a specific artist expected to perform at the forthcoming August Festival celebrations.

The Premier's confirmation essentially brought to an end a public debate that emerged over whether two alleged controversial performers - Byron Messia and Peanut Da Real Nut - should be

given the stage at the festival due to their lyrics which a clergyman publicly declared was violent and in bad taste following the recent spike in gun violence and homicides in the Territory.

While addressing the matter the BVI Leader stated: "The Festival Committee chooses artists based on who the audience enjoys listening to. Already, there's an exciting buzz surrounding the entertainment for the event."

"I tread cautiously around the subject of censorship. Nearly every artist — the majority of those who grace our Festival stage, both past and present, foreign and local — will have lyrical content that might not resonate with everyone," the Premier added.

Meanwhile, -Hon.
Wheatley called for an extensive community dialogue about the entertainment content consumed and the actual preferences of the audience since they are the ones attending to listen to the performers.

He drew parallels with TV shows such as Power and violent video games like Call of Duty and Grand Theft Auto, noting that individuals make personal choices to consume such content.

"I am not in a position to censor anyone or pass moral judgments. There are numerous individuals who can rationalize the type of reality depicted in some of the lyrics," added Premier Wheatley.

He further asserted his ongoing commitment to advocating for unity against crime and supporting the police's efforts to discourage individuals from engaging in criminal activities; and called for proactive measures in schools, community groups, and other fora to promote a positive narrative.

Hon. Wheatley concluded by saying: "Ultimately, individuals have the freedom to choose what they consume. And I would encourage everyone to, as I strive to do, let positive ideas and thoughts influence their minds."

Partnership For Peace Programme Commences Its 20th Cycle

The 20th cycle for the Office of Gender Affairs Partnership for Peace (PfP): A Violence Intervention Programme commenced earlier this month.

Director of Gender Affairs Ms. Patricia Hackett said the programme has been one of the flagship initiatives that her office has implemented over the last fourteen years to maintain its zero-tolerance for domestic violence in the Virgin Islands. She said since its inception, over one hundred and fifty men have benefited from the programme.

Ms. Hackett said, "It is a psycho-educational programme to encourage and support men in achieving a violence-free lifestyle and is based on a 16-session curriculum called Partnership for Peace (UNIFEM Manual, 2009). It is also a court based connected programme where all referrals come from the Magistrates' Court."

The aim of this cycle is to stop violence in participants' lives, help them to understand that violence is a choice and to accept responsibility for their behavior, chose new behaviors that are free of violence, and teach participants skills for addressing conflicts when responding to stress.

The programme was in partnership with the United Nations Development Fund for Women (UNIFEM) now United Nations Entity for Gender Equality and the Empowerment of Women, (UNWOMEN) where they provided technical and financial support for its development.

The Gender Affairs Coordinator acts as the Programme Director for the violence intervention programme which is also supported by UNWOMEN trained facilitators, Clinical Supervisors and a Programme Coordinator. Each session runs for two hours and the curriculum is delivered by a male and a female facilitator. The classes are also observed by the Clinical Supervisor throughout the cycle.

Ms. Hackett said her office continues to work towards a Virgin Islands where gender equality and equity are at the forefront of the minds of every resident and visitor. "The Ministry of Health and Social Development remains committed to a life free of violence for all and improving on the established conversations and actions surrounding gender equality and equity," she added.

The Partnership for Peace programme has also been implemented in other Caribbean countries including Grenada, Jamaica, St. Lucia and Trinidad and Tobago.

The Office of Gender Affairs continues to promote and conduct programmes that will assist in building healthy and non-violent intimate partner relationships between men and women in the Virgin Islands.

"American Airlines is here in the BVI because it aligns with their interests": Hon Walwyn says

Sixth District Representative Hon. Myron Walwyn, while applauding the government's recent agreement with American Airlines, has declared that it's time to move past the initial excitement of the achievement.

Amidst great celebration and fanfare American Airlines recently launched its direct flights to the BVI from Miami, USA. However, Hon. Walwyn is urging the government to shift its attention to airport development as the facility is linked to job creation and various significant aspects of the economy.

"Even with the arrival of these flights, we should avoid complacency – and initiate the airport development work. I haven't observed anything in this SAP (supplementary budget) substantial enough to direct us toward our goal," the Sixth District Representative recently asserted in the House of Assembly.

He continued: "Take, for example, Dominica — they are constructing a new airport concurrently with Sandals' \$200 million investment. They are also expanding their existing airport. So, while they are extending their current airport and building a new one, we can't even manage to gather a teaspoon of sand on Beef Island."

Hon. Walwyn also clarified that despite the government's

outreach to American Airlines, the airline decided to operate in the BVI because it was in their interest. For this reason, he advised that once the initial thrill fades, the government should return its focus to the matters of importance in the BVI.

"The reality is that American Airlines is here in the BVI because it aligns with their interests. Their budget for the last quarter surpasses the entire annual budget of the BVI. We can't command American Airlines to come here, they will only arrive if it suits them. Indeed, the Minister reached out, and we commend him for that, but the decision to reenter the Caribbean was a

strategic move by American Airlines," the Sixth District Representative added.

In response to Walwyn's remarks, Premier Wheatley insisted that credit should not be detracted from the Minister responsible for ports, Kye Rymer, who secured the historic deal, especially because previous BVI administrations were unsuccessful in establishing direct flights to the Territory.

"Past administrations were unsuccessful in acquiring air access from Miami — which serves as a hub for America. Attempts were made but ultimately proved fruitless, and that's all I'll comment

regarding those attempts. The runway expansion efforts were also unsuccessful. It's a significant challenge, but we aim to stay humble and assert that we'll do our best," Premier Wheatley stated.

SAME SEX MARRIAGE REFERENDUM POSTPONED

The same sex referendum which was touted by government as the way forward in addressing the pressing matter of same sex unions in the Territory has been delayed. The decision was mentioned by Premier and Minister for Finance Dr. the Hon. Natalio Wheatley.

Premier Wheatley during a press conference on 25 July stated that certain matters have caused the delay. He explained: "We are committed to the referendum moving forward. was a legislative challenge as it pertains to the voting machines in terms of the length of time that the ballots have to remain within the machines before you can remove them and we are going to have to solve that challenge to be able to have use of the machines."

The decision to hold the referendum came in light of recent legal challenges questioning the constitutionality of Section 13(1)(c) of the Matrimonial

Proceedings and Property Act, No. 6 of 1995, which declares marriages between parties of the same sex as void. As such on 30 June a resolution for the BVI's first referendum was gazetted. "It would be wise to update the BVI Constitution to the new millennium...also what about Human Rights?? And the discrimination against LGBT individuals born here or living here?? They are more than you think - like it or not. Is the BVI living in the dark ages?": a gay activist told this newspaper.

Under the provisions of the Referendum Act, No. 9 of 2002, the Cabinet has the authority to refer matters of Territorial importance to the electorate for determination through a referendum. Recognizing the complex and sensitive nature of the same-sex marriage issue, the Cabinet deemed it necessary to seek public opinion on the matter. "It sounds like Pontius Pilate talk," the gay activist said.


The referendum, which government said will be done shortly aims to gauge the electorate's views and guide the government on the potential legalization of same-sex marriage or the establishment of civil unions or domestic partnerships for same-sex couples.

The resolution, which has been presented to the House of Assembly, outlines two crucial questions that will be posed to voters during the referendum. The first question will inquire whether individuals are in favor of legalizing samesex marriage in the Virgin Islands. The second question focuses on the preference for legislation that would provide for civil unions or domestic partnerships. These unions would grant samesex couples various rights, privileges, and benefits, encompassing areas such as property rights, healthcare, employment, and social security survivors benefits.

By conducting the

referendum, the government seeks to demonstrate its commitment to involving the people of the Virgin Islands in decisions that impact their lives. The referendum will serve as a platform for public engagement, allowing citizens to express their opinions and shape

the government's approach to same-sex marriage. The outcome of the referendum will guide the government's potential legislative intervention and reform, ensuring that the wishes and concerns of the populace are duly considered.

Bill Seeks to Establish Virgin Islands Shipping and Maritime Authority

The Virgin Islands Shipping and Maritime Authority Act, 2023 had its first reading in the House of Assembly on June 29.

The Bill makes provisions for the Government of the Virgin Islands to establish the Shipping and Maritime Authority in efforts to enhance the operations and the viability of the Virgin Islands' ships register, and its related products and services.

The Authority will be tasked with directing, managing and controlling the Territory's maritime affairs to ensure optimal performance, underpinned by robust decision-making policies towards maintaining a quality flag.

According to the Bill, the establishment of an autonomous Board is in alignment with global flags international standards and in accordance with the Red Ensign Group of flags, in which Cayman Islands, Bermuda and Isle of Mann operate as statutory boards.

Director of the Virgin Islands Shipping Registry, Mr. John Samuel stated, "The Virgin Islands Shipping and Maritime Authority's overall function will involve utilising strategies to analyse the market, and using the information to respond appropriately."

Mr. Samuel said, "The Shipping Registry's success depends on its ability not only to gain entry into the key global shipping and global markets, but also to achieve a sustained competitive presence, through employing the relevant strategies."

The Bill indicates that the transition will promote the self-generating revenue levels that will enhance the Territory's company registration for the ownership and operation of shipping companies, and



will increase the overall marketability of the Virgin Islands as a maritime tourism destination.

Ultimately, -the establishment of the Authority will further the Government of the Virgin Islands' objectives of economic diversification and expanding the revenuegenerating capacities of the Territory.

According to the Bill, "The appointment and installation of a Board will decentralise the-responsibilities of management and leadership. Hence, legally the ultimate responsibility for international maritime compliance, regulation of the BVI maritime waters, and the efficient and effective operation of the commercial registry product will rest with the governing Board.

The Board will function like an autonomous corporate entity that will be required to report to the Premier through the Chairperson of the Board. In addition, the Board will be required to submit an annual report to the Premier, and prepare and submit its annual budget to the Premier for approval.

status will separate VISR from the Central Government administration. Operating under a Management Board will provide several advantages, which include: the Authority's ability to manage its finances more effectively;the Authority's release from some of the bureaucratic hurdles it now experiences in such areas as hiring mandatory and critical technical staff, employee continuing education and programme development;

the Authority's ability to keep pace with its Red Ensign peers and to support the BVI as a maritime state in maintaining mandatory international maritime standards;

having a mix of people from the public and private sector bringing new perspectives to the policy management and operations of the Authority; the Authority's ability to be proactive and respond more quickly to changes in the local, regional and international maritime arenas; and allowing more flexibility in its operations as a commercial business entity, thereby enabling its ability to negotiate with potential clients when required to attract increased business and overall volume to the flag.

Currently, the Virgin Islands Shipping Registry is a Government department operating under the Premier's Office.


Persons are being encouraged to read the draft Bill and submit feedback by August 4 to premieroffice@gov.vg, ahead of the second reading at the next sitting of the House of Assembly.

Film And Online Survey Support Vi Turtle Conservation

Turtle conservation in the Virgin Islands will receive support through the launch of a film and an online survey by the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries in conjunction with the Marine Conservation Society.

The film titled, "Turtles in the Virgin Islands: Balancing conservation and culture", is a documentary style production previously launched by the conservation society to observe World Sea Turtle Day on June 16. The film was also shown at a series of workshops locally.

Director of the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries Mr. Theodore James said the workshops hosted by his department involved over 150 participants discussing the future of sea turtle conservation and use in the Virgin Islands. He said the sessions enabled the department to ascertain the views of the community on turtle fishing and conservation.

Mr. James said, "The online survey continues to collect these local views and values which we will take into account along with social and biological scientific evidence to inform legislative changes we are planning this year. Persons who are interested in sea turtles are invited to view this informative film which also touches on the Virgin Islands' culture, its marine spaces and the wild life it supports."

Mr. James, further encouraged the Virgin Islands community to take the short survey to ensure that their voices are heard.

Meanwhile, Dr Shannon Gore from the Association of Reef Keepers (ARK) said sea turtle research has been carried out in the Virgin Islands consistently for over two decades and that there are significant changes in the numbers of the species.

Dr. Gore added, "During that time, there has also been a lot of controversy over the turtle fishery. The Sustaining Turtles, Environment Economies and Livelihoods (STEEL) project seeks to improve turtle conservation in the Virgin Islands while taking into consideration local culture and values associated with turtle use."

The Association of Reef Keepers has coordinated the project biological research such as turtle tagging and habitat surveys with the support of the Department of Agriculture and the University of Exeter, while the Marine Conservation Society has coordinated the social science using their Community Voice Method which engages communities in conservation issues through film and workshops.

The conservation society has run similar processes to reform turtle fisheries in the Turks and Caicos Islands and Montserrat and has filmed interviews with community members across the Virgin Islands to produce the documentary.

VI Charting Way Towards Standards For Diabetes Care

The Ministry of Health and Social Development is charting the way towards improved health outcomes for people living with diabetes with the launch of care guidelines.

Minister for Health and Social Development, Honourable Vincent Wheatley said during the launch that diabetes is on the rise in the Territory and the age of those affected is trending downward. He said that there is an expectation to see an increase in numbers unless lifestyle changes are made. "Diabetes is very prevalent in our community and the saddest part of the situation is that it is preventable," the Minister said.

Honourable Wheatley added, "I am very pleased to see that we have started the process towards standardising the way we manage this disease and I encourage all participants necessary for a successful implementation to do their part to ensure that this initiative is a success."

Chief Medical Officer (CMO) Dr. Ronald Georges said there is very strong understanding among the health care professionals about the need and benefits of standardising care that will ultimately result in better diabetes control, outcomes and quality of life for those living with the disease.

He acknowledged that getting the buy-in from the community in all sectors affected will be a mammoth task but that the team is ready for the challenge.

Dr. Georges outlined that the launching of the guidelines is just the beginning as clinicians would have to be educated continuously about the standard of care that is expected to be upheld with regards to persons living with diabetes.

Dr. Georges added that there are collaborations that have to be formed with nonprofit organisations, farmers, supermarkets other government departments and patients and caregivers.

"This will take some time



to be integrated using this multi-sectorial approach, but we are confident once done all of society will benefit," the CMO explained. He added, "We will achieve our objective of helping persons living with diabetes to live a more empowered and satisfying life with better health outcomes."

The Guidelines for the Management of Diabetes in Primary Care were launched on Thursday July 20 and welcomed healthcare professionals from the private and public sector as well as a vested group of about 50 consistent viewers online. Interested persons can visit Government's Facebook page @BVIGovernment to view the launch broadcast.

The Ministry of Health and Social Development is committed to protecting and promoting the health of the people of the Virgin Islands.

Bvi Electricity Corporation Addressing Generator Issues

Minister for Communication and Works Honourable Kye Rymer has said that the British Virgin Islands Electricity Corporation (BVIEC) is working assiduously to restore its power generating capacity to optimum levels, to adequately meet the needs of the Territory.

Honourable Rymer gave the

assurance that the technical and operational issues that are affecting the reliability of the electrical power supply, and which are also affecting the water supply, are receiving the highest priority attention from the Government and the corporation.

Minister Rymer said, "Providing reliable and dependable utilities to the Territory is paramount to everyone. We appreciate that the current issues are inconveniencing the public. This includes interruption of the water supply. For this, we apologise. We are working tirelessly to resolve the issues, but we need the public to bear with us while the solution is put in place."

General Manager at the BVI Electricity Corporation Dr. Neil Smith said one of the largest generators at the plant is being overhauled while another has been experiencing issues with its governor that has to be rectified by specialists from the manufacturers.

Dr. Smith added, "Another smaller generating set has been unoperational and awaiting assembly. Complicating matters even further is the fact that power consumption in the Territory is currently at the highest levels that it has ever been. Coping with the situation has forced the corporation and some of our public partners, to take steps to manage the load on the system so that we can maintain general power to the Territory."

The General Manager said the Seven Seas desalination plant consumes 4 Megawatts of energy when operating at full capacity and that in order to regulate the load on the power system, it has become necessary for the desalination plant to be taken offline for certain periods. He said during these times,

water production is interrupted and its supply to customers is impacted.

"We appreciate that persons would have endured frustration due to the present situation, but we apologise and we are asking the public to be patient with us as we carry out the necessary work to restore the power plant to its optimal load carrying capacity," he said.

Dr. Smith is also appealing to the public to conserve electricity by reducing their consumption of the commodity. He said this will lower their electricity bill and contribute to lowering the load on the power system, which in turn will assist in reducing the disruptions to the electricity and water supply.

The BVI Electricity Corporation continues to strive to provide the best possible service to its

customers, and assist in the development of the Territory's electrical infrastructure. The corporation aims to ensure that the entire VI population has an adequate, reliable and continuous electricity supply at an affordable cost.

ARIZONA - In the capital of Arizona - with extreme temperatures that can reach 122°F during the day and don't drop below 90°F at night – life is almost impossible. If blackouts were to knock out the air-conditioning, nearly half the population could end up hospitalized.

Hardly anyone walks the streets and wide avenues of Phoenix these days. The few sidewalks in the capital of Arizona- wide and clear - have become decorative. The fifth-most populous city in the United States is a desert... literally and figuratively.

Phoenix has been breaking heat records, with temperatures averaging 110 degrees Fahrenheit for more than 20 days in a row. 113°F is often exceeded. And the nights aren't much better, with temperatures not dropping below 90°F. It hasn't rained in four months.

Living in such an environment is almost impossible. It requires strict routines and lots and lots of water. When you reach Phoenix, within just a few minutes, your lips start to crack. Your mouth dries up, then your skin. Even your phone will start to complain it's too hot even to charge. Headaches are common - the body screams as it tries to recover from the brutal impact of the heat wave. And it's so dry that you barely sweat... a condition that conceals dehydration. [El Pais]

HAITI - About half of Haiti's five million people urgently need humanitarian aid, and three million of these are children and adolescents. The country's institutions and basic services are critically strained, and the population is experiencing record levels of poverty. Severe and chronic malnutrition has risen by 30% over 2022.

The alarming reality faced by Haiti has been deteriorating in recent years. Numerous schools remain closed due to violence or structural damage from recurring natural disasters. The recent rains have damaged the residences of thousands of families, and an ongoing threat of cholera resurgence looms. Teachers, social workers and healthcare professionals are leaving the country, seeking safety abroad.

In Haiti, every little effort has a significant impact on saving lives. UNICEF provides vaccines, therapeutic food for malnutrition, safe water, hygiene and sanitation resources, psychosocial support and protection for those who have experienced violence.

It's crucial to allocate more humanitarian funding and promptly scale up efforts to address the urgent needs of the most vulnerable. We must simultaneously focus on establishing long-term solutions for rebuilding institutions and ensuring access to essential

services. By fostering preparedness and resilience against natural disasters and epidemics, we can break the cycle of chronic crises and safeguard the well-being of children. [El Pais]

RUSSIA - Business at RTSB-RUS, a logistics company that ships cargo by rail across Russia, has boomed over the last 18 months. Amid an exodus of Western rivals and a surge in trade with China, its freight volumes jumped nearly fourfold in 2022 alone, Chief Executive Alexander Baskakov told The Moscow Times.

Elevated cargo shipments are just one sign of how quickly Russia's "pivot to Asia" has taken off. The invasion of Ukraine and deluge of Western sanctions cut Russia off from its previously vital European trade markets, triggering a scramble in Moscow to replace lost income and supply chains with Asian alternatives.

Russia's trade with China jumped 30% last year to a record \$191 billion, according to Chinese customs data. In the first six months of 2023, trade turnover in dollar terms was more than double pre-pandemic

But such a rapid increase in the volume of goods flowing between the two countries is putting pressure on Russia's logistics and infrastructure network, which is buckling under the weight of higher demand. Now crowded border crossings, atcapacity railways and overloaded ports are threatening to limit how far and how quickly Russia can continue to turn eastward. [Moscow Times]

BERMUDA - It would cost the taxpayer \$100 million to resurface all the island's roads that are in poor condition, according to the Minister of Public Works.

Lieutenant-Colonel Burch made the revelation in the House of Assembly yesterday and added that his ministry had a budget of only \$2.9 million for road repairs this year — an amount that would "put but a small dent" in the amount of paving needed.

The minister provided an update on the extensive roadworks being carried out as part of upgrades to water treatment and electricity infrastructures.

He said that that about half of the island's 553 kilometres of road was "in poor condition".

Colonel Burch added that the estimated cost of paving a single kilometre of roadway on both lanes was \$600,000 — although the majority of private roads were single lane and therefore cheaper to resurface. He said: "If the Government were to undertake an immediate initiative to fully repave those public and private roads that are in poor condition — approximately 226 kilometres or half of our roadways - it would cost approximately \$100 million over a ten-year period. [Royal Gazette]

GUYANA - The government of Guyana on Thursday accomplished tabling legislation which removes the 20 per cent tax on cell phones.


Finance Minister, Dr Ashni Singh, stated that the Confirmation of the Customs (Amendment of First Schedule) Order of 2023 aligns with a commitment given by President Irfaan Ali last June.

He emphasized the widespread effect the law would bring about.

"With the confirmation of this order, every cellular phone that comes into Guyana will no longer attract a 20 per cent duty that previously it would have attracted, and that immediately will redound to the benefit of the consuming public," Singh told legislators. [CNW]

USA- Vice President Kamala Harris is scheduled to visit Florida on Friday to give her remarks regarding the state Board of Education's recent decision to adjust how Black history is taught in public schools.

On Wednesday, the Florida Board of Education approved the new academic guidelines amidst

The new educational standards, according to a 216-page document detailing Florida's social studies standards for 2023 published by the Florida Department of Education, will include instruction on how some Black individuals derived benefits from slavery by acquiring useful skills. ROME - Politics must ensure that elderly people are not marginalized or abandoned in their loneliness, Pope Francis said on Sunday.

It is important "to be vigilant so that in our lives and in our families we do not marginalise the elderly," said the pope during Mass at St Peter's to celebrate the third World Day of Grandparents and the Elderly.

"Let us be careful that our crowded cities do not become 'concentrations of loneliness'. lest politics, which is called to provide for the needs of the most fragile, forgets precisely about the elderly, letting the market relegate them to 'unproductive waste'," he added.

"Let it not happen that, by dint of chasing the myths of efficiency and performance at full speed, we become incapable of slowing down to accompany those who struggle to keep up," said the 86-year-old Pontiff. (ANSA).



Ladyburd Talks...

Dear Readers: Tips for Staying Hydrated During the Summer Heat (3 of 3)

5. Cool down.

Proper hydration isn't just about drinking water—it's about regulating your body temperature, too. During summer, when the risk for heat stroke is at its highest, wear light, loose-fitting clothing in light colors; schedule strenuous sports and physical activities during cooler times of the day; protect yourself from the sun with hats and other shade accessories; take drink breaks often; and mist yourself with a spray bottle if you become overheated.

6. Eat foods with high water content.

Did you know that approximately 80 percent of our water intake comes from drinking water? The other 20 percent comes from food. All whole fruits and vegetables contain some water, but snack on these for maximum benefit: cucumbers, celery, tomatoes, radishes, peppers, cauliflower, watermelon, spinach, strawberries, broccoli, and grapefruit. They all contain 90 percent water or higher.

7. Replenish when you sweat.

Play a sport? Heading out on a hike? It's essential to drink water throughout these activities. Your sweat rate, the humidity, and how long you've exercised are all factors to consider. Proper hydration means getting enough water before, during, and after exercise. The American Council on Exercise recommends these guidelines before, during, and after a workout:

Drink 17-20 oz. two to three hours before you exercise. Drink 8 oz. 20-30 minutes before you exercise.

Drink 7-10 oz. every 10-20 minutes during exercise. Drink 8 oz. no more than 30 minutes after exercise.



with cinnamon, then blended and strained to create a smooth puree. To enhance its sweetness, sweetened condensed milk and vanilla are added. Additional water is incorporated to achieve the ideal balance of flavors. The creamy sweetness makes it a perfect accompaniment to spicy foods.

Originally hailing from Valencia, Spain, horchata has gained international acclaim as a go-to summer refresher. Its dairy-free origins allowed street vendors to serve it without refrigeration, keeping it fresh and safe. Although most traditional recipes include dairy milk, you can easily adapt it to your dietary preferences by using alternative milks like coconut, cashew or almond milk while adjusting the sweetness to your liking.

As with many deep-rooted traditional recipes, there are as many variations as there are families making them. Just like spaghetti sauce or meatloaf recipes, your favorite is probably whatever your grandmother made. Now, I'm not here to step on any abuela's toes. My goal was to come up with an authentic horchata recipe that was very easy and inexpensive yet full of traditional flavors. Here's my take on an easy and wallet-friendly recipe for classic horchata.

AGUA DE HORCHATA

Yield: 8 (8 ounce) servings

Total Time: 1 hour (plus 8 hours soaking time)

1 cup long-grain white rice

2 sticks cinnamon

5 cups water (divided)

Pinch of salt

1 (14 ounce) can sweetened condensed milk 1/4 cup sugar

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

In a bowl, combine the rice, cinnamon sticks and 2 cups of hot water. Allow it to soak for 8 hours or overnight in the refrigerator. Remove the cinnamon sticks.

Transfer the soaked rice to a blender and process until it reaches a smooth consistency, which may take a few minutes. If desired, strain the mixture through a fine-mesh strainer to remove any remaining rice solids.

Add the sweetened condensed milk, sugar, vanilla extract and a pinch of salt to the blended rice mixture. You can use the



blender again to ensure a frothy texture.

Pour the horchata into a pitcher and gradually add water (at least 3 cups) to achieve your preferred taste and consistency. Stir well.

Keep the horchata chilled until serving time, and serve over ice for an extrarefreshing experience.

Now that you have mastered the art of making horchata, let your creativity flow with these exciting serving ideas:

- -- Blend horchata with vanilla ice cream for indulgent milkshakes.
- Make horchata paletas or ice pops, alone or with chopped fruit.
- Combine horchata with iced coffee for a delicious horchata latte.

For adults seeking an extra kick, add a splash of rum or coconut vodka, or add shots of espresso and coffee liquor to your horchata for a tempting cocktail.

So, whether you're lounging by the pool, hosting a backyard gathering or simply seeking a moment of tranquility on a hot summer day, horchata is the easy, frugal and unique beverage that will transport you to a blissful oasis with every delightful sip. Cheers to the simple pleasures!

RVIPF MAKES SIGNIFICANT COCAINE SEIZURE/SEVERAL IN CUSTODY

Thursday, July 20 – The Royal Virgin Islands Police Force is at the early stages of their investigations following an operation at sea early yesterday evening that resulted in the seizure of a significant amount of cocaine.

Several persons are now in police custody along with two intercepted vessels, and a firearm confiscated from one of the vessels by officers of the RVIPF and US Customs and Border Protection.

Doctors Won't Prescribe Hormone Therapy to Woman Over 60

DEAR DR. ROACH: In a recently published column, you stated, "As always, the decision belongs to the patient," while addressing a concern about the benefits and risks of stopping a statin drug. Oh, really? Then, why is it that, once I turned 60, not a single doctor will prescribe hormone replacement therapy (HRT) to stop my debilitating post-menopausal symptoms? After suffering from menopausal symptoms starting at age 42, I was finally prescribed HRT at age 57. What relief I felt, as it was the only remedy to alleviate my hot flashes, weight gain, lack of sleep and vaginal dryness.

Once I hit 60, I was ordered to stop HRT, and no one since will prescribe it for me now. I am 66, suffer from hot flashes daily and have my sleep interrupted at least five times a night with terrible night sweats. I have tried just about every over-thecounter offering with zero effectiveness.

I will gladly trade the greater risk of heart attack and stroke, and the possible shorter life span, for relief from symptoms that affect my daily quality of life. Clearly, the choice is not mine, because if I had a choice, I would ask for continued prescriptions of HRT to give me relief. Why don't I have that choice as a patient?

— R.M.T.

ANSWER: A patient always has the right to refuse a treatment recommended from a physician. However, the physician has the obligation to consider the risks and benefits of a treatment, and is not obliged to prescribe a treatment that they do not think is appropriate.

If a patient asks me for a treatment that has been shown to be ineffective and has the potential for serious adverse effects, I don't prescribe it, but will work with the patient to find alternative treatments. For example, some nonhormonal prescription treatments are moderately effective for hot flashes and sleep disturbance, and topical estrogen is very effective for vaginal dryness.

However, the case of HRT for symptoms of menopause is more complicated, because estrogen is the most effective treatment we have for menopausal symptoms, particularly for hot flashes. There are risks to HRT, but the benefits for some women are so great that they are willing to accept some risks.

You mentioned the risk of heart disease and stroke. A landmark study called the Women's Health Initiative helped to define and quantify those (and other) risks. Its effect has been to dramatically reduce the prescribing of menopausal hormone therapy, but the results should not be interpreted to mean that hormone treatment is always inappropriate, even in women who are in their mid-60s, where risks are higher.

Moreover, a woman's entire health status should be considered when deciding whether to prescribe hormone treatments. In women with a history of an estrogen-dependent tumor (like many breast cancers), a history of a blood clot or a stroke, or a few other issues, the harm almost certainly outweighs the benefits. Otherwise, a wise clinician looks at the patient's risk for heart disease, blood clots and similar conditions. Women at a very high risk for heart disease should probably avoid estrogen. Using lower-dose estrogen by patch (rather than pills) is wise for women at moderate risk, such as those who are in their 60s.

Physicians do not want to prescribe medications that will harm their patients, and most have stopped prescribing menopausal hormone therapy entirely for women, to prevent disease. However, it still has a role in treating symptoms. I recommend you seek out an expert in treatment of menopausal treatments and have a frank discussion about your willingness to assume risk in order to have a better quality of life.

Study Finds Climate Change Fingerprints on July Heat Waves in Europe, China and US

The fingerprints of climate change are all over the intense heat waves gripping the globe this month, a new study finds. Researchers say the deadly hot spells in the American Southwest and Southern Europe could not have happened without the continuing buildup of warming gases in the air.

These unusually strong heat waves are becoming more common, Tuesday's study said. The same research found the increase in heat-trapping gases, largely from the burning of coal, oil and natural gas has made another heat wave — the one in China — 50 times more likely with the potential to occur every five years or so.

A stagnant atmosphere, warmed by carbon dioxide and other gases, also made the European heat wave 2.5 degrees Celsius (4.5 degrees Fahrenheit) hotter, the one in the United States and Mexico 2 degrees Celsius (3.6 degrees Fahrenheit) warmer and the one in China one 1 degree Celsius (1.8 degrees Fahrenheit) toastier, the study found.

Several climate scientists, using tree rings and other standins for temperature records, say this month's heat is likely the hottest Earth has been in about 120,000 years, easily the hottest of human civilization.

"Had there been no climate change, such an event would almost never have occurred," said study lead author Mariam Zachariah, a climate scientist at Imperial College of London. She called heat waves in Europe and North America "virtually impossible" without the increase in heat from the mid-1800s. Statistically, the one in China could have happened without global warming.

Since the advent of industrialscale burning, the world has warmed 1.2 degrees Celsius (2.2 degrees Fahrenheit), so "they are not rare in today's climate and the role of climate change is absolutely overwhelming," said Imperial College climate scientist Friederike Otto, who leads the team of volunteer international scientists at World Weather Attribution who do these studies.

The particularly intense heat waves that Texas, California, Arizona, New Mexico, Nevada, Baja California, Sonora, Chihuahua and Coahuila are now roasting through are likely to happen about once every 15 years in the current climate, the study said.

But the climate is not stabilized, even at this level. If it warms a few more tenths of a degree, this month's heat will become even more common, Otto said. Phoenix has had a recordshattering 25 straight days of temperatures at or above 43.3 degrees Celsius (110 degrees Fahrenheit) and more than a week when the nighttime temperature never dropped below 32.2 Celsius (90 degrees Fahrenheit).

The heat in Spain, Italy, Greece and some Balkan states is likely to reoccur every decade in the current climate, the study said. Because the weather attribution researchers started their analysis of three simultaneous heat waves on July 17, the results are not yet peer reviewed, which is the gold standard for science. But it used scientifically valid techniques, the team's research regularly gets published and several outside experts told The Associated Press it makes sense.

The way scientists do these rapid analyses is by comparing observations of current weather in the three regions to repeated computer simulations of "a world that might have been without climate change," said study co-author Izidine Pinto, a climate scientist at the Royal Netherlands Meteorological Institute.

In Europe and North America, the study doesn't claim humancaused climate change is the sole cause of the heat waves. but it is a necessary ingredient because natural causes and random chance couldn't produce this alone.

Texas state climatologist John Nielsen-Gammon said the study was reasonable, but looks at a broad area of the U.S. Southwest, so it may not be applicable to every single place in the area.

"In the United States, it's clear that the entire southern tier is going to see the worst of the ever-worsening heat and this summer should be considered a serious wake-up call," said University of Michigan environment dean Jonathan Overpeck.

With heat waves, "the most important thing is that they kill people and they particularly kill and hurt and destroy lives and livelihoods of those most vulnerable," Otto said.

LA Lakers' Hodge conduct camps after welcoming celebrations

Home for the first time in 2½ years, D'Moi Hodge has had a busy first four days, starting with a thunderous welcoming, a celebration in Cane Garden Bay, youth camps on Virgin Gorda and Tortola, ahead of All Stars Games on Friday on Tortola and Saturday on Virgin Gorda.

"I'm really enjoying the process of coming home and giving back," Hodge told Island Sun Sports on Tuesday following a camp on Tortola. "It's good to be back, it really feels good to be back."

Hodge, who went undrafted in the 2023 NBA Draft, immediately signed a two-way contract with the Los Angeles Lakers thereafter, becoming the first BVI player on an NBA roster, after coming directly out of College. Hodge, who showcased for 18 teams, joined Kleon Penn—who tried out with the Minnesota Timberwolves long after turning pro—as the 2nd BVI player to try out for an NBA squad. Penn did not make the team.

"On behalf of the government and people of the Virgin Islands, I want to welcome D'Moi home and I congratulate him for the awesome accomplishment of being the first Virgin Islander to be a part of an NBA team, the Los Angeles Lakers," Premier Natalio

Wheatley said. "Now the whole Virgin Islands are Los Angeles Lakers. I used to hate the Lakers because I was a Tim Duncan and Spurs fan. Now, I want to get my No 55 jersey. We're gonna make sure not one No 55 jersey is left in any store. So, the Virgin Islands are now purple and gold."

After a motorcade to Cane Garden Bay, a celebration ceremony was held at the Ivan Dawson Primary School basketball court, where Hodge attended. During the ceremony, Wheatley named Hodge the first recipient of the VI Bassadors Program and along with District Rep Melvin "Mitch" Turnbull, presented Hodge with a \$20,000 cheque. Wheatley also said that they will refurbish the community basketball court-not the one at the schooland name it his honor. Hodge also received \$5000 from the National Bank of the Virgin Islands.

"We are extremely proud of you D'Moi," Wheatley said, highlighting his play in the NBA Summer League. "He's special. And the type of impact he's going to make on the Lakers; and the type of impact he's going to make on the NBA, we're only just seeing the beginning of him. He's going to go from strength to strength. We look forward to you doing great things as part of the Los Angeles Lakers. God bless you."

The basketball world, Hodge said, is a dog eat dog world. "Everyone thinks it's easy," he said, noting that during the draft, the Minnesota Timberwolves called and he said it was 'like a dream come through that he had made the NBA' and was making the BVI proud. "Then I got the call that they were switching and going with someone else, that really humbled me. It showed that they didn't care who I was, where I'm from. It shows that I have to go and work my tail off. I want to thank the Timberwolves for switching up on me."

Hodge thanked the BVI for embracing him through his journey. He said the NBA wasn't on his mind as he wanted to be a lawyer and never took basketball seriously in his early years. After playing the Basketball Federation men's league as a 16-year old and held his own, he told his cousin Halstead J.R. Chiverton, who had twice rejected his pleas to go to the USA, he was ready. "In my first game, I shot an airball and got benched for the rest of the game," he recalled. He said Chiverton had him working out in the cold and sometimes had to walk a mile home because he missed three shots in a row. "He was preparing me mentally for what was ahead," Hodge noted. "I shot till my wrist hurt and he told me 'that's good. Keep shooting.' Now I'm getting paid to shoot."

Hodge reflected on his first meeting with coach Dennis Gates at Cleveland State that changed his life. Gates did a powerpoint presentation with projections and a road to the NBA. "I watched him By Dean "The Sportsman" Greenaway

and told him, 'you're tripping. I'm not going to the NBA. I don't know what you see in me," Hodge recounted. "But that was his goal for me to make it to the NBA. I didn't see it at the time. I didn't believe in myself. I knew I was good, but not good enough for the NBA."

Hodge said Gates asked him about his family and everything

else. "Before I left the meeting, Coach Gates said 'I want you to trust me with your life.' And when he said that, I just stopped and watched him, because no one ever told me that. When someone tells you that they want you to trust them with your life, that's some real confidence. I want to thank Coach Gates. He changed my life."

Morton leads NACAC medal haul with golden High Jump leap

Jah'Kyla Morton used a personal best, meet and national record High Jump leap, to snatch gold in the NACAC U18 Championships in San Jose, Costa Rica on Sunday, as BVI athletes walked home with one gold, one silver and two bronze medals, in the competition that also featured an U23 Division.

Morton scaled the bar at 1.74m (5'8½") on her first attempt to eclipse the 1.71m (5'7½") mark set by Jamaica's Rasheda Samuels in 2021.

"Going into this championship, my goal

was to jump close to 1.80m (5'10¾") and I think that I came close enough," Morton told Island Sun Sports. "I tried 1.77m (5'9¾") but did not succeed. When I cleared 1.71m (5'7¼), I was proud of myself because my coach (Carl Barrett) wasn't there, but I had assistance from Mr. (Ralston "Grandfather) Henry and I stayed calm throughout the competition and didn't get flustered like I usually do."

Morton, whose best was 1.70m (5'7") and fought for Carifta Games gold before settling for silver on her last attempt, said winning medals in both events shows that the hard work she has been putting in is paying off.

"It's going to push me to train even harder, because I want that 1.80m (5'10%)," she said. "I felt like I cleared 1.77m (5'9%) on the first attempt. I was already over the bar, but my left hand, which is my free hand,

hit the bar coming down. I was kinda mad, because I knew I was over it. The second attempt was a little better than the first one. On the third attempt, I think I was tired and my technique started to disappear."

Sprinter Beyonce DeFreitas won a 200m silver and a 100m bronze in the U23 Division. She advanced to the 100m final after running 11.37 seconds with a +5.5 mps tailwind. She ran 11.41 seconds (+0.7) to grab the bronze. DeFreitas ran 23.42 (+1.3) for an automatic spot in the final, where she ran 23.59 (+0.1) for the 200m bronzAfter a wind aided leap of 5.94m (19'5¾") (+2.7) in the U23 Long Jump and settling for fourth place, Kimberly Smith earned a bronze medal in the Javelin Throw, with a personal best heave of 37.54m (123'2").

Akrisa Eristee had a 5th place finish in the U23 Women's 400m, with a time

of 55.92 seconds, after 56.29 used to get in the final. Her 24.89 second (+1.3) in the 200m semis, was 10th among the participants.

J'Den Jackson ran a 22.01 seconds 200m personal best the 200m and finished fifth in the U18 Boys Division, after 22.43 in the semis. He had a non-advancing windy 10.93 seconds (+5.2) in the 100m—his best under all conditions.

A'Sia McMaster cut the sand at 5.45m (17'10½") to finish sixth in the U18 Long Jump, while Jonathan Lynch ran his 800m in 1 minute 59.60 seconds for eight in the U18 Men class.

Wanyae Belle ran a personal best of 10.45 seconds (+1.9) for fourth in his heat and 12th among the semifinalists. He also had a non-advancing 200m season's best of 21.42 seconds.

This week, the bill got a second life. A bipartisan group of lawmakers reintroduced FEPA, proposing to extend anti-bribery laws to foreign officials who demand or accept bribes from US citizens or companies. Transparency International US is

fully behind it, urging Congress to pass FEPA without any further delay.

Several countries such as Germany, France and the UK criminalise already both the supply and demand sides of foreign bribery. Promisingly, the recently proposed anti-corruption directive would require countries across the bloc to make demandside bribery a crime.

We also need to have a bigger conversation about enforcement.

Merely having laws on the books isn't enough. Sadly, countries with laws similar to FEPA rarely - if ever - move against foreign officials.

Major trading countries are failing even when it comes to prosecuting companies that pay bribes abroad, despite having had an international obligation to do so for 25 years now.

Our Exporting Corruption 2022 report shows that enforcement of supply-side anti-bribery laws is at a historical low.

As it happens, with some room for improvement, the US is one of only two countries that actively investigate and punish bribe-paying companies (the other is Switzerland). While these efforts are commendable, they often lead to incomplete justice - and FEPA is an important opportunity to fix that.

SMALL ISLAND STATES TO GET THEIR DAY IN COURT

In the face of unremitting climate change threats and unfulfilled promises from industrialized

nations, leaders of small island states have courageously taken matters into their own hands. Their frustration with lacklustre funding and inadequate solutions to fortify their countries against climate change has led them to pursue

the power of the international legal system. They are seeking justice against those nations whose excessive greenhouse gas emissions pose an existential threat to their peoples.

The International Tribunal of the Law of the Sea (ITLOS) has consented to hear their groundbreaking case in which they are aiming to ascertain the legal responsibility of States for carbon emissions, marine pollution, rising sea levels, and the resultant damage inflicted on other states. The landmark hearing will take place in Hamburg from September 11 to 13, 2023.

It was just a short 21 months ago that the Prime Ministers of Antigua and Barbuda and Tuvalu, Gaston Browne and Kausea Natano respectively, showed extraordinary foresight and bravery by embarking on a novel legal journey to combat the threats of climate change to their peoples' survival. An historic accord was signed on the sidelines of the COP26 meeting in Glasgow, giving birth to The Commission of Small Island States on Climate Change and International Law (COSIS) as an international body, registered with the United Nations Secretariat, with a mandate to pursue the implementation of international law regarding climate change.

Today, their daring initiative is reaping results. Supported by an

international team of legal experts and representatives from five other small island states, their plea for an Advisory Opinion was submitted to ITLOS on June 16, 2023.

Two crucial questions are posed to the tribunal: Firstly, what are the State Parties' obligations to prevent, reduce, and control marine environment pollution due to climate change effects, including ocean warming, sea level rise, and ocean

acidification, all spurred by anthropogenic greenhouse gas emissions? Secondly, how must the marine environment be protected and preserved in the face of these climate change impacts?

Their choice to engage the international legal system is the culmination of years of frustration over industrialized nations' seeming lip-service and labyrinthine funding mechanisms, proposed at over years of meetings of the UN Committee of the Parties (COP).

Often the pledges that are made do not offer additional money; in many cases the funds are repurposed from other promises that were not kept. Additionally, the dizzying number of new mechanisms that are supposedly set up are not only narrow in their purpose, but the means of accessing them are both obtuse and restrictive.

Among these are the Global Shield Solutions Platform, which builds on the InsuResilience Solutions Fund and a Global Shield Financing Facility set up at the World Bank; the Climate Vulnerable Forum & V20 Joint Multi-Donor Fund that promises to establish a loss and damage program utilizing the GEF Small Grants Programme structure to make smaller funding amounts directly available to affected communities.

Highlighting these inadequacies is the much-lauded 'loss and damage' fund, discussed for the first time at the 27th COP meeting in Egypt. While it was hailed as a breakthrough, the reality was a mirage. The practiced and clever negotiators of the industrialized states at COP27 did not establish a fund nor the means

to make it operational; they merely agreed to set up a Transitional Committee comprising representatives from 24 countries—10 from developed countries, including the United States, and 14 from developing countries. The purpose of the Committee is to make recommendations to COP28 in December 2023, including on what countries should contribute to the fund, how the fund will be administered, and what funding arrangements might be possible.

When these convoluted mechanisms are coupled with a 13-year failure by industrialized nations to deliver on the promise of providing US\$100 billion annually in climate finance for low- and middle-income countries, the resolve of small island state leaders to seek justice through the international legal system is fully understandable.

In pursuing the establishment of COSIS and seeking an Advisory Opinion from ITLOS, the leaders of small island states were frequently discouraged from their path by governments of industrialised nations. The latter fear edicts from international legal bodies which, at the very least, establish their obligations; they much prefer non-binding negotiations such as the COP process in which their considerably greater skills and leverage give them an advantage.

Nonetheless, the small island state leaders pursued their cause relentlessly, understanding that the stakes are too high to acquiesce to pressure. Their commitment resonates with the words of Prime Minister Gaston Browne, who declared, "The time for empty promises is over." The leaders have been joined by 33 other countries and 9 international organizations in making submissions to ITLOS.

The upcoming ITLOS hearing in September is a significant milestone, with implications that could redefine the climate change landscape. The fight waged by the leaders of Antigua and Barbuda, The Bahamas, Niue, Palau, St Lucia, St Vincent and the Grenadines, and Vanuatu through COSIS is not just for their nations. It's a fight for climate justice that will resonate across the globe.

Dog And Livestock Owners Reminded To Be Responsible

Owners of dogs and livestock are reminded to be responsible and proactive in ensuring their animals are secured, preventing harm to humans, other animals and property.

Director of Agriculture and Fisheries, Mr. Theodore James said the department has been receiving complaints of increased dog attacks and incidents where livestock are left roaming freely. He said in some instances, animals have been invading properties and destroying vegetation such as vegetables and ornamental plants.

Mr. James said that according to the Pounds and Livestock Brands Act, 2004 Arrangement of Section

- Any animal found straying in a public place may be
- captured and impounded by any person; and
- dealt with in accordance with the provisions of this Act and the Regulations.
- Any animal found trespassing on any private land may be
 - captured and impounded (a)

by the occupier of the private land or by any person that the occupier may call upon to assist him to capture or impound the animal, including an authorised person; and

dealt with in accordance with the provisions of this Act and the Regulations.

Mr. James further stated that his department is working closely with the Royal Virgin Islands Police Force to assist in enforcing the law whenever these unfortunate incidents occur.

"We are appealing to owners to ensure their animals are always secured to prevent vicious dog attacks," the Director said. He added, "These incidents are becoming too frequent, where persons are injured and traumatised. Vehicle collision and damage to water pipes and gardens are the types of report we get involving cattle, sheep and goats."

According to the (Prevention of Injury to Persons, Livestock and Poultry) Act, 2001, it is illegal to have dogs on the

beach outside the hours of 6:00 a.m. to 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. Dog owners must keep their pets on a leash at all times when outside of their premises. Failure to abide by this law will result in a fine not exceeding two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250).

Mr. James is urging owners to microchip their dogs, register them with the department and attach the registration tag to their dog's collar.

The public is also asked not to feed stray animals and report sightings of such animals to the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries at 468-9143 or 468-6123.
