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PROSPECT REEF CHANCES OF REBIRTH IMPROVING

After what seems like years in limbo Premier and Minister for Finance Dr. the Hon. Natalio Wheatley announced that the much-touted and long lamented Prospect Reef resort project is finally shaping up. The BVI Leader announced recently that the project is about to move forward.

According to Hon. Wheatley, the Prospect Reef project will see the current horribly dilapidated resort transformed into a state-of-the-art, five-star hotel resort, featuring comprehensive conference facilities. This establishment, he said, is going to diversify the Territory's economic landscape.

The recent formation of the Prospect Reef Board signals a revitalization of the project, which had previously experienced a long period of mystifying stagnation. With the Board now in place, the government has issued a request for proposals to bring the vision of a luxury hotel resort

to fruition. This development represents a pivotal moment for Road Town and the wider BVI community, heralding a new era of business and leisure opportunities. "We're happy that we would have finally, after a long period of time, gotten the Board together. And their first order of business is to

put out a request for proposal for a five-star branded hotel resort which would include conference facilities," Premier Wheatley remarked during a recent press briefing.

The Prospect Reef resort is designed to accommodate a substantial number of guests. Premier Wheatley underscored the strategic importance of the new resort, not just as a luxurious getaway for tourists in the heart of the capital, but also as an essential hub for hosting international business events. The facility is expected to facilitate arbitrations, board meetings, and a plethora of conventions and events such as medical conferences, thereby bolstering the economic substance of the BVI by providing premium amenities for business operations.

It was opined that the Prospect Reef Development is more than just a project; rather a representation of a significant milestone in the BVI's journey towards economic diversification and growth.

In his 2024 Budget Address, the Premier described the Prospect

Reef project as a priority. He said: "The redevelopment of Prospect Reef is our top priority. We are diligently working to establish the new board by the end of this year and to issue the Request for Proposals for a new resort facility at Prospect Reef in early 2024."

PREVIOUS CRITICISMS
Late last year, the government's management of the Prospect Reef redevelopment project faced scrutiny, with Sixth District Representative Hon. Myron Walwyn criticizing the slow progress and the deteriorating condition of the site. His analysis in the House of Assembly sparked a debate about the future of the once-promising tourist attraction, especially in light of impressive developments in neighboring Caribbean nations.

Hon. Walwyn highlighted the stark contrast between the

current state of Prospect Reef and the thriving investments seen in countries like Jamaica, Dominican Republic, Bermuda, Bahamas and Barbados which have experienced substantial growth, particularly in the hotel industry. He remarked: "When I inquired about new developments, I received no satisfactory answers. Yet, when you observe other Caribbean nations, you witness remarkable progress... I recently read that Jamaica plans to add another 8,000 hotel rooms by 2024, expanding over the next two to five years."

Drawing attention to the neglected state of Prospect Reef, which once boasted a thriving hotel development and various tourist attractions, Hon. Walwyn questioned the government's commitment to rejuvenating the site. He voiced his concerns, stating: "We have

nothing left. When you drive through Prospect Reef, it's now hidden beneath overgrown bushes. What are we doing? This is not about politics; it's about the well-being of our citizens. Many are struggling in the BVI, and I'm not sure if we fully grasp the gravity of the situation."

In response, Premier Wheatley acknowledged the historical challenges associated with the Prospect Reef redevelopment project but firmly pledged to see it through. He added: "Our economy is not all doom and gloom. Our primary economic pillars are performing well. As for the new investments, some of them are already in progress, and we will complete these projects." He also noted that some of these projects could have been completed by previous administrations but were not.

JOE'S HILL MANOR PROJECT HEAVILY CRITICISED AS INADEQUATE AND HIGHLY EXPENSIVE

More criticisms have been repeatedly leveled at the Social Security Board's Joe's Hill Manor Project and the fact that the current property price is too high for the average person to afford.

The Joe's Hill Manor Estate's housing development comprising twenty-five buildings with fifty-two residential units and a commercial rental space, continues to come under scrutiny for its high pricing and utility issues, particularly water scarcity.

The most recent naysaying about the real estate endeavor were made during a recent edition of the talk show "Hot Seat", hosted by Julian Gordon and former legislator Walwyn Brewley,

also known as 'GM', on ZBVI. During the broadcast on 6 March, a caller raised concerns about the difficulties in filling the units at the estate, questioning the barriers preventing potential occupants from moving in.

Responding to this inquiry, Brewley highlighted a critical issue at the Joe's Hill House Development Project: the lack of water supply. "They don't have any water up there," he stated, emphasizing the severity of the utility problems facing the development.

The Joe's Hill Development Project was originally initiated by then Premier Dr. Orlando Smith, OBE, with the intention of stimulating the construction industry and

providing low and medium-income housing solutions. However, according to Mr. Gordon, the project's initial objectives seemed to have shifted over time. Despite the Social Security Board's (SSB) claim that the development was never intended as low-income housing, the talk show hosts argued that the current pricing structure contradicts the notion of affordability.

With prices starting at \$275,900, Brewley questioned the affordability of the units, humorously noting that one would need to "win the Puerto Rico lottery" to afford a one-bedroom unit at the estate. His comment highlighted the gap between the development's prices

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FINES AND POSSIBLE PUNITIVE MEASURES FOR CITIZENS NOT PARTICIPATING IN NATIONAL CENSUS

The Deputy Premier, Hon Lorna Smith, who also serves as the Minister for Financial Services, Trade, and Labour, has issued a critical call to action for residents to participate in the ongoing national census. While speaking in the House of Assembly during the debate of the Statistics Amendment Act 2023, Hon Smith highlighted the significance of the census for the Territory's development and governance; and lamented the indifference and poor public participation thus far.

The Statistics Amendment Act 2023 is set out to reinforce the capabilities of the Central Statistics Office, aiming to improve the quality, accuracy, and reliability of data collection processes in the BVI. As Hon. Smith discussed the merits of the legislation, she

told the House of Assembly that the census, which is a pivotal tool for informed policymaking and planning, is currently far behind schedule, with only 30% progress made towards its completion deadline in June 2024.

Hon. Smith mentioned that the reluctance or outright refusal of individuals and entities to submit the required information is a major hurdle in the current census work. This non-compliance issue, she said, has far reaching and ineluctable consequences as the lack of information will not only affect the operational capacity of the Central Statistics Office but also significantly impair the government's ability to formulate and implement evidence-based policies crucial for the Territory's advancement.

To counteract these challenges, the proposed legislation includes measures to introduce stiffer penalties for non-compliance, incorporating administrative fines and penalties aimed at boosting participation rates. According to Hon Smith, these measures are intended to enhance compliance, ensure efficient enforcement, provide increased deterrence, and uphold procedural fairness, rather than to generate revenue. The penalties for failing to comply with government data collection efforts could reach up to \$5,000.

Hon Smith passionately implored the BVI community to actively participate in the census and support the data collection initiatives. "Right now, we are supposed to finish by June, and we are only 30% of the way. We need to have that census

completed for important reasons," she emphasized, pointing out the critical need for the data in planning and development efforts.

"I urge every resident of our islands to actively engage with enumerators during census activities and to participate wholeheartedly in all forthcoming surveys and data collection efforts as mandated by the Statistics Act," Hon Smith stated, stressing the importance of community involvement in shaping the BVI's future.

MEMBERS OF THE OPPOSITION AGAINST FINE

Although Hon. Smith explained that the fine is necessary to move the census forward, Leader of the Opposition Hon. Ronnie Skelton explained that this might be too much for the business community to bear. Hon. Skelton stated: "If

you come to my business and tell me that you will charge me \$5,000 if I don't give you this information, I haven't even made \$5,000. I don't know if it's going to help or be a deterrent to get the information. It needs a different approach to get the information – let them know that if you need the trade license you have to submit this information," Hon. Skelton said.

Similarly, Sixth District Representative Hon. Myron Walwyn also voiced his concern about the matter stating that it is a heavy-handed approach. Hon. Walwyn said: "Going to fines all the time, the country is becoming too punitive. Do this or else, do that or else. What about saying, do this for this reason and this is how it benefits the country?"

FUTURE OF JET SKI IN THE BVI DISCUSSED

During the Ninth Sitting of the First Session of the Fifth House of Assembly on 5 March, a significant announcement was made regarding the future of jet ski use in the Territory; as Premier and Minister of Finance, Dr. the Hon Natalio Wheatley addressed questions raised by Deputy Speaker and Opposition Member, Hon Stacy Mather, about the current restrictions on jet ski operations within the BVI.

Hon Mather's inquiries highlighted the community's concerns regarding the disparity in jet ski ownership

and operation permissions and sought clarification on any existing legislation or policy governing such activities. Additionally, Hon. Mather queried the government's intentions towards modifying or lifting these constraints for both commercial and recreational uses.

In his response, Premier Wheatley affirmed that jet skis are presently listed as prohibited items for importation under the External Trade Importation of Jet Skis Restriction Order Cap 288, a legislation that enforces a ban on their use in the Territory. However, he

disclosed that a draft policy concerning the regulation of jet skis has been prepared, signaling a potential shift in the government's approach to this matter.

The Premier elaborated that the Ministry of Tourism would lead a consultation process with a range of stakeholders to discuss the draft policy and decide on the future direction based on the feedback received. This announcement indicates the government's openness to reevaluating the existing restrictions and potentially integrating jet skis into the Territory's marine and tourism activities, subject



to appropriate regulatory measures.

While specifics on the start date of the consultation process and the identification of stakeholders were not provided, the Premier opined that the projected consultation aims to address and mitigate any challenges that might arise

from the reintroduction of jet skis, ensuring that any policy adjustments align with the Territory's safety, environmental, and economic interests.

Hon Mather expressed appreciation for the Premier's candidness and remarked on the public's likely positive reception to the news.

Local Farmers To Discuss Regenerative Agriculture

The Department of Agriculture and Fisheries is preparing to host a community conversation on regenerative agriculture.

Junior Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries Honourable Dr. Karl Dawson said regenerative agriculture seeks among other things, to rehabilitate soil, use water efficiently and to have a positive impact on climate change.

Honourable Dr. Dawson said, "The aim of the community conversation is to take an informed look at issues in relation to effective agriculture

including regenerative agricultural approaches."

He added, "While there will be a presentation, the power behind the experience will be the opportunity for various farmers to share their experiences and build a learning network of farmers throughout the Territory. Such a network will be key to the revitalisation of agriculture in the Territory."

The event is scheduled for Wednesday, March 13 as part of activities to mark Agriculture and Fisheries Exhibition and Market 2024 being observed under the theme, "Sow the Seeds of Sustainability: Youth Fueling Food Security". The session is geared towards farmers but is also opened to the public.

The session will be moderated by Founder and Executive Director of the Virgin Islands Good Food Coalition Mrs.

Sommer Sibilly-Brown of the US Virgin Islands who is a consultant and leading advocate for the development of a robust local food system in the Virgin Islands.

The regenerative presentation will be made by Agroecologist and farmer Ms. Nea Talbot of Full Belly Farm, Mount Fertile in Tortola who also has a strong interest in traditional farming methods.

Other presenters will include local farmers Johanna Marrugo of Rasta Livity Farms, Virgin Gorda; Aragorn Dick-Read of Good Moon Farm, Dr. Latisha Martin of the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries, and Gregory and Marreth Smith District Northside Farm.

All participants will have the opportunity to share their experiences in facilitated break-out groups.

The session will take place in Lecture Room 2 in the L Adorothy Turnbull Building



at the Elmore Stoutt High School from 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.

NSC acknowledged that the Territory unfortunately recorded its first homicide for 2024.

NSC further acknowledged that the recent murder is shocking and disturbing, and therefore reiterated its zero-tolerance policy to crime. NSC encouraged all communities throughout the Territory to support the police in the current investigations, specifically anyone who had contact with Mr. Smith over the past 24 to 48 hours, by calling Crime Stoppers and the confidential and untraceable **hotline 800-8477[TIPS], 800-847-8477 and 368-9339**.

NSC continues to deliberate strategically on all options to confront and eradicate the scourge of crime in the Territory.

NSC also extended its condolences to the family of Mr. Smith, and recommitted to introducing measures and any relevant legislation to bring a resolution to this and all other unsolved crimes.

The National Security Council considers matters relating to internal security and any significant security developments in the Territory, including the occurrence of significant criminal activity.

The NSC comprises the Governor, as Chairman and members, including the Premier, the Minister for Communications and Works, the Attorney General (ex-officio) and the Commissioner of Police (ex-officio).

Tortola, British Virgin Islands, March 7, 2024 – With the Paris 2024 Summer Olympic Games just five months away, private sector businesses have stepped in to support the BVI Olympic Committee's roster of elite athletes on their journey to the Games. The announcement of Clarence Thomas Ltd (CTL), DLT Solutions, Conyers and Capriccio as key sponsors of the renamed Tahesia Harrigan-Scott Elite Athlete Scholarship (THSEAS) fund was made at a media briefing held at the BVIOC office in Road Town on March 5.

For the past twelve years, starting in 2012, the BVIOC has provided a stipend framework that funds the development of the BVIOC's elite athletes who are on track to compete for medals at major Games.

The annual funding for the elite athlete scholarship initiative – renamed on March 5, 2024 to the Tahesia Harrigan-Scott Elite Athlete Scholarship – is currently \$200,000 each year and comes in the form of athlete grants from the International Olympic Committee's Olympic Solidarity (OS) and Panam Sports and is disbursed directly to the BVIOC's quadrennial roster of elite athletes. The athletes are identified in collaboration with the National Federations, International Federations and OS.

The BVIOC's current roster of elite athletes – all of whom are national and regional record holders with proven track records in major Games – include Kyron McMaster, silver medalist in World Championships and world ranked

#4 in the men's 400m hurdles, Chantel Malone (long jump), Eldred Henry (shot put), Rikkoi Brathwaite (100m) Adaejah Hodge (200m) and Thad Lettsome (ILCA 7 laser sailor).

"With medals in mind, the BVIOC is seeking to boost the monthly stipend for the 6 athletes on our roster identified as likely to make the team for Paris 2024 which takes place this summer July 26 – August 11," said BVIOC and BVI Commonwealth Games Association President Ephraim Penn. "The annual sum for the programme has already been allocated and we are very grateful for the sponsors that have come on board this year to help with the additional funds required by the athletes to continue to cover the services of their respective coaches and therapists over the next five months."

Explaining more about the scholarship programme, BVIOC/BVICGA Treasurer Mark Chapman said, "The THSEAS stipend contributes to training and coaching, athlete support including access to sports medicine, physical therapy, performance analysis, nutrition counselling, and mental resilience training. These resources are critical in helping athletes reach their full potential and achieve success at the international level. Our reporting system for the grants ensures accountability and transparency in the distribution of funds."

USA - Fresh off his defiant State of the Union address, President Joe Biden on Friday laced into former president Donald Trump — by name this time — as he and his senior aides began barnstorming the country to aggressively sell his vision for a second term to voters.

The president is trying to ride the post-speech momentum to Pennsylvania and Georgia for campaign events in two critical battleground states that he flipped in 2020 and is hoping to keep in his column this November. He arrived at a private home in the pivotal Philadelphia suburbs along with his wife, Jill Biden, to hold what his campaign billed as a “kitchen table” conversation with brothers Jack and David Cunicelli, the owners of 320 Market Cafe, and their families ahead of remarks to supporters at the local middle school. He’ll move on to New Hampshire, Wisconsin and Michigan next week.

Biden’s reelection campaign was almost giddy after the speech, vowing to stay on the offensive against Trump. Introducing her husband at Strath Haven Middle School, Jill Biden said, “Last night, Joe showed the world what I see every day.”

While Biden had referred

only to his “predecessor” during Thursday’s speech before Congress, on Friday it was a different story on the campaign trail, as Biden and his wife laid into Trump for raising the deficit, rolling back abortion access and fomenting the Jan. 6, 2021, insurrection at the Capitol.

He also blamed Trump for the coarsening of the country’s political discourse.

“When you ride down the street and there’s a Trump banner with an F-U on it and a little 6-year-old kid putting up his middle finger,” Biden said. “Did you ever think you’d hear people talk the way they do? It demeans who we are. That’s not America.” [EI Pais]

HAITI - The area surrounding Haiti’s National Palace in the capital Port-au-Prince witnessed a new escalation of violence Friday night, according to the Spanish news agency EFE. A series of shootings has raised the tension in a large area of the capital’s center as confusion grows over what happened. Last week has been one of the most chaotic since the assassination of president Jovenel Moïse in July 2021. In the past few days, more than 3,000 prisoners escaped from several prisons, the country’s main airport has been attacked and the military

and police have clashed with organized crime gangs, led by former police officer Jimmy “Barbecue” Chérizier, who threatened a civil war if the prime minister and acting head of government Ariel Henry — who is currently in Puerto Rico — does not resign.

In Haiti, a country gripped by violence, where little information gets out, there are contradictory versions about what happened on Friday night. Some argue that the goal of the armed gangs was to seize the National Palace, the official residence of the president. Images shared on social networks also show large holes in the walls of the Port-au-Prince airport.

Friday day began without incident in the metropolitan area of Port-au-Prince. Shot were fired in the afternoon, but it was not until the early hours of the night, that chaos broke out.

Tension in Haiti has been escalating since February 28, after Henry agreed to hold general elections before the end of August 2025. The violence reached its peak last Saturday, when armed gangs entered the two main prisons in the capital, allowing more than 3,000 prisoners to escape. Henry, who has been persecuted by armed gangs since Moïse’s assassination, has not been able to return to the country, where flights to and from Miami and Santo Domingo were cancelled this past week. [EI Pais]

JAMAICA - Jamaica is the

highest-ranked Caribbean country on gender equality, according to the World Economic Forum’s Global Gender Gap Index 2023 report.

Each year, WEF compiles a report that measures the extent of gender-based gaps among four key dimensions: Economic Participation and Opportunity, Educational Attainment, Health and Survival, and Political Empowerment, then gives each country a ranking between 0% (the lowest possible gender equality) and 100% (the highest possible gender equality). The analyses of each country are intended to serve as a basis for designing effective measures for reducing gender gaps.

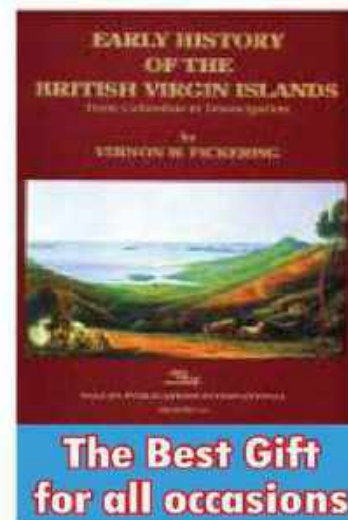
The top ten countries for gender equality include four Nordic countries: Iceland, Norway, Finland, and Sweden; as well as their European neighbors: Germany, Belgium, and Lithuania; the Asian Pacific country New Zealand; Nicaragua in Latin America; and Namibia in Africa. [CNW]

USVI - In a bid to strengthen its ties with neighboring Caribbean nations, the US Virgin Islands (USVI) is making significant strides towards establishing a functional cooperation agreement with the Caribbean Community (CARICOM).

The USVI’s endeavor follows its recent reintegration into the Caribbean Tourism Organization, comprising 25 member states.

This move signifies the territory’s renewed commitment to regional cooperation and economic integration. [CNW]

TURKS & CAICOS - A state of emergency was declared in Haiti over the weekend following jailbreaks that resulted in some 3000 dangerous criminals, including murderers and kidnappers, escaping back onto the streets of the poor and violence-racked nation. On the heels of this news, the TCI’s National Security Council met to strategise ways to combat an impending flood of illegal migrants into the country. Former Deputy Premier, Hon Sean Astwood has urged the government to take long-term and urgent action regarding the TCI’s border security as dangerous convicts and armed gangs roam the streets of Haiti, terrorising its citizens.



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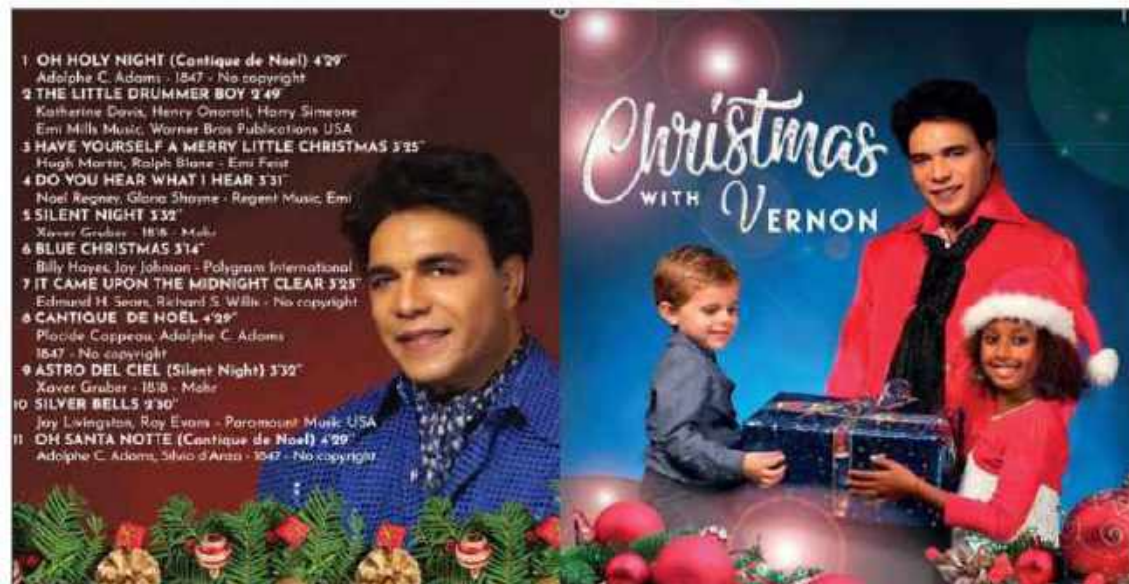

Astwood’s call came on the heels of the jailbreaks on Saturday which saw 3000 inmates - from murderers to kidnappers and other dangerous criminals - escaping Haiti’s National Penitentiary following a two-day siege on the overcrowded facility by armed gangs. [TCI Weekly]

JAMAICA - The Jamaican Government assured Friday that it wants to avoid “an avalanche” of Haitians in its territory and that it will only take in some specific refugees, such as children from an orphanage and World Bank staff. Jamaican Minister of National Security Horace Chang explained to Parliament that the Andrew Holness Administration is reviewing the situation and that any initiative “would not allow Jamaica to be overwhelmed by an influx of refugees.” “We will legitimately agree to take in a number of persons, specifically orphans from an orphanage that was isolated,” said Chang, who detailed that the Mustard Seed Community NGO is making the arrangements. The head of National Security also detailed that the World Bank has asked Jamaica to bring its personnel from Haiti to this neighboring country and is “working on the process to achieve it.” [Dominican Today]

Discover the Magic of Irish Soda Bread: A Taste of Ireland's Culinary Tradition

As St. Patrick's Day approaches, what better way to celebrate than by embarking on a journey into the heart of Ireland with the time-honored tradition of making hearty, soul-warming Irish soda bread?

Irish soda bread is not just a tasty treat, it's also a symbol of Irish heritage and resilience. Its humble origins reflect the resourcefulness of the Irish people during challenging times, making it a beloved part of Irish culinary tradition.

There is an organization -- The Society for the Preservation of Irish Soda Bread -- that is very serious about defending this tradition. So, I'd better get it right.

One of the charms of Irish soda bread lies in its simplicity. Traditional recipes call for just four main ingredients:

Irish soda bread pairs well with butter and jam, use it for sandwiches, or alongside a hearty stew.

flour, baking soda, salt and buttermilk (although I add a pinch of sugar to mine). This straightforward recipe makes it easy to whip up a loaf at a moment's notice with the bonus of costing less than a dollar! This truly qualifies as frugal and fabulous.

Unlike yeast bread, which requires time for the dough to rise, Irish soda bread can be made quickly. The wheat grown in Ireland is very soft with low protein, like cake flour, and doesn't rise well using yeast. But it's perfect for making soda bread. The chemical reaction between the baking soda and the acidic buttermilk causes the bread to rise immediately, resulting in a loaf that's ready to bake right away.

There is a charming folk belief surrounding the cross sliced into Irish soda bread. While the practical purpose of the cross is indeed to help the bread bake evenly, folklore suggests that it also serves another, more whimsical function: to let the fairies out. According to this tradition, the cross is meant to ward off evil spirits and protect the household.

TRADITIONAL IRISH SODA BREAD

Yield: One loaf or 4 to 6 servings

Total Time: 1 hour

4 cups all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking soda

1 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon sugar

1 3/4 cups (14 ounces) buttermilk or soured milk, see below

If you're going to "sour" milk instead of using buttermilk, mix 1 3/4 cups milk with 1 1/2 tablespoons white vinegar or lemon juice. Let this rest for 5 minutes. It should look slightly curdled. If it's not, then add a bit more vinegar or lemon.

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. In a large bowl, sift and combine the dry ingredients. Make a well in the middle and add buttermilk, mixing by hand or with a fork to form a sticky dough. Place on floured surface and lightly knead, just enough to bring it together into a round. Resist the urge to over knead, or the bread will be gummy. Form a round flat shape and cut a cross in the top of the dough to bake more evenly (and let the fairies out).

You have choices for how to bake this: You can bake it in an oiled but not preheated cast iron skillet, in a greased and floured round cake pan or on a greased baking sheet. They all work. Bake for 40 to 50 minutes. When done, the bottom of the bread will sound hollow when tapped. I like to brush the crust with melted butter. Serve warm, slathered with more butter.

Irish soda bread is not only a tasty and versatile treat, but it also carries with it a rich history and cultural significance. Plus, it's a cinch to make! Why not give it a try in your own kitchen? Erin go brag!

RVIPIF PENALTY FREE TINT TESTING

Monday, March 11 – The Royal Virgin Islands Police Force is set to conduct tint testing this Friday, March 15, from 3 to 5 pm at the Road Town Police Station.

The motoring public is encouraged to make the most of this initiative, as there will be no penalties for illegal tint readings. Taxi operators are also strongly encouraged to seize this opportunity, taking advantage of the absence of cruise ships in port, to avoid potential stops while transporting tourists.

Sergeant Glenn Callwood states "The maximum penalty for illegal tints is \$750 per glass, so we are urging persons to take advantage of the free testing to ensure they are abiding by the law."

Additionally, it's important to note that adding extra tints, even if within the permissible percentage, to any vehicle that already has factory tinting may be deemed illegal and would have to be removed

WOMEN'S ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT

The 8 of March was International Women's Day, an opportunity to celebrate the achievements of women around the world and advocate for gender equality. This year's theme is dedicated to women's economic empowerment, highlighting the potential for communities to thrive when women are given equal opportunities to earn, learn and lead.

The reality, however, paints a different picture. In Sub-Saharan Africa, approximately 462 million people live in extreme poverty despite an economic growth rate of 3.3 per cent in 2023. According to the Gender Inequality Index, women in this region are among the poorest, have limited ownership and control of assets, lower levels of decision-making power, restricted access to public services and heightened vulnerabilities due to economic insecurity and financial dependence.

But when faced with corruption, the situation becomes more dire. Corruption fuels inequalities in accessing essential services and reduces the quality and quantity of resources available to the public, especially women, girls and other groups who experience marginalisation, including persons with disabilities, members of the LGBTQI+ community and ethnic minorities. Our most recent Global Corruption Barometer (GCB) - Africa, confirms this. One in four of the surveyed users of public services paid a bribe. With women comprising two-thirds of all patients in public health systems and accessing education services, they are the most affected.

Women are also vulnerable to other forms of corruption, like sextortion - when those entrusted with power use it to sexually abuse those dependent on that power. Our research shows that marginalised women are disproportionately targeted with sexual advances and are less likely to report these instances of corruption, as they face higher risks of reprisals. There are inhibiting factors leading to this, such as limited access to information, the weight and impacts of biased social norms and a general fear of victimisation from those with power.

Take Rwanda, for instance. While the country has made remarkable strides in improving gender equality, women

and girls continue to experience sextortion when pursuing educational opportunities.

Transparency International Rwanda found that several forms of corruption mar internship programmes for students in technical and vocational schools. Students report demands for bribes to obtain approvals for internships as well as incidents of sextortion perpetrated by authority figures, such as teachers and supervisors.

In Madagascar, women continue to face barriers when accessing education and healthcare. Transparency International Initiative Madagascar found that women are often at risk of discriminatory corruption during family planning, including extra charges for birth control pills, implants and other forms of contraceptives.

Malagasy women are also at a very high risk of corruption during the maternal delivery stage. There are reported cases of midwives demanding payments for otherwise free services as well as referrals for unnecessary caesarean procedures that induce extra costs. Women who cannot afford to pay these fees risk their own safety and their babies' lives. Similarly, our chapter's Advocacy and Legal Advice Centres (ALAC) has confirmed reports of women being asked to pay for childbirth support, which should be free, with higher payments demanded for baby girls than boys.

Stay tuned as this year, we will launch a report on the corruption risks in the health and education sectors in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Ghana, Madagascar, Rwanda and Zimbabwe, which will be used as a tool to strengthen public institutions' capacity to implement gender-responsive anti-corruption policies. We are doing this in partnership with six national chapters and the Transparency International Global Health Programme to advocate for improved access to education and healthcare services for women and girls.

On this day - and every day - the global community must take immediate, targeted and effective action to address gendered forms of corruption and barriers that prevent women and girls from fully enjoying their fundamental human rights. We call for governments, regional and international institutions, as well as civil society, to commit to dismantling the patriarchal and discriminatory structures that stand in the way of gender equality, in Africa and beyond.

US Commits \$100 Million More to Multinational Force for Haiti Amid Violence

— U.S. Secretary of State Antony Blinken announced on Monday the United States would commit an additional \$100 million to a United Nations-backed multinational security force intended to assist Haitian police in combating gangs, along with \$33 million in humanitarian aid.

This would bring the total of U.S. contribution to the security force to \$300 million.

In February, the United States pledged \$200 million to support the Kenya-led Multinational Security Support mission, or MSS, in Haiti. The U.S. said that the deployment of the mission will help the Haitian National Police create the security conditions necessary to conduct free and fair elections.

Monday, Blinken joined Caribbean leaders in Kingston, Jamaica, to discuss a proposal to "expedite a political transition" to resolve the unfolding crisis in Haiti, including possible deployment of the U.N.-backed multinational security forces.

The proposal, developed in partnership with the Caribbean Community, known

as CARICOM, and Haitian stakeholders, comes as Haitian Prime Minister Ariel Henry faces pressure to resign or agree to a transitional council.

According to a statement by U.S. officials, the transition would occur via "the creation of a broad-based, independent presidential college," a reference to a proposed committee that would oversee Haiti ahead of elections.

In Kingston, Blinken said that the Haitian people are confronting "a political crisis, escalating violence, unrest," an "untenable situation" that requires urgent action both politically and in terms of security.

State Department spokesperson Matthew Miller told VOA that the United States aims to accelerate the deployment of the U.N.-backed mission U.N. Multinational Security Support, or MSS, mission in Haiti, because escalating gang violence is endangering its government.

"We continue to look to expedite that mission as soon as possible," Miller said during a Monday briefing, adding the U.S. has been in conversation

about the deployment with the government of Kenya and other countries.

"I can assure you that the United States will do its part to fund that important mission," Miller said.

UN reaction

At the United Nations, all 15 U.N. Security Council members strongly condemned "the increasing violence, criminal activities, mass displacement of civilians and human rights abuses" in a Monday statement.

U.N. Secretary-General Antonio Guterres' chief of staff is representing the U.N. at the CARICOM meeting in Kingston.

"The MSS mission is a critical step toward creating an environment conducive to free and fair elections, as well as alleviating the humanitarian crisis," said U.S. Ambassador Linda Thomas-Greenfield.

The expedient MSS deployment is a top priority for U.S. President Joe Biden's administration, she said.

Canada has committed \$91.2 million, and others, including Benin, France, Germany, Jamaica and Spain, have announced financial, personnel and logistical support.

Sunday, the U.S. military airlifted nonessential embassy personnel from Haiti and deployed additional U.S. forces to reinforce embassy security. This operation is in response to escalating gang violence that has prompted hundreds of thousands to flee their homes and threatens to bring down the government.

The State Department said the security situation in Haiti is "unpredictable and dangerous," and the U.S. Embassy's ability to assist U.S. citizens is

"severely limited."

The State Department's travel advisory for Haiti has remained at Level Four — do not travel to Haiti — since July 2023.

"U.S. Embassy Port-au-Prince has been on Ordered Departure status since July 27, 2023. Adjustments during this time are not uncommon, nor do they represent a change in our overall posture," a State Department spokesperson told VOA.

Concerns from critics

Some critics note that while both Democratic and Republican lawmakers support ensuring a more stable Haiti, some are concerned about the Biden administration's policy toward the nation.

Ana Rosa Quintana-Lovett, a senior policy director for the Vandenberg Coalition think tank in Washington, said Haiti's political future is not being driven by Haitians but rather by the international donor community.

She told VOA Monday that Haitian Prime Minister Henry's "leadership is untenable" and that Henry fails to grasp that he does not have the support of the Haitian people.

"The United States needs to understand that whatever diplomatic messages they are publicly releasing, frankly, are falling on (Henry's) deaf ears," she added.

She also pointed out congressional concerns over proposed Kenyan-led multinational forces. "Kenyan forces don't speak Creole, so how are they going to engage and work with the Haitian National Police? I mean, there are just so many loopholes in the approach," she said.

Dire situation

Haiti declared a state of emergency on March 3, following attacks by gangs on the main prisons in the capital city of Port-au-Prince. Prime Minister Henry was in Kenya at the time, finalizing a deal for a U.N.-supported peacekeeping mission aimed at addressing Haiti's gang violence.

The gangs demanded Henry's resignation. He is reportedly stranded in the U.S. territory of Puerto Rico.

Amid escalating gang violence in Port-au-Prince, the Haitian government extended the state of emergency until April 3, and the nighttime curfew until Monday.

According to the International Organization for Migration's office in Haiti, the violence perpetrated by armed gangs has forced over 360,000 people across Haiti to flee their homes.

UNICEF has warned that critical social services in Haiti are on the verge of collapse, and that the humanitarian response that millions of children and civilians rely on as a last resort has been severely impaired.

Political transition process

Henry was appointed, not elected, after the assassination of President Jovenel Moise in 2021. Henry had initially promised to step down by early February but later said security must be reestablished first to conduct free and fair elections.

On February 29, CARICOM said the Haitian prime minister had committed to organizing general elections by August 31, 2025. CARICOM stated its intention to send an assessment team by March 31 of this year to evaluate electoral needs, aiming to support the planning and establishment of relevant institutions.

Greater Georgetown, Guyana - Friday, 1 March 2024 -

Heads of Government agreed to establish a committee led by Vice President Bharrat Jagdeo of the Co-operative Republic of Guyana to examine innovative ways to finance the CDF.

CLIMATE CHANGE AND CLIMATE FINANCING

Heads of Government reviewed the situation facing the Region as it relates to Climate Change and took stock of the outcome of COP 28. They noted the continuing inadequacy of the international response and the rapidly closing window of opportunity to limit global warming to 1.5 degrees Celsius above pre-industrial levels despite many commitments and promises. Heads issued a Statement on Climate Financing.

GLOBAL AND

HEMISPHERIC ISSUES

The Conference expressed grave concern with the ongoing situation in Gaza.

They acknowledged efforts made by Member States of the Community to support the residents of Gaza facing catastrophic food insecurity, displacement, and intersecting humanitarian crises, given the operational challenges facing the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East.

They also acknowledged the need for CARICOM to advocate for a positive resolution, and underscored the pre-eminent role that the Community can assume with Trinidad and Tobago as the current President of the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) and Guyana as a member of the United Nations Security Council (UNSC) and President of the Council in February 2024.

Heads of Government issued a Statement on the Ongoing Situation in Gaza.

HAITI

PREPARATIONS FOR THE 2024 ICC T-20 CRICKET WORLD CUP

The Conference received an update on preparations for the ICC Men's T20 World Cup 2024 from Dr. Kishore Shallow, President of Cricket West Indies.

Six Member States (Antigua and Barbuda, Barbados, Guyana, Saint Lucia, St. Vincent and the Grenadines, and Trinidad and Tobago) will host matches of the International Cricket Council (ICC) Men's T20 World Cup 2024 Tournament from 4 - 30 June 2024.

The Conference noted the indication from the CWI President that to date, CWI has received four million applications for tickets from 120 countries. Heads of Government urged the CWI to put measures in place to ensure the availability and ease of access to tickets for matches by the people of the Region who have long been passionate supporters of the sport.

The Conference underscored the unique character of West Indies Cricket and the importance of a strategic review of cricket both as a game and business towards ensuring growth and sustainability of the sport in the Region. In that context, Heads acknowledged the proposal by Dr. the Honourable Keith Rowley, Prime Minister of Trinidad and Tobago and Chairman of the CARICOM Prime Ministerial Sub-Committee on Cricket, to host a conference on West Indies Cricket on 19 April 2024 in Port of Spain to explore the business trajectory for the sport.

Heads of Government expressed appreciation for the technical work that the Health, Safety and Security Sub-Committee (HSSC) had commenced to facilitate hassle-free travel and improved citizen security for the 2024 T20 Cricket World Cup.

REPARATIONS

The Meeting heard from Sir Hilary Beckles, Chairman, CARICOM Reparations Commission, and Prime Minister Mottley, Chair of the Prime Ministerial Sub-Committee (PMSC) on Reparations, on the successful advocacy of the CARICOM Reparations Commission over the past decade, in bringing global attention to the Region's call for Reparatory Justice.

They endorsed the Regional Strategic Framework as recommended by the PMSC, and

approved the Regional Work Plan and Budget for 2024 - 2026.

The Conference proposes to place more emphasis on direct engagement, advocacy and negotiations, including strengthening partnership with the African Union. They agreed to broaden the context for Reparatory Justice to include native genocide, chattel enslavement, indentureship and colonialism, and recognised the peculiar circumstances of overseas territories in the Region in relation to Reparatory Justice. They requested the PMSC on Reparations to advise on modalities for their involvement in CARICOM's Reparations agenda.

They also agreed to seek to have Reparations included on the agendas of the SIDS Conference in Antigua and Barbuda in May 2024, and the Commonwealth Heads of Government (CHOGM) Conference in October 2024.

CARIFESTA

Heads of Government welcomed the offer from Barbados to host XV CARIFESTA in August 2025.

HIGH LEVEL DIALOGUE WITH GUESTS

Heads of Government extended a warm welcome to Special Guest of the Conference, His Excellency Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva, President of the Federative Republic of Brazil. They noted that his presence is indicative of the strong bond between the Region and Brazil and that the two sides share a rich history of South-South cooperation and are united by geography as well as by a common desire to build prosperity for their peoples.

They expressed appreciation for the instrumental role played by Brazil in facilitating the Guyana-Venezuela Joint Commission in January 2024.

The Conference highlighted the immense potential for mutually beneficial cooperation in areas including Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation; Disaster Preparedness; and Food and Nutrition Security, especially for the Region's 25 by 2025 initiative.

President Lula expressed his great joy to be present at the Conference. He noted that his country took a strategic decision to prioritise its relationship with countries in CARICOM. He underscored Brazil's support for efforts to address the Region's priorities of climate change, regional security,

intra-regional connectivity, and sustainable development including through advocacy at the G20 during Brazil's Presidency in 2024.

The Second CARICOM-Brazil Summit is to be held in 2024.

Heads of Government also welcomed His Excellency Adel Al-Jubeir, Minister of State in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia. They looked forward to the early opening of a CARICOM House in Saudi Arabia as well as the formalization of a mechanism to ensure other projects in the pipeline are realised. The Minister of State underscored his country's desire for a long-term partnership in areas including trade and investment, environment and climate change, and education.

ENGAGEMENT WITH SIR CLIVE LLOYD

The Conference received Guyanese cricketer legend, Sir Clive Lloyd and announced the consensus of the Community to confer on him the Region's highest honour, the Order of the Caribbean Community (OCC)

They lauded his sustained excellent performance over decades and hailed him as "one of the brightest examples of leadership" from the Region.

BELIZE - GUATEMALA AND BELIZE - HONDURAS

The Heads of Government received an update on the Belize - Guatemala and the Belize - Honduras cases before the International Court of Justice (ICJ) and commended the Parties for their willingness to seek a peaceful resolution to all legal claims against Belize to land and insular territories and to any maritime areas pertaining to those territories, through the ICJ. They called on all Parties to abide by the ICJ decision when delivered, and to work together to demarcate the borders in compliance with the ruling.

The Conference expressed concern over the continued illegal activities by Guatemalan nationals along the Belize - Guatemala border and called on the Guatemalan Government to dissuade its nationals, in accordance with the Confidence Building Measures signed in 2005, from entering Belizean territory. They called on both governments to work together to confront illicit activities along the Belize - Guatemala border by organizing joint patrols with the assistance of the Organization of American States (OAS).

They commended the work carried out by the OAS in reducing tension and building good neighbourly relations between Belize and Guatemala and encouraged both countries to continue to mobilize resources for the operations of the OAS office, whose work will continue to be critical including after the ICJ decision on the territorial, insular and maritime dispute.

GUYANA - VENEZUELA

Heads of Government received an update on developments in Guyana/Venezuela relations. They decried the significant Venezuelan military border activity, but noted a lowering of tensions since the Joint Declaration of Argyle for Dialogue and Peace between Guyana and Venezuela, was issued on December 14, 2023, following the meeting of the Presidents of the two countries.

They welcomed the convening of the first meeting of the Foreign Ministers of Guyana and Venezuela and their technical teams in Brasilia on January 25, 2024, as a positive step to rebuilding cooperation between the two countries, while the International Court of Justice determines the case concerning the land boundary.

Heads also noted that Venezuela has until April 8, 2024, to submit its counter-memorial on the merits of the case regarding the validity of the 1899 Arbitral Award that had determined the boundary between British Guiana and Venezuela, and urged it to do so.

They reaffirmed their solid support for the maintenance and preservation of Guyana's sovereignty and territorial integrity.

CANDIDATURES

Heads of Government expressed CARICOM's endorsement of the candidature of H.E. Albert Ramdin, Minister of Foreign Affairs, International Business and International Cooperation of Suriname, for the post of Secretary-General of the Organization of American States.

APPRECIATION

Heads of Government expressed their appreciation to the Government and People of Guyana for their excellent hospitality and the arrangements as Hosts of the meeting.

OUTCOME DECLARATION OF CARICOM, INTERNATIONAL PARTNERS AND HAITIAN STAKEHOLDERS

11 March 2024

KINGSTON, JAMAICA

The text of the following statement was released by the Caribbean Community (CARICOM), Haitian stakeholders, the United Nations, the Governments of Brazil, Canada, France, Mexico, and the United States of America, on the announcement of a transitional governing arrangement between the Haitian stakeholders, in Kingston, Jamaica.

CARICOM Secretariat, Turkeyen, Greater Georgetown, Guyana - Tuesday, 12 March 2024:

Today, [11 March 2024] CARICOM convened Haitian Stakeholders and the following International Development Partners: Brazil, Canada, France, Mexico, the United Nations, and the United States of America to discuss the multidimensional crisis in Haiti.

This meeting followed a series of discussions over a period of time, including those facilitated by the Eminent Persons Group, which engaged a wide range of actors including Haitian political parties, the religious community, private sector, the diaspora, and civil society.

We are pleased to announce the commitment to a transitional governance arrangement, which paves the way for a peaceful

transition of power, continuity of governance, an action plan for near-term security, and the road to free and fair elections. It further seeks to assure that Haiti will be governed by the Rule of Law. This commitment reflects hard compromises among a diverse coalition of actors who have put their country above all differences.

To that end:
We acknowledge the resignation of Prime Minister Ariel Henry, upon the establishment of a Transitional Presidential Council and the naming of an Interim Prime Minister.

And the following is agreed:
The creation of a Transitional Presidential Council comprised of seven voting members and two non-voting observers. The seven voting members will comprise one representative from each of the following groups: Collectif, December 21, EDE/RED/Compris Historique, Lavalas, Montana, Pitit Desalin, and the Private Sector. The non-voting members will be represented by one member from Civil Society and one member of the Interfaith community. The Council will exercise specified presidential authorities during the transition, operating by majority

vote;

The exclusion from the Transitional Presidential Council of:

anyone who is currently on a charge, indictment or has been convicted in any jurisdiction;
anyone who is under UN Sanction;
anyone who intends to run in the next election in Haiti;
anyone who opposes the UN Security Council (UN SC) Resolution 2699.

The Transitional Presidential Council will swiftly select and appoint an interim Prime Minister;

The Transitional Presidential Council will together with the Interim Prime Minister appoint an inclusive Council of Ministers;

The Transitional Presidential Council will hold the relevant and possible powers of the Haitian presidency during the transition period until an elected government is established. The Transitional Presidential Council will undertake the following:

Appoint an inclusive Council of Ministers; co-sign the orders, decrees and to sign off on the agenda of the Council of Ministers set the essential criteria for the selection of an impartial

Provisional Electoral Council (CEP) and establish the Provisional Electoral Council;

make arrangements for a peaceful transition, ensure continuity of governance, and establish a national security council;

continue collaboration with all members of the international community for the accelerated deployment of the Multinational Security Support Mission authorized by UNSCR 2699/2023.

It is agreed that implementation of these measures will be conducted in parallel.

The parties also made specific, individual commitments regarding principles of inclusion, integrity, a restoration of peace, and an orderly transition of power.

These shared and individual commitments can represent important steps toward facilitating increased humanitarian access to help ease the suffering of the Haitian people. The international community stands ready to partner with Haiti to achieve these goals.

Haitian participants must now fully implement their commitments. Haitians deserve a country where children can go to school and their



parents know they will be safe. We commend the willingness and courage of Haitian stakeholders to commit to put Haiti back on a path toward democracy, stability, and prosperity.

With a framework in place that illuminates a path forward, it is incumbent upon all Haitians to give the agreement a chance to work, to enter into a process of national dialogue, and to lay the groundwork for a transition that is based on inclusivity, encourages participation by all stakeholders, and paves the way for elections as soon as possible. This is the only sustainable path to a future of strong democratic institutions, peaceful resolution of conflict, and security and prosperity for all Haitians.

Haiti's Prime Minister Resigns

Prime Minister Ariel Henry of Haiti is resigning from his post. He will step down after the establishment of a transitional authority that will govern the violence-plagued nation until new elections are held.

President Irfaan Ali of Guyana made the announcement late Monday in the Jamaican capital

Kingston, where leaders of the regional body Caribbean Community, or CARICOM, have been meeting to discuss the crisis in Haiti. Ali holds the rotating chair of CARICOM.

CARICOM issued a statement saying the transitional council will be made up of seven members, six of them representing various Haitian political coalitions and the seventh a representative from the private sector, plus two non-voting members from civil society. The transitional council will select the new prime minister and begin the process to hold the next presidential elections.

"Haitians deserve a country where children can go to school and their parents know they will be safe," the

statement said. "We commend the willingness and courage of Haitian stakeholders to commit to put Haiti back on a path toward democracy, stability, and prosperity."

Henry's reported resignation comes a week after his plane was forced to land in the U.S. Caribbean territory of Puerto Rico when it was denied entry into the Dominican Republic, which shares the island of Hispaniola with Haiti.

Henry had departed Haiti the week before on a mission to the South American nation of Guyana and the east African nation of Kenya to gain support for the deployment of a multinational United Nations peacekeeping force to Haiti, which has been plagued by brutal and uncontrolled gang violence in

the capital, Port-au-Prince, and beyond.

The gangs used Henry's absence to attack the National Penitentiary and another prison in Port-au-Prince, killing several people and allowing thousands of inmates to escape into the city. Gangs also staged shooting attacks on Haiti's main airport.

Jimmy "Barbecue" Cherizier, the leader of an alliance of gangs that staged the attacks, said the gangs would not allow Henry to return to Haiti and urged him to resign.

The government has declared a state of emergency and a nighttime curfew.

During the conference with regional leaders in Jamaica

Monday, U.S. Secretary of State Antony Blinken announced that Washington would contribute an extra \$100 million to support the U.N.-backed security force in Haiti, along with another \$33 million in humanitarian aid.

Henry, a neurosurgeon by profession, has served as acting prime minister since the 2021 assassination of President Jovenel Moise plunged the Caribbean nation into chaos. He was scheduled to step down in February, but delayed elections due to the worsening security situation and a political stalemate with opposition forces.

An unidentified U.S. official told reporters that Henry will be allowed to remain in Puerto Rico.

Carlisle's 12-year ESHS title drought ends with thrilling victory over O'Neal

In one of the most competitive Elmore Stoutt High School inter-house track and field championships in recent years, Carlisle, House 4, claimed their first title in 12 years on Friday, after erasing defending champion O'Neal, House 2's 28-point lead. They secured the title with victories in the final two 4x200m relays.

O'Neal—who ended a 22-year title drought last year—went into Thursday's two-day competition leading Carlisle 353½ points to 325½ points, after a series of pre competition day events.

After Thursday's day one that included the 100m, 400m and 4x100m relays and heading to Friday's finale, O'Neal led Carlisle, 564½—543 points. Carlisle began their title drive by dominating all divisions of the 800m on Friday, scored well in the 200s and pulled within 734½-731 with two relays left, before dethroning the champs, after one of their runners engaged in unsportsmanlike behavior, walked off the track and they didn't score. Carlisle won the last two 4x200m relays and finished with 752 points for its eight overall title and first since 2012. O'Neal amassed 726½

in second, Flemming, House 3, placing third with 674½ and Lettsome, House 1 finished with 660.

"I knew my 18+ we going to eat up those relays. I already did the math in my head, the calculations were there," Carlisle House Captain Janneel Cannonier, told Island Sun Sports. "Even if the mishap didn't happen with their 18+ girls, we were still going to beat them. It would have been a smaller gap, but we were still going to beat them, so we knew before the 18+ relays that we had this."

Cannonier said they have only won once since she has been Captain and it feels really, really good and they're looking for more. "We want to do a five, 10-year stretch," she said. "We don't want to do one and done."

O'Neal's Captain Andre Roberts said it was a very competitive event and key injuries cost them the title. "But we're coming back strong next year again, look out for O'Neal," he said. "Working the points out in my head as we went along, I had it worked out that we would have had five points wiggle room—if they didn't disqualify House 3 (Flemming U17 Boys who beat Carlisle), I could have afforded to come second twice, and that would have allowed me to win by ½ a point. Unfortunately, we had a mishap on the 18+ girls relay and that really put the nail in our coffin."

Roberts said it's one of the best championships they've had in years and scores were extremely close. "At no point, anything was assured to anyone," he noted. "Everybody had to come out and leave it on the track. I'm super, super proud of Miss Cannonier and her team and students. They did exceptionally well. I look forward to coming for them next year."

Carlisle's athletes won or tied three for the six division titles at stake: U15 Girls, M'Kenzi Crabbe, Lettsome, 46 points. U15 Boys: Cadeon Fraites, Lettsome, 39. U17 Girls: Jamelia Chambers, Carlisle, 50. U17 Boys: Tiondre Frett, O'Neal, 50. 18+Girls, Deneil Clarke, Carlisle, 42. 18+Boys: (tie). Jabari Pemberton, Lettsome and Jonathan Lynch, Carlisle, 42. Victrix Ludorum: Tiondre Frett, O'Neal, 50. Victrix Ludorum: Jamelia Chambers, Carlisle, 50.

"It means a lot to me because I was down for three years, now it feels very pleasing for me to come back and win all my five events," Frett, whose mother DeAnny Wattley is one of only three women to have won the Victrix Ludorum between 1957 and 2024, told Island Sun Sports. "I was really motivated because once she did good, I knew I could follow in her footsteps."

Chambers said winning the Victrix meant a lot. "I came out with the mindset that I was going to win and I did," she said, noting that the 800m was the toughest event.

"I was pushing myself on the homestretch and it was a lot. I was tired but I was determined to win."

ESHS Phys Ed. Dept head Rhennie Phipps, told Island Sun Sports that it was a "distance race" for the last two days between Carlisle and O'Neal. "It came down to just one mistake—one big mistake—and O'Neal has to live and come again next year, Carlisle gets bragging rights for the next year," he said. "It was a fabulous competition. We had some good performances. It's getting better and better."

Hodge runs 60m PB

Adaejah Hodge ran a 7.22 seconds 60m personal best and was second in the New Balance Indoor Nationals in Boston, after running 7.29 in the semis and

7.34 in the prelims. She repeated as 200m champ when she stopped the clock at 22.96 seconds. She capped her competition by helping Montverde Academy 4x400m Relay, shattering their year old Girls High School National Record of 3 minutes, 45.69 seconds, with a time of 3:18.18.

Gumbs 13th in Nationals

Northwestern State's strongman Djimon Gumbs was 13th in the NCAA Indoor Championships Shot Put in Boston, with a heave of 18.60m (60'½). In his outdoor season opener at the McNeese Cowboys Relays, twin brother Diamanté was 2nd in the Hammer Throw, with a mark of 53.71m (176'2"), the 3rd best mark of his career, after claiming the Discus Throw with 52.68m (172'10").

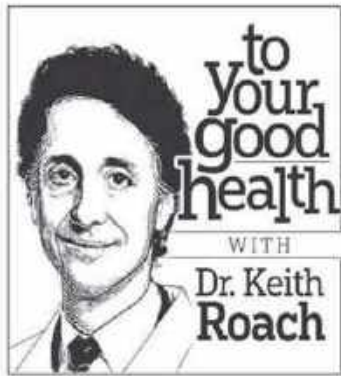

Proton-Pump Inhibitors Highly Recommended for Barrett's Esophagus

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am a retired male over 65 and a former occasional cigar smoker. I quit 15 years ago after I was diagnosed with Barrett's esophagus. I was also a former drinker and quit seven years ago. I regularly completed all the biopsies as required and took my proton-pump inhibitor (PPI) daily as instructed.

This year, I read an article about PPIs contributing to dementia and neuropathy, which I have. My primary care physician suggested that I switch to over-the-counter H2 blockers as a safer approach. I developed an irregular heart rhythm and soaring blood pressure.

I was then diagnosed with atrial fibrillation (AFib). My stress test and echocardiogram are normal for my age. I am now on some heavy-duty beta blockers, blood thinners and a very expensive rhythm-control drug.

A book I recently read written by two top cardiologists stated that long-term use of PPIs is dangerous and can cause AFib, but a recent article published by the National Institute of Health states the opposite. I also read that an irritated esophagus stimulates the esophagus nerve and triggers AFib. I'm confused now.

Because Barrett's vastly increases my chances for getting a very aggressive cancer, doing nothing is not an option. I have already mod-

ified and continue to modify my diet, but that only goes so far. And as I'm sure you are aware of, a stroke caused by AFib is often life-threatening.

My complicated question is, which professional approach would you recommend: PPIs or H2 blockers? Is there a third option? — B.B.

ANSWER: There is not a definitive answer on whether PPIs, like omeprazole, increase the risk of AFib. Studies are potentially confounded by the fact that people with AFib sometimes think they have stomach problems and may take a PPI, leading to a false association between the PPI and AFib. As you say, there have also been studies that suggest a decreased risk of AFib in people who use PPIs.

In my mind, the increased risk of adenocarcinoma of the esophagus as a result of untreated stomach acid reflux in a person with Barrett's esophagus is the key in this situation, as Barrett's is a condition where abnormal lining of the esophagus occurs due to years of acid exposure.

I do not believe over-the-counter H2 blockers, like famotidine (Pepcid), are adequate enough to reduce the risk of esophageal cancer, so I advise patients in your situation to use PPIs, despite their known risks.

The data suggesting a risk of dementia are weak. While there might be a small risk, the risk isn't high enough to avoid using a PPI in a person with Barrett's. B12 deficiency is absolutely a risk in people taking long-term PPIs. Low B12 can certainly lead to neuropathy, but both can be prevented and treated by testing for B12 deficiency and by getting supplementation, if needed.

I am very glad to hear you are getting routine endoscopic surveillance and biopsies so that any abnormal growth of the esophagus can be identified and treated promptly.

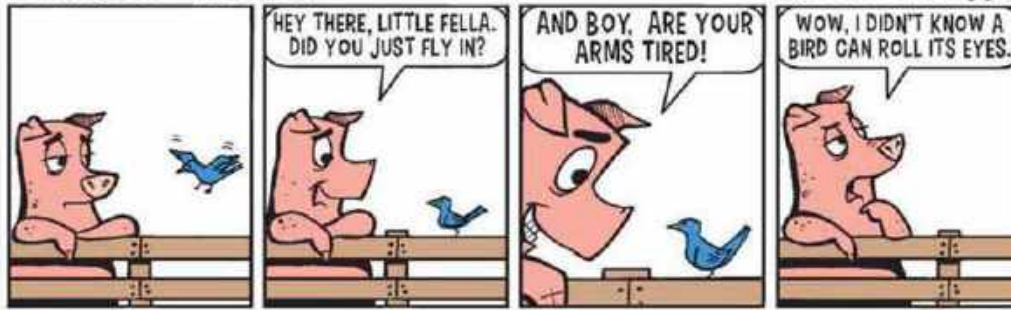

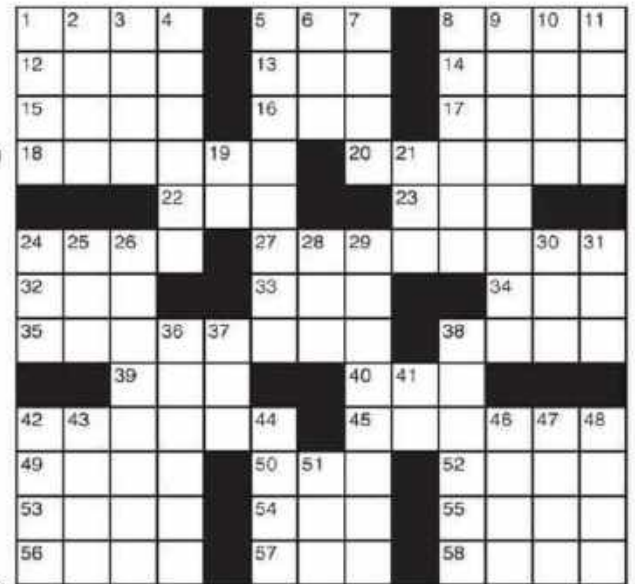

THE URGENCY OF INTERNAL UNITY TO RECLAIM HAITI

In international diplomatic circles, Haiti is on everyone's lips but not in actions that could urgently remedy the suffering of the Haitian people.

Similarly, within Haiti and its diaspora, Haiti's tragic situation is constantly discussed but no viable solutions are proposed, nor are sustainable actions taken.

While this delay and inaction persists, the gangs, which have already taken effective control of the country, are fashioning an accord amongst themselves on the theme of "Living together". It is an unholy pact in which the gangs are sharing the spoils of power and collaborating to do so, ignoring the laws of the country. They are also dictating political actions through threats and intimidation.

Hence, the present unelected Prime Minister, Dr. Ariel Henry, has been warned that if he returns to Haiti, he will be executed. Henry is reportedly trapped in Puerto Rico, unable to find a way to re-enter Haiti after attending a meeting of CARICOM Heads of Government in Guyana, and then travelling to Kenya to sign a reciprocal security agreement on March 1. While he was in New York on his way back to Haiti, the gangs attacked the main penitentiary, releasing approximately 4,500 inmates, including prominent gang members.

This extraordinarily gruesome warning to Dr. Henry has been made by gang leader, Jimmy Chérizier, also known as "Barbecue". It has been backed up by Guy Phillippe who was recently released from a U.S. prison after conviction for human trafficking and is now heading a political group.

Significantly, apart from the members of the Cabinet that Henry appointed, not one person or group in Haiti has called for his return to the country. Of further significance, he is yet to be offered safe passage from U.S. territory to Haiti by the U.S. government.

In reality, Dr. Henry was never accepted, except by the U.S., as the best person to lead Haiti. He validated this belief within Haiti by reneging on the terms of agreements on governance that he made on September 11, 2021

and December 21, 2022 with private sector groups and non-governmental organizations. Therefore, he had neither the interest nor the capacity to spearhead the national effort for a "Haitian solution" to the crisis for which the international community repeatedly called.

Henry made his first request for an international force to help national police fight gangs, in October 2022.



At that time, the gangs were a growing threat; they had not yet reached the forceful dimensions that exist now. Within Haiti, Henry's call was seen as a move to get external military help that would maintain his grip on power. Therefore, they opposed, under

many guises, any external intervention.

Externally, the government of El Salvador had offered to help, based on its own success with curbing gangs by methods, judged by some, as abusing the human rights of persons it imprisoned. The El Salvador offer was not encouraged and, eventually it fell away.

No other government sought to get involved. Meanwhile, the U.S. government pursued a policy of maintaining support for Dr. Henry based on hope rather than confidence in his capacity to build a strong coalition to govern the country. That hope is now dashed.

Following the release of prison inmates and attacks on other important public installations, Haiti is now under gang control. Airlines have stopped flights into the country and cargo ships have taken similar action as gangs loot containers at the port.

Amid all this, the United Nations Security Council (UNSC), influenced by rivalries between veto powers, failed to prioritize Haiti's wellbeing, choosing not to deploy a U.N. force. Instead, they approved a voluntary Multinational Security Support (MSS) Mission, not funded by the U.N., leaving the U.S. to spearhead recruitment and funding efforts, which have largely been unsuccessful.

Only Kenya, demanding \$200 million for its participation, has agreed to contribute troops to the Multinational Security Support (MSS) Mission. The U.S. has struggled to meet its \$200 million commitment due to Congress's deadlock over allocating \$100 million, half of its promised contribution. Consequently,

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the launch of the MSS Mission appears increasingly unlikely.

As Haiti's turmoil deepens, the U.S. appears to support Finance Minister, Michel Patrick Boisvert, as Henry's successor. This potential U.S. endorsement of another unelected leader will undoubtedly face opposition from various Haitian stakeholders.

The real answer to the current Haitian crisis continues to remain in the hands of Haitians. All of its aspiring leaders and all the rival organisations for political and economic supremacy must put aside their ambitions for personal power and stand behind the empowerment of Haiti. They have to resolve to postpone rivalry until transparent, free and fair elections can be held in normalized conditions.

Meanwhile, they must act urgently to coalesce behind an agreed President based on the last functioning Constitution of the Republic, and to agree to the appointment of a Prime Minister, on whom they can also agree, for the formation of a national transitional government drawn from the talents that exist in the private sector, the NGO's, the political parties and the diaspora.

They also need to agree on the term of such a transitional government and its mandate, which should include any requests for international assistance. The structure for such an agreement already exists in the recent Resolution of January 2024, which emerged from the National Congress of Transition, as well as in other previously agreed strategies such as the Montana Accord of 2021.

If the various Haitian parties cannot act as genuine patriots for their country by setting aside ambitions and rivalry for at least two years, and by establishing a genuine government of national unity on behalf of the Haitian people, they will condemn their nation to external intervention of the kind that has contributed for more than 200 years to their present plight. They will have only themselves to blame.

By rallying together to form a united front and advocating for democratic renewal, Haitians have the power to proudly present to the world the 'Haitian solution' they have long sought. Such a momentous shift towards a consensus-built, authentic Haitian pathway could redefine the nation's future and command the respect and support of the global community.

It's time for Haiti to seize this critical opportunity; to forge a future grounded in legitimacy and unity that the international community cannot ignore.
