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AMAZING RISE IN CRUISE VISITORS TO REACH OVER 800.000 BY YEAR'S END

In a remarkable rebound since the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Territory has witnessed a dramatic surge in cruise passenger arrivals. This uplifting news was shared Hon. Kye Rymer, Minister of Communication and Works during the 7 September sitting of the House of Assembly.

According to Hon. Rymer, this impressive revival in cruise passenger arrivals since the summer of 2021

hints at the resilience of the cruise tourism sector despite the challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Minister said: "The BVIPA's and the Ministry's unwavering commitment to providing a secure and inviting atmosphere has played a pivotal role in the upswing of cruise tourism, with exceptional passenger numbers underscoring a positive trajectory that is expected to continue into the upcoming 2023-2024

season."

"Our visitors can explore the stunning coastline, engage in snorkeling diving adventures, participate in sailing regattas and sportfishing activities or simply relax and soak in the natural beauty of the islands. The British Virgin Islands unique blend of Caribbean charm, rich cultural heritage, and warm hospitality make it a coveted destination for cruise travelers," Hon. Rymer further added.

Statistics from the BVI Ports Authority (BVIPA) show that as of 31st August 2023, the Territory welcomed a total of 492,481 cruise passengers.

While elaborating on the impressive numbers, said, Hon. Rymer "Madam Speaker, we have demonstrated remarkable resilience and adaptability, and we are thrilled to witness this exponential growth in cruise tourism. The dedication of our community, combined with strategic planning, has made this achievement possible." Furthermore, projections for the upcoming 2023-2024 tourism season are optimistic. The BVIPA expects passenger numbers to reach an astounding 794,489. This forecast surpasses the record set in 2016, when the BVI saw an arrival of 699,105 passengers.

The economic impact of this surge is expected to be substantial, especially considering that the cruise business contributes 40percent of BVIPA's total revenue. Citing data from the Cruise Lines International Association (CLIA), Hon. Rymer explained that the figures emphasize the cruise industry's vital role in both the BVI and the broader Caribbean region, promising significant economic growth, opportunities, benefits for local businesses.

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GOVERNMENT COMMITTED TO SETTLE MONEYS OWED TO ELECTRICITY CORP. the Central Government's PLAN TO SETTLE THE

The issues of government debts and how it affects other businesses and organizations was highlighted in the House of Assembly on 7 September as Hon. Marlon Penn, Opposition Member and Representative for the 8th District, spotlighted the outstanding balances owed to the BVI Electricity Corporation (BVIEC) by the Central Government.

In a detailed response, Premier and Minister of Finance, Dr. the Hon. Natalio Wheatley, laid out the government's roadmap to clear these dues, signaling a renewed era of fiscal responsibility and transparency.

Hon. Marlon Penn initiated the discussion by inquiring: "Madam Speaker, could the Honourable Premier and Minister of Finance please give this Honourable House the following: a detailed breakdown of the monies owed to the BVI Electricity Corporation by central Government and all subvention receiving statutory entities under his purview as Premier?"

Dr. Wheatley responded by admitting that outstanding balances to BVIEC have been an ongoing issue for years and across various administrations. He stated, "But Madam Speaker, since taking up office, my administration has committed to pay to vendors what is owed. BVIEC is no exception."

The Premier further detailed that as of 31 August,

the Central Government's outstanding balance to BVIEC stood at \$833,518.42. Out of this amount, \$728,111.77 are current balances, meaning they are zero to thirty days old. He emphasized that a significant chunk, \$455,998.75 to be precise, of this current balance, was for Bi-Water operations.

Highlighting the government's efforts to honor its obligations, the Premier said: "Madam Speaker, this demonstrates that Central Government is largely honouring the amounts owed to BVIEC."

On the topic of statutory entities, the Premier mentioned that the Recovery and Development Agency is the only entity under the Premier's Office billed for electricity.

PLAN TO SETTLE THE OUTSTANDING BALANCE

Addressing the second part of Hon. Penn's question regarding the plan to pay off the outstanding balance, Hon. Wheatley mentioned that the government has centralized the payment of utility bills, which has effectively ensured timely payments of electricity bills.

He stated: "Madam Speaker, the challenges extend much further than outstanding balances owed to BVIEC, but Government is exploring all options including payment plans, settlement in full, and application of any credit notes at BVIEC."

The Premier assured that the Ministry of Finance would continue to oversee the performance of statutory bodies to make sure they meet all their obligations.

Madam Speaker, we are here in the House of Assembly at this stage to handle matters related to advancing the Shipping Registry. This is positive for the BVI and a good thing overall. Sadly, however, at this very same time, I have the sad task of offering condolences to the family members, friends and colleagues of the Registrar of Shipping, Mr. Ronald Donovan, who passed over the weekend.

Of the staff members present here today, and as a matter of fact, of the staff members currently at the Virgin Islands Shipping Registry, Mr. Donovan has been one of the longest continuous serving members of the organisation. Mr. Donovan was the Registrar for more than 17 years, even preceding the time of the function of the Registry becoming a Government department. He served for several years at the Financial Services Commission prior to the services being transferred.

Mr. Donovan was a Registrar of Registrars; confident in his role, knowledgeable and experienced at his craft and a champion for the Shipping Registry's cause. Madam Speaker, the process that we are undertaking here today, Mr. Donovan was passionate to see it through. He actually participated in a presentation to Government on this very same matter almost a week to this day - a participation where he eloquently made his contribution. And if you knew Mr. Donovan, you would know what I mean about eloquent contribution.

Ronald was known throughout the Red Ensign Group of flags and his absence from any group event anywhere in the world would be met with queries of his absence and well being. As a matter of fact, Mr. Donovan was one of the longest active serving members across the administrations of the group of Red Ensign British flags. The clients of the Virgin Islands Shipping Registry in Miami, London, and many places globally knew Ronald by name; they would be visibly excited to see and greet him on every visit to their region. This was a testament to his presence in the industry, his warm personality and his humor.

Mr. Richard Pellew of the UK Maritime and Coast Guard Agency (the MCA) on hearing the news wrote, "That is truly sad news and, for us, very unexpected. Ronald has always been the elder statesman and pivotal member of the Red Ensign Group (REG) family in all the time I have been here, and it is hard to imagine the REG without him. We will undoubtedly be the poorer for his passing. I will share the sad news with the group but please, when you are able to, pass on the condolences from all of us in the MCA to his family and friends."

Mr. Donovan was also an active member of the Carrot Bay community and District 1 activities and any candidate in that District would have been well advised to have a discussion with Ronald and get his support if you wanted to be successful. Wherever Ronald served, he was a champion at whatever he wanted to do and passionate in so doing.

I again extend my condolences to the family, friends and colleagues of Mr. Ronald Donovan. I pray God's strength for each and every one of you. He will be sorely missed in many venues of the world.

May his soul rest in peace.

JOE'S HILL HOMES DEEMED TOO EXPENSIVE

In a plea for unity and innovative solutions, Minister for Social Development, Hon. Vincent Wheatley, has reached out for a HOA heads-together brainstorming approach to the Joe's Hill Manor project dilemma. The Minister specifically asked Eighth District Representative, Hon. Marlon Penn, for assistance in addressing the challenge of over 40 vacant homes that was marketed in the beginning as the perfect approach to fixing the first-time home ownership issue.

The public concern about the project stems from the fact that construction took a significant investment from the Social Security Board with the promise of offering affordable housing to local first-time homeowners. However, many of the hopeful homeowners were empty-handed due to prohibitive costs.

During the recent House of Assembly (HOA) session, Wheatley Hon. disclosed the expenses associated with the project. He stated, "\$26,955,065 was spent on the homes as of August 2023." The Minister explained that the ambitious project includes a broad spectrum of housing from one-bedroom types, condominiums to threebedroom townhouses, totaling 52 units.

While, reflecting on the deep-rooted desire for homeownership in the BVI, Hon. Wheatley expressed his disappointment, stating: "It was never envisioned that a project would see what is happening now." With over 600 applicants at one point, the current situation is far from the envisioned outcome.

Acknowledging the initial target of young professionals for the housing initiative, the Social Development Minister conveyed that the government is currently reassessing the approach. However, he emphasized the urgency of

finding a resolution, as the vacant assets continue to depreciate.

Making a passionate plea to his colleagues, the Minister emphasized the collective responsibility to address the issue. "How do we help our people own those houses up there?" he posited. Recognizing the gravity of the situation and his own uncertainty, he continued: "I'm kind of lost like everybody as to what we should do."

He further expressed his willingness to collaborate and brainstorm potential solutions, and encouraged Hon. Penn, with his finance and IT background, to join the effort. "Let's figure out how we can get our people in those homes as quickly as possible for Christmas. Let's give our people a Christmas gift. Let's figure it out."

Addressing the pressing issue, Hon. Penn highlighted that some prospective homeowners struggled to qualify for loans due to lack of the necessary deposit, insufficient savings, or unsatisfactory creditworthiness. He further probed Hon. Wheatley about the Ministry's next steps, especially considering the government's considerable investment and the apparent misalignment with homeownership realities for many residents.

MARKET SQUARE FUNCTIONALITY QUESTIONED

The current use of the Road Town Market Square is of concern to Eighth District Representative, and Opposition Member Hon. Marlon Penn: who during the 7 September House of Assembly sitting auestioned Communications and Works Minister, Hon. Kye Rymer about the functionality of the space.

Since its launch in February, the facility, which includes with some 16 kiosks, has experienced a less-than-anticipated occupancy rate, contrary to the government's portrayal of the site offering affordable vendor spaces.

In response to Hon. Penn, the Minister of Communications and Works explained that the low number of vendors at the facility is the issue of concern at the moment. He said: "Even though the spaces were all allotted initially, some vendors previously assigned have not fulfilled the requirements to utilise the kiosks." In fact, the Minister disclosed that five kiosks remain open for long-term rental.

Residents and vendors alike have pointed out some limitations, specifically highlighting the lack of adequate awnings for protection from the elements. In response, Hon. Rymer disclosed: "There is a bid currently out for shutters

to be installed to outfit the kiosks and monies set aside for the construction of a bus shelter."

However, the deeper issue remains the very purpose of the Market Hon. Penn Square. critiqued the government's vision, suggesting that the development leaned more towards a business centre than its supposed intent of being a farmers' market. He pointedly asked the Minister: "Is it a farmers' market that we have there or do we have an economic zone?" Taking it further, Hon. Penn observed: "I hear mostly fried food and all kind of thing, and slushy," underscoring the departure from the original purpose.

The Opposition Member's concerns extended beyond the scope of the Market Square, touching on broader issues faced by local farmers. "The farmers are struggling to get water... They can't get seedlings, so they can plant their farm," Penn passionately remarked, emphasizing that the designated space should cater to "the hardworking farmers of this community, in this

Territory."

Further voicing his dismay, Hon. Penn criticized the government's approach, arguing they mishandled have the vision for the initial Market Square. According to him, the space was initially purposed exclusively for farmers and fishermen, a vision now seemingly blurred by the amalgamation of diverse vendors.

Statement by Hon. Sharie B. de Castro on Summer Camps and Afterschool Programmes

Madam Speaker, development of our children and young people is of utmost importance to the continued development of the Territory. Thus, I am pleased to highlight the reintroduction of Summer Camps in July 2023 through the Department of Youth Affairs and Sports. A total of three separate camps were offered: the Youth Camp, S.T.E.A.M. Summer Summer Camp and the Multi-Sport Summer Camp.

Madam Speaker, the Youth Summer Camp catered to children 5-16 years and offered, arts and crafts, cookery, S.T.E.A.M. activities, recreation, field trips and swimming. The youth camp centres were held in Tortola at the Francis Lettsome Primary School, the Elmore Stoutt High School and the Ebenezer Thomas Primary School and in Virgin Gorda at the Bregado Flax Educational Centre, in Anegada at the Claudia Creque Educational Centre and in the Jost Van Dyke at the Jost Van Dyke Primary School. Madam Speaker, the S.T.E.A.M.

Summer Camp catered to children 8-14 years and was held at the Elmore Stoutt High School. The first of its kind, this camp engaged young people in Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Mathematics. Participants were also given the opportunity to develop their swimming skills. An exhibition of the projects was displayed at end of the camp.

Madam Speaker, additionally, one camp was dedicated entirely to sports. The Multi-Sport Summer Camp was held in Tortola at the Multi-Purpose Sports Complex and the E. Walwyn Brewley Ball Park, and on Virgin Gorda at the Valley field and the Jeffrey Caines Sports Arena. This camp catered to children 5-16 years and provided an opportunity to learn skills in basketball, volleyball and softball. Participants were exposed equally to all three sports. The camps ended with a Fun Day and the children got the opportunity to enjoy food and drinks, music, water slides, bouncy houses, face painting and games.

Madam Speaker, three hundred and ninety (390) children were registered for the Youth and S.T.E.A.M. Summer Camps and one hundred and sixty (160) for the Multi-Sports Camp. Thus, a grand total of five hundred and fifty (550) children were actively engaged for the summer. This was made

possible due to funds allocated by the Ministry of Education Youth Affairs and Sports in the amount of \$190,000.00 (one hundred and ninety thousand).

Madam Speaker, a new school year is upon us and students will be back in school starting 11th September. After a haitus of several years, DYAS is preparing to relaunch the After School Youth Development Programme on Monday, 2nd October 2023. Three programmes will be offered: S.T.E.A.M., Academic Tutoring and Grassroots Sports. These programmes will be held at all primary and secondary public schools Monday to Thursday, 3:45pm - 5:45 pm. Student registration forms are available at the Department of Youth Affairs and Sports and at all public schools. Students must be registered to

be eligible for enrollment into the programme. Parents and guardians are encouraged to complete the form and submit it to the Department of Youth Affairs and Sports by Thursday, 21st September, 2023.

Madam Speaker, as a result, students will be engaged in activities that will help to improve academic success, develop physical fitness and core values and foster social and critical thinking skills in a safe, structured and supervised environment. Madam Speaker, the Ministry of Education, Youth Affairs and Sports through the Department of Youth Affairs and Sports is committed to providing opportunities for our young people to develop and excel through the After School Youth Development Programme.

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Report On Belongership And Residency Tabled In HOA

The "Review of Policy and Processes for Granting Residency and Belongership" Report was tabled in the House of Assembly, yesterday September 7.

Premier and Minister

responsible for Immigration, Honourable Dr. Natlatio D. Wheatley said during the Third Sitting of the First Session of the Fifth House of Assembly that the recommendations within the Commission of Inquiry's Independent Reviewer's Report on Belongership and Residency in the Virgin Islands offers a distinct opportunity in shaping the trajectory of progress in the Territory. Premier Wheatley noted that, "The recommendations of this review have now been presented to us, and I wish to emphasize that this presents us with a unique opportunity; an opportunity to shape the future of our beloved British Virgin Islands in a manner that is firmly grounded in respect for the law and recognition of the privilege granted to individuals who wish to make these beautiful Virgin Islands their home."

The Premier also stated that the independent reviewer's report will function as the basis for proposals and recommendations that will inform the necessary amendments to our legislation, and the formulation of relevant policies.

He further explained by saying, "We understand that these changes must reflect the evolving needs and aspirations of our people and the challenges we face as a society."

The report emphasises the need for considerations within the following areas for the creation of a more effective immigration policy: Economic needs; social and cultural impact; security concerns; legal framework; capacity and resources; political considerations; and international relations. Essentially emphasizing the focus, which must be paramount for the Virgin Islands to meet its Sustainable Development goals and needs in the interest of its people.

The independent report also highlights the significance of addressing pervasive issues surrounding immigration. The report can be accessed on the Government's official website.



Statement By Hon. Sharie B. De Castro On Recent Initaitives At H. Lavity Stoutt Community College

Madam Speaker, I take this opportunity to apprise this Honourable House on the recent notable developments at the H. Lavity Stoutt Community College. 672 students are enrolled this Fall semester for certificate and associate degree programmes. Included in this total are 77 high school students dually enrolled at the College - the largest number to ever take advantage of this programme. These students are from Elmore Stoutt High School, Bregado Flax Educational Centre, and Ciboney School of Excellence. Madam Speaker, I heartily congratulate these students for embracing the opportunity to get a head start on their college education. As they take general education classes over the next academic year, they will be able to shorten the time needed to attain their associate degree at HLSCC prior to transferring to complete

their baccalaureate degree.

Madam Speaker, I am pleased to announce that the College has recommenced its Associate degree in Teacher Education under the Institute of Education and a total of 25 persons have registered, 21 part-time and 4 full-time students. This bodes well for our ability to prime our immediate workforce needs with graduates while ensuring that more students take up potential scholarships in teacher education abroad.

Madam Speaker, the Institute of Education is also collaborating with the Ministry of Education to deliver the Let's Teach VI programme to equip new teachers with the foundational skills required for their new roles in the classroom. This programme will run from October through May 2024 and will consist of nine modules delivered via a blended modality for students across all of the islands.

Madam Speaker, the Robert Mathavious Institute at HLSCC will be hosting the capstone presentations and graduation of 18 students in the second cohort of the Certificate in Fintech, Allow me here to express my sincere thanks and appreciation on behalf of the College to the Deputy Premier for advocating for a grant of \$75,000.00 from the Government of the Virgin Islands to defray the tuition costs of Virgin Islanders. This cohort boasted teams of students that worked on projects for the Inland Revenue Department of St. Kitts, the Ministry of Health Nursing Council St Kitts, BVI Finance, and HLSCC.

Madam Speaker, the RMI has recruited new faculty and current enrollments stand at 23 students pursuing ACCA certifications. Several students are working towards completing RMI certificates in International Financial Services and

Compliance. The RMI is currently taking applications for various diploma levels of the International Compliance Association.

Madam Speaker, the College must also be commended for its new relationship with the prestigious Fulbright programme. Through the US-UK Fulbright Commission, HLSCC has established the BVI Fulbright Scholar Award. This programme brings professors from universities in the United States to spend 6 months in residency in the BVI, teaching at the College, conducting interdisciplinary research, and delivering public lectures.

Madam Speaker, over the summer break, the College kept busy. It delivered its second annual cultural summer camp which included historical tours of Tortola, Virgin Gorda, and Guana Island, culinary lessons, sports, games, numerous community presentations, and a cultural extravaganza. In addition, HLSCC continued its long partnerships with KATS by hosting the KATS Basic Sea Skills camp at the Centre for Applied Marine Studies where students learned to sail and operate rowboats along with the necessary safety skills.

Madam Speaker, the College continues to attract international attention and partnerships. Earlier in the summer, the College and the Unite BVI Foundation hosted Well/Beings Mangrove Symposium with a number of international guests as well as a forum between the mangrove nursery project teams at both HLSCC and the Viegues Conservation and Historical Trust. Both mangrove projects receive considerable funding from the Well/Beings Group.

Madam Speaker, the Centre for Applied Marine Studies continues to be a centre for meaningful research. The Darwin funded soils project in partnership with the Department of Disaster Management and the University of Portsmouth represents real potential for several applications that require testing the soils of the territory. The Centre also hosted a visiting group of professors and students from our sister school Guttman Community College in

New York with particular interest in marine and environmental science.


Madam Speaker, with respect to workforce training, the College has recently expanded its Beyond Curriculum offerings with a series of technical workshops in partnership with MarineMax and Nanny Cay Resort and Marina. The first course in Air Conditioning Systems was delivered by Tim Craveiro of WEBASTO while the second in Water Making Systems was delivered by JT Halden of Halden Marine Service on behalf of SPECTRA Watermakers. This month, HLSCC will be offering courses in Basic Outboard Engine Tech with Mercury Marine and Basic Diesel Engine Tech with Volvo-Penta.

Madam Speaker, the College is also looking forward to the third BVI Lit Fest in collaboration with the Department of Culture and the BVI Tourist Board with sponsorship from the Unite BVI Foundation, VP Bank, National Bank of the Virgin Islands and others. The festival will be from the 2nd to the 5th of November as one of the first activities of Culture and Tourism Month and I encourage everyone to take the opportunity to attend any of the several events planned. An impressive list of guest authors has been confirmed and more information will be made public shortly.

Madam Speaker, the President of the College has just returned from representing the College at an academic fellowship at the Stellenbosch Institute of Advanced Study in South Africa where he worked on a future manuscript and delivered a literary lecture alongside scholars from across the world.

Finally, Madam Speaker, I wish to encourage us all to support the important work that the College does as it completes the first year of its new strategic plan. The institution is tasked to play many roles in the Territory and when it succeeds in its mission, it can be a true source of national pride for all of us.





MOROCCO - Powerful quake in Morocco kills more than 2,000 people and damages historic buildings in Marrakech

Casualty figures expected to rise as the search continues and rescuers reach remote areas following 6.8 magnitude tremors.

A magnitude 6.8 earthquake shook Morocco late Friday night, causing more than 2,000 deaths, according to the latest figures from the Ministry of the Interior. Buildings collapsed in the provinces and cities of Al Haouz, Marrakech, Taroudant, Chichaoua, and Ouarzazate, which were the worst-affected by the earthquake. The epicenter was located in Ighil, around 45 miles southwest of Marrakech and at a depth of 18 kilometers (11 miles). The injured are being treated in hospitals, according to the Ministry of the Interior, and the emergency services are searching for survivors among the rubble. The Moroccan authorities have called on citizens to remain calm and have mobilized security and civil protection forces in the affected provinces, as well as resources to inspect and assess the damage.

At least 2,012 people died in the quake, mostly in Marrakech and five provinces near the epicenter, Morocco's Interior Ministry reported Saturday night. At least another 2,059 people were injured — 1,404 critically - the ministry said. [El Pais]

ELTON JOHN - Elton John was hospitalized after a serious fall at his home in Nice, southern France last weekend.

The 76-year-old was at home with his family when he slipped. The singer's husband, David Furnish, took him to a local health centre as a precaution. After staying at the Princess Grace of Monaco hospital overnight John has now returned home.

He was released and sent home on Monday morning after passing a number of medical tests. He will continue his recovery alongside his partner and their two children at his home on the French Riviera.

RUSSIA - British American Tobacco will complete its exit from Russia by selling its assets to a consortium of local management members over the next month, the multinational company said Thursday.

The maker of Kent and Rothmans cigarettes said the deal would keep its estimated 3,000 Russian and Belarusian employees afloat for at least two vears.

"BAT has now formally entered into an agreement to sell its Russian and Belarusian

businesses compliance in with local and international laws," the company said in a statement.

"We anticipate that the transaction will [be] complete within the next month, once certain conditions have been satisfied," it added.

Since December, the Kremlin has forced foreign companies leaving the country to sell their assets to Russian buyers at a 50% discount and charged them an exit fee of at least 10% of the transaction value. [The Moscow Times


SACRAMENTO — California voters oppose the idea of the state offering cash payments to the descendants of enslaved African Americans by a 2-to-1 margin, according to the results of a new poll that foreshadows the political difficulty ahead next year when state lawmakers begin to consider reparations for slavery.

The UC Berkeley Institute of Governmental Studies poll, cosponsored by The Times, found that 59% of voters oppose cash payments compared with 28% who support the idea. The lack of support for cash reparations was resounding, with more than 4 in 10 voters "strongly" opposed.

"It has a steep uphill climb, at least from the public's point of view," said Mark DiCamillo, director of the IGS poll.

Democratic Gov. Gavin Newsom and state lawmakers created California's Reparations Task Force in 2020 with the goal of establishing a path to reparations that could serve as a model for the nation. After two years of deliberations, the task force sent a final report and recommendations this summer to the state Capitol, where Newsom and the Democratic-led Legislature will ultimately decide how the state should atone for slavery. The remedies recommended in the report also go far beyond cash payments and include policies to end the death penalty, pay fair market value for jail and prison labor, restore voting rights to all formerly and currently incarcerated people and apply rent caps to historically redlined ZIP Codes that disadvantaged Black residents, among dozens of other suggestions. 

Dear Readers: SPEAK TO YOUR CHILDREN ABOUT BULLYING: (1 OF 4)

Tell a parent or guardian about the bullying. If you are being bullied, it's very important to tell an adult first and foremost.

- Tell your parents the entire story. Parents are here to help and want
 to know what is going on with you. Your parents, moreover, may
 then be able to get in touch with staff at the school in order to try
 to stop the bullying. This is important particularly if you don't feel
 comfortable telling your teacher or fear retribution from the bully.
- It's useful if you keep a diary of everything that happens. That way you can let your parents and other adults know about specific incidents

Report bullying and victimization incidents to the school. Inform teachers, principals, and other school helpers. These individuals have the power to intervene and help stop bullying. Sometimes bullies stop as soon as a teacher finds out because they're afraid they'll get in trouble.

- Teachers are especially important resources if you're being bullied.
 They can provide protection from bullying by letting you stay in the classroom during recess or by setting up a buddy system on your behalf.
- It's important to let your school know about any bullying incidents because there may be other kids being bullied by the same person Talk openly about bullying. Just talking to someone about your experience can bring you a bit of relief. Good people to talk to include a guidance counselor, sibling, or friend. They may offer some helpful solutions, but should not be approached in lieu of telling your parents or school personnel. Just talking about what you're experiencing and feeling can help you feel less alone.

Crispy, Crunchy, Caramel Dream: The Secret Behind Salted Caramel Honeycomb Granola

You guys! The crunch. I can't stop eating this stuff. Make this recipe at your own risk.

You know I love creating recipe mashups, right? Well, I wanted to do something fun with the old standby, granola. So, I spent a day in the kitchen going all "mad scientist" to create a totally new twist. I thought of the smell of burnt sugar, nostalgic like caramel corn at the mall. Oh, yes. Then, how about the crunch of light-asair honeycomb? Yes. Are you with me?

What if granola, caramel corn and honeycomb had a baby? And we ate it? I did it! It is amazing.

If you've never made granola from scratch, you're really missing out. It's easy, cheap and tastes so much better than the stuff you buy at the supermarket. But this. This recipe is exceptionally delicious, if I do say so myself. So light and crisp that it practically melts in your mouth. It's gluten free, too.

I kept it simple and affordable. The main granola ingredients are oats, peanuts or almonds, and crispy rice cereal. I chose to add crispy rice cereal to the oats because it's so light and crispy, and it adds great texture to this recipe. And the honeycomb caramel is just butter, brown sugar, honey or corn syrup, and baking soda.

Of course, you can add anything you like to this granola, I only suggest you choose ingredients that stay crunchy. Items like additional nuts and seeds, shredded coconut or toasted quinoa would be good. I'm not so sure about chewy dried fruit or chocolate. But if you try it and like it, let me know.

SALTED CARAMEL HONEYCOMB GRANOLA

Yield: about 7 cups Total Time: 35 minutes What You'll Need:

2 cups old fashioned oats

1 cup peanuts or sliced almonds, or more to taste

3 cups crispy rice cereal

1 cup brown sugar

1/4 cup honey or corn syrup

1/2 cup (one stick) butter

1/2 teaspoon kosher salt

1 teaspoon vanilla



1/2 teaspoon baking soda

Here's How:

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. You're going to do two things at once, like chewing gum and walking. Line a rimmed baking sheet with parchment. Spread the oats and peanuts on the pan. Place this in the oven for 5 minutes to toast. Stir and return to the oven for 5 minutes more.

Meanwhile, place the crispy rice cereal in a large heatproof bowl and set aside.

In a saucepan on medium heat, melt the brown sugar, butter and

honey or corn syrup. Stir this occasionally until it begins to bubble, then let it bubble for about 5 minutes.

Now get the toasted oats and peanuts out of the oven and mix with the rice cereal in the large bowl.

Next. remove the caramel from the heat and add the salt and vanilla. and stir. Next, whisk in the baking soda and watch as it gloriously foams and froths. Immediately pour this over the oat and cereal mixture in the bowl. Mix it all together with a couple of wooden spoons until the cereal is coated. Spread the mixture back on the prepared baking sheet. Bake for 10 minutes at degrees, stirring halfway through. Allow it to cool before breaking up and store at room temperature.

So, what to do with all this scrumptious stuff? You can serve this mashup on yogurt, ice cream or French toast, or use it to top sweet potatoes or give extra crunch to baked apples. Or eat it by the face full. I highly recommend it.

The Urgency of COSIS' Quest for Climate Justice Through ITLOS

STATEMENT BY SIR RONALD SANDERS, explaining why a group of small states have approached ITLOS for an Advisory Opinion

At A High-Level Dialogue on Climate Policy and other Key Issues in the Western Hemisphere

Organised by the Embassy of Antigua and Barbuda (Washington, DC) and Global Americans

Two years ago, in the margins of the COP 26 meeting in Glasgow, two small island states in two different parts of the world, took a decision to form an inter-governmental organization that would use the international legal system to seek justice for the considerable impact of Climate Change on their countries.

The Prime Ministers of Antigua and Barbuda in the Caribbean and Tuvalu in the Pacific, frustrated by the lip service being paid by the world's major contributors to Climate Change, and the broken promises of every previous COP meetings, decided that they would seek an Advisory Opinion from the International Tribunal of the Law of the Sea (ITLOS).

Consequently, they launched the Commission of Small Island States on Climate Change and International Law (COSIS).

They were subsequently joined by several other small states, including the Bahamas, St Lucia, St Kitts-Nevis and St Vincent and the Grenadines in the Caribbean and by Vanuatu, Palau and Niue.

ITLOS has agreed to full hearing of the case that small island states are advancing.

The first session will be held in Hamburg - on September 11th. What each of these small islands faces is a real and present threat to their existence.

THE GRAVITY OF THE SITUATION

Let's put into perspective the level of existential threat we're talking about.

We are looking at the potential disappearance of nations entire cultures and histories wiped out due to climate change.

This is not mere theory; the science is clear and irrefutable.

The primary culprits are the major polluters who have, thus far, shown a staggering lack of political will to remedy their actions.

COSIS: A MANDATE FOR JUSTICE

COSIS has a straightforward mandate: to develop rules and principles of international law to fight climate change.

Time is of the essence, and the stakes are as high as they could possibly get - the very survival of these countries and their people.

It isn't about politics; it's about the sanctity of human life and our shared planet.

WHY ITLOS?

Why go to ITLOS?

Small island nations are primarily maritime states.

They depend on the ocean not just for sustenance, but as a crucial part of their heritage and identity.

But there's more.

The ocean is a vital carbon sink.

With increasing ocean temperatures reaching record highs this summer, all nations must act now to safeguard this critical component of Earth's climate system.

ITLOS, the guardian of the 1982 UN Convention on the Law of the Sea, is the natural venue to seek legal clarity on the obligations of states to protect our marine environment.

COMPENSATION AND THE PRINCIPLE OF EQUITY

One of the most glaring injustices is that while small island states contribute the least to climate change, they suffer the most from its ravages.

The situation calls not just for mitigation but also for compensation.

The concept of loss and damage must be squarely addressed.

We are not just talking about climate change adaptation but also about building resilience against future threats.

All these require substantial financing.

If justice is to be served, major polluters must be held financially accountable.

THE ADVISORY OPINION: A BEACON OF HOPE

By going to ITLOS, we are not seeking to rewrite laws; we are seeking clarity on existing ones.

What are states obligated to do under the UN Convention on the Law of the Sea?

Small states need authoritative, scientific answers on this critical issue; but so too do the major contributors to Climate Change - there must be clear guidance on the consequences of their actions.

This Advisory Opinion from ITLOS can serve as a benchmark, a guidepost, for international actions going forward.

CONCLUSION: THE HOUR OF DECISION

We are at a fork in the road of human history.

On one hand, inaction and the continuation of empty promises, leading to existential loss for small island states.

On the other, immediate, effective action informed by international law.

And, we should all understand this reality.

As climate change continues to simultaneously burn our world, while flooding it; as Climate change upends weather patterns, ruining food production, and creating water shortages; as glaciers melt and the levels of seas rise, drowning small islands and eroding coastal areas; as people are displaced from their natural habitats and seek refuge on other shores, small island states are the first to suffer; but they will not be the last.

ALL ARE INVOLVED AND ALL WILL BE CONSUMED.

So to quote John Donne "do not ask for whom the bell tolls; it tolls for everyone".

Small Island States are working to tip the scales towards justice and survival.

But our plea is not just for us; it is for the health of a planet we all share.

BY TRANSPARENCY INTERNATIONAL

While some parts of the world are saying goodbye to the hottest summer (yet), the climate crisis is here to stay...

This week was Africa Climate Week, one of the four regional climate weeks leading

up to the 28th UN Climate Conference (COP28) the conclusion of the first global stocktake. In parallel, the Africa Climate Summit in Nairobi, Kenya brought together African countries to develop a unified approach to climate mitigation and adaptation strategies in the international sphere.

The summit was a muchneeded opportunity to bring African leaders together to discuss climate solutions to meet the Paris Agreement goals and demand countries in the Global North take responsibility for their contribution to damage in this region, with a particular focus on carbon emissions.

While it's a win to have African leaders' voices in the global dialogue on the climate crisis, it's crucial

that these policies also prioritise inclusivity and are rooted in the experiences of those most directly affected by climate change including women, indigenous communities and young people. The adopted Nairobi Declaration emphasises the need for collective action to make climate projects stronger and more effective, from design to implementation. And on this point, we wholeheartedly agree.

The declaration also calls on world leaders to rally behind a global carbon tax, including fossil fuels, and to reform the unjust international financial architecture that forces African nations to pay more to borrow money. However, what's missing is the importance of ensuring transparency and accountability as well as the crucial role of non-governmental groups, especially civil society and indigenous communities. This is particularly important considering

CARICOM Celebrates Steelpan as a Caribbean Cultural Touchstone

Friday, 11 August 2023 (CARICOM Secretariat, Turkeyen, Greater Georgetown):-The CARICOM Secretariat joins the world in celebrating steelpan on 11 August which has been designated by the United Nations General Assembly as World Steelpan Day.

We celebrate with Trinidad and Tobago, the birthplace of steelpan, the creation of the instrument which is now integral to the cultural fabric of the Caribbean.

The steel pan developed from discarded oil drums by marginalized youth in Trinidad and Tobago in the 1930s and has evolved from the margins to the mainstream Caribbean cultural expression. It represents a unique Caribbean creation, a symbol of resistance and a time-honoured tradition of musical excellence and is celebrated globally as the only acoustic musical instrument created in the

20th century.

The steelpan was widely used in CARICOM 50th Anniversary Celebrations in July 2023 with lauded performances at the "Golden Rhythms: CARICOM at 50" concert at the National Academy for the Performing Arts (NAPA) which featured an energetic solo steelpan performance by Rodney Small from St Vincent and the Grenadines and the National Steel Symphony Orchestra of Trinidad and Tobago.

More Than 5,000 Believed Dead in Libya Floods, Over 30,000 Displaced

The International Organization for Migration said Wednesday that the deadly flooding that hit eastern Libya has displaced more than 30,000 people.

The U.N. agency said at least 30,000 of the displaced were from the city of Derna, with thousands more from other areas including Benghazi.

More than 5,000 people are believed dead, with exact figures difficult to confirm in the country where rival governments have competed for control for a decade. Some officials say that number could double.

Hichem Abu Chkiouat, minister of civil aviation in the administration that runs eastern Libya, told Reuters that more than 5,300 bodies had been counted in Derna. The city was the hardest hit

after Mediterranean Storm Daniel brought torrential rains and two dams collapsed.

Fatma Balha, a medical student in Derna, told VOA English to Africa's Hassuna Baishu that the center of Derna has suffered major damage.

"It's all gone. All the buildings are gone. It all went with the floods, probably they have gone to the sea. We cannot see the building," Balha said. "I have my aunt. She's there and we cannot find her. None of her kids, none of their bodies, none. Not even the building. It's gone. It's not there at all."

The International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies said Wednesday the situation

in Derna is very bad and that international support is needed.

Mey Al Sayegh, the head of communications at the IFRC Middle East and North Africa office, said in a briefing on X that there is no clean drinking water in Derna and no medical supplies, and that the only hospital in the city could no longer take patients.

Al Sayegh said what is needed now is water, shelter, medical aid, food and psychosocial support.

Ahmed Bayram, media advisor for the Middle East for the Norwegian Refugee Council, told VOA's James Butty that Libya had already faced challenges for years and needs funding.

"This is going to be a

tragic situation for tens of thousands, not just in Derna, but also across Libya," Bayram said. "The thing about this is that Libya, with its many problems, has been off the headlines for months, if not over a year now. Now it's back in the spotlight and it is important to stress that Libya has been left

behind. The Libya crisis has been left behind. And now it's time for donors to get back on track and fund this emergency."

Death Toll Surges Above 2,900 in Aftermath of Morocco Earthquake

The death toll in Morocco has now risen to 2,900 after a 6.8-magnitude earthquake shook the High Atlas Mountains southwest of Marrakech on Friday. More than 5,500 people have reported injuries, more than twice the previous tally. Many survivors complain of a lack of aid from Morocco's government.

This earthquake is the North African nation's worst in more than 60 years.

After four nights exposed to the elements, locals who have been left homeless are frustrated with the emergency response.

Mehdi Ait Bouyali, 24, has been stranded along the Tizi N'Test, a lengthy road that connects Marrakech to outlying rural valleys. In the aftermath, he has been camping on the roadside with others who escaped.

They have received no government support and say if

not for food and blankets from strangers driving by, they would have nothing.

"The villages of the valley have been forgotten," he said. "We need any kind of help. We need tents."

Government spokesman Mustapha Baitas on Monday disputed the accusations of inaction.

"From the first seconds this devastating earthquake occurred, and in following the instructions of His Royal Majesty, all civil and military authorities and medical staff, military and civil, have worked on the swift and effective intervention to rescue the victims and recover the bodies of the martyrs," he said.

Rescue teams, including some brought in from Qatar, the United Arab Emirates, Britain and Spain, have built tent camps and have begun to deliver food and water where they can. But the situation is desperate for those in remote areas, where access routes have been obstructed by landslides, and where many live in old-style mud brick huts that have collapsed on their occupants.

Hamid Ait Bouyali, 40, who was camping with Medhi on the side of the road, described the devastation.

"The authorities are focusing on the bigger communities and not the remote villages that are worst affected," he said. "There are some villages that still have the dead buried under the rubble."

Everyday, citizens have been aiding in the response. Brahim Daldali, 36, of Marrakech, has been delivering vital supplies on his motorcycle to those hit the hardest.

"They have nothing, and the people are starving," he said.

All of the residents in the village of Kettou were miraculously

spared, as they were participating in an outdoor pre-wedding celebration. Meanwhile, their stone and mud brick houses were razed by the earthquake.

Some parts of Marrakech's old city were damaged, but most of the city emerged unharmed,

including buildings where the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank are scheduled to hold meetings in October. The government is reluctant to reschedule.

1st Nations League victory, ends BVI's 19-year CONCACAF winless streak By Dean "The Sportsman" Greenaway

Following 19 years of tournament futility, a jubilant celebration erupted at the A. O. Shirley Grounds at 5:20 p.m. on Saturday, after the final whistle was blown and the men's national team had secured their first CONCACAF Nations League victory, 3-1 over the Turks and Caicos Islands. The BVI's win ended TCI's three games winning streak.

Midfielder Luka Chalwell had a brace to lock down three points, with his first international goals in the 10th and 50th, after Captain and defender Troy Caesar, opened the account four minutes into the game by rising up above and splitting three defenders and steered a header into the net, off a left corner. All three scores came off assists by forward Tyler Forbes. Turks and Caicos' Billy Forbes

scored on a penalty in the 45th as the BVI led 2-1 at the break.

With the win in the League C Group C, the BVI is now 1-6-2 in Nations League play that began in 2018 and 1-24-4 in international play—its first outright victory including friendlies since July 17, 2012. Its last victory in a CONCACAF event came during a 2-0 home win over Bermuda in the Caribbean Cup Qualifier on November 27, 2004.

"I feel we deserved it. We had some good chances and should have been further ahead and then they got a goal before halftime and we lost it a little towards the end of the first half, but the boys dug in deep," BVI Coach Chris Kiwomya, who got his first win after taking the helm two years ago, told The Daily News. "It's a well deserved victory. I don't know how many years there has been since a competitive victory. I told them we needed to win and this was a game in which we thought we could compete. Everyone's above us in the rankings, so we're going to climb to make sure anyone comes here, it's a difficult game."

TCI's Coach Ricky Hill, said

they were disappointed with the outcome. "Congratulations to the British Virgin Islands. They deserved to win on the day. They seemed hungrier as a collective unit," Hill noted. "The boys came out and we didn't match their intensity early on, plus we invited pressure at the wrong time on our own which they capitalized on. Full credit to them for doing that. Really disappointed because we didn't establish any foothold in the game."

Chalwell said everyone played on their shift and it was a great performance with great teamwork. Getting a goal was the best feeling. "These are days I prayed for, and I'm so glad it came, finally. It's only the start," he said. "This is history in the making. This is only the start. We're not finished here. We're going to keep going and persevering. Thanks to the fans. They were amazing through the whole game and through thick and thin."

Caesar, who had his first international goal against TCI in 2019, said he was happy to lead the team to victory after not having a victory in "a very long time." "We

know that set pieces are something we can capitalize on and today was our day to capitalize on those pieces," he said. "I'm happy that I could have put away one today." The BVI will face Dominica on Oct 12 in St. Lucia, in their next League C game and their away lead in Turks and Caicos Islands on October 16.



Suspecting and Diagnosing Hereditary Hemochromatosis

DEAR DR. ROACH: My husband was diagnosed with hemochromatosis 13 months before he died. I recommended that his blood relatives get tested so they can get treatment early, if necessary. Some doctors don't know to check ferritin levels to make a diagnosis in a person with a family history of hemochromatosis. - C.G.

ANSWER: Hereditary hemochromatosis (HHC) is a genetic disease of iron overload. In a person with HHC, the intestines absorb as much iron as they can all the time, even if the body doesn't need it, whereas a person without HHC will simply stop absorbing iron if it isn't necessary. The iron can go into and damage many organs, especially the liver, heart, bone marrow, hormone-producing glands and

The diagnosis should be suspected in close relatives of an affected person. Although checking ferritin levels is useful in making the diagnosis, iron tests, total iron-binding capacity tests and hemoglobin tests should also be ordered. If the family member has a recognized genetic mutation, such as C282Y homozygote or C282Y/H63D compound heterozygote, those genetic tests may also be useful in making the diagnosis.

The diagnosis should even be suspected in people with vague symptoms, such as weakness and fatigue. I teach my students and residents to consider the possibility of iron overload, as it is common, easily tested for, and easily treated with phlebotomy (blood removal). Symptomatic HHC is more common at an earlier age in

men than women, but it still should be considered in younger women.

A clinician should also consider iron overload in people with enlarged livers or abnormal liver enzymes, diabetes, changes in skin tone (bronze or gray), heart failure and some kinds of arthritis. Most people with these conditions do not have HHC, but initial testing is cheap and easy.

Treatment can be done by donating blood. My first patient with HHC donated over 100 units of blood before his blood levels came down to the target range.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am one of the people who cannot take statins because of muscle pain. My cardiologist suggested Praluent, and it works fine - no muscle pain as well as very low HDL and LDL cholesterol levels for over two years now.

However, I keep seeing articles about muscle pain and statins and never see Praluent referred to as an alternative. Why? - T.G.

ANSWER: Alirocumab (Praluent) is an antibody to a compound called PCSK9. This causes the liver to remove LDL cholesterol from the blood and lower the levels of this "bad" kind of cholesterol. In turn, this leads to a reduction in heart disease risk among those taking the medication. It does not cause muscle damage. PCSK9 inhibitors may be used alone or in combination with statins


Unfortunately, the medication is expensive, about \$500 per month. It is most often used in people with known blockages in their heart, but some experts prescribe alirocumab in highrisk patients who do not have known blockages. Insurance coverage is not assured. Furthermore, it is given only as an injection, usually every two or four weeks.

PCSK9 inhibitors are an important tool in the fight against heart disease and are of special value in those at the highest risk or those who cannot tolerate a statin.

THE CARIBBEAN SHOULD BAN LETHAL AUTONOMOUS WEAPONS

Autonomous weapons pose a clear and present danger to the Caribbean. Action to ban them should be seriously considered now. This is one of four recommendation that I made in an address to a conference

on September 5, organised by the Caribbean Community Implementation Agency for Crime and Security on "The Human Impacts of Autonomous Weapons". This article is a shortened version of my address to law enforcement officers, lawyers and diplomats.

Autonomous weapons are weapon systems that can identify, target, and eliminate a person, a group of persons or an area without human intervention. Unlike remotely piloted drones or other systems that require a human to make the final decision to engage a target, autonomous weapons can carry out these actions on their own once they are activated.

So, why should the Caribbean region be alarmed at this phenomenon? There are several reasons. Our communities are already under stress due to increasing crime and violence. The illegal firearms that contribute to violent crime and homicides are a precursor to a more profound threat.

Can you imagine the impact of autonomous weapons being added to the arsenal of weapons that are now deployed in criminal activity? Consider a drone, meticulously programmed with facial recognition technology, set to target an individual. It scans, identifies, and eliminates its target all while operating undetected.

POTENTIAL TARGETS:

Autonomous weapons are diverse. They consist not only of drones but also of covert city devices and lethal robots. They can be precise, targeting key figures such as political leaders, judges, law enforcement officers -or anyone who opposes those who benefit from drug trafficking or other criminal activity.

Beyond individuals, our critical infrastructure is also at-risk including energy facilities that provide electricity to towns and cities, to ports, and to water supplies.

THE GLOBAL CONTEXT:

There is an increasing chorus within the international community advocating for a robust treaty to govern these autonomous weapons. Prominent international figures,

including the Pope, and the UN Secretary General António Guterres, have voiced their concerns.

Last October in the First Committee of the 77th United Nation General Assembly, a joint statement was issued, drawing grave concerns about lethal autonomous weapons systems.

The statement said, among other things: "... the introduction of new technological applications, such as those related to autonomy in weapon systems, also raise serious concerns from humanitarian, legal, security, technological and ethical perspectives. We therefore see an urgent need for the international community to further their understanding and address

these risks and challenges by adopting appropriate rules and measures, such as principles, good practices, limitations and constraints". Also, on July 20 this year, under the theme of "A new Age nda for Peace", the UN Secretary-General recommended that all countries should "conclude, by 2026, a legally binding instrument to prohibit lethal autonomous weapon systems that function without human control or oversight." The government of Costa Rica has also been proactive in galvanizing nations to address this worrisome issue.

The calls for international cooperation to curb autonomous weapons is a crucial step, but not all governments in the international community support this position. Indeed, some of them, which are already extensively using drones and other lethal machines in war torn areas and for targeting enemies, are resisting any binding treaties that limit their use of autonomous weapons. The Stop Killer Robots Movement has pointed out that this year's meeting of the Group of Governmental Experts on autonomous weapons systems, from May 15 to 19, ended without substantive progress.

Big countries that see benefits in these weapons are resisting strict rules. These nations are investing heavily in military applications of autonomous weapons, weaving them into the fabric of their defence strategies. They argue that these weapons can reduce human casualties in conflict or be more precise in targeting.

Anyone who doubts the capacity of these weapons, need only look at television coverage of the conflict between Russia and Ukraine to see the death and destruction they inflict.

SMALL STATES VULNERABILITY AND CARIBBEAN UNITY

How long before these weapons find their way into the wrong hands, unchecked and unregulated? While international negotiations grind slowly forward, the Caribbean cannot afford the luxury of



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waiting. Caribbean vulnerabilities are immediate and tangible.

Caribbean borders are vast stretches of open sea, posing substantial challenges. Policing these expanses for inter-state trafficking, especially for high-tech, compact autonomous weaponry, is a daunting task. Moreover, Caribbean governments would be burdened with an unaffordable increase in costs.

For instance, law enforcement agencies would need to be revamped, counter-terrorism units established, and intelligence networks enhanced. Our vast maritime borders are conduits for trafficking, and the introduction of autonomous weapons into this mix is a nightmare scenario. Given the high stakes, Caribbean nations need not, and should not, wait for global consensus. Their unity can be their strength. A regional approach, where Caribbean nations come together to enact stringent legislation, can set a powerful precedent.

PROPOSED REGIONAL ACTIONS:

Here are four ideas for collective regional action:

First, an immediate step should be the introduction of laws strictly banning the importation of autonomous weapons. By ensuring they don't enter our shores, we minimize the immediate threat.

Second, those found breaching these laws should face severe repercussions. From heavy fines to lengthy prison sentences, the message must be clear: the Caribbean will not tolerate the proliferation of these weapons.

Third, beyond possession and trafficking, the actual use of such weapons should carry even more substantial penalties, potentially maximum terms. This deterrence will underscore the gravity of the act.

And fourth, with the United Nations General Assembly gathering in October 2023, Caribbean States have an opportunity to take leadership in pushing for meaningful progress towards a new legally binding instrument. Every Caribbean leader at the General Assembly should include this call in their statements. Also, with the same vigour that small states at the UN fight against the existential threat of Climate Change, they should fight against the fatal threat of our police forces being overwhelmed by criminals armed with autonomous weapons.

CONCLUSION

To conclude, the Caribbean region, with its unique vulnerabilities, stands at a crossroads.

Our States can be proactive, adapting our laws and bolstering our defences, or we can risk being overpowered.

Sargassum Seaweed Causes Water Interruption on Virgin Gorda

The Ministry of Communications and Works was advised that the Sargassum Seaweed at Handsome Bay inhibited the operation of the water production of the Desalination Plant. In turn, the distribution of water was disrupted to customers in the Valley, Virgin Gorda.

The Handsome Bay Water Plant Company, Aqua Design, advised that due to the overwhelming amount of Sargassum Seaweed, the pre-filtration system of the open sea intake was inundated and partially blocked, minimising the amount of seawater that could be processed. As such, plant production had to be reduced to maintain adequate pressure to the equipment. Failure to maintain over 30 psi to the equipment could result in catastrophic equipment failure.

The Ministry was further advised by Aqua Design that the change in tide over the weekend shifted the Sargassum Seaweed, allowing for increased plant production. Plant operators will continue to monitor the intake condition and make the necessary adjustments while the long-term solution will be implemented within the upcoming months. It was also stated that at this point, water production has resumed to normal operations.

The Ministry of Communications and Works and multiple stakeholders are working together to try and alleviate this water supply challenge.

The Ministry of Environment, Natural Resources and Climate Change, responsible for overseeing environmental protection and climate change, is embarking on developing sustainable solutions to prevent further seaweed infiltration into the system at Handsome Bay.

The Ministry sincerely apologises for the inconvenience caused by the reduced water supply and assures the residents that efforts are being made to address the issue to minimise reoccurrences and develop long-term solutions.






